SONS OF TEMPERANCE

The Annual Session Held in St. John—New Officers Elected and Other Business Transacted

The Grand Division, Sons of Temperance, met in annual session on Wednesday evening, Nov. 10, at the Hotel Hamilton, the grand worthy patriarch, in his report warmly welcomed the delegates and referred to the work done during the year and expressed a belief that the efforts made for improved legislation would be productive of good.

E. V. Everett, grand scribe, reported that he had received reports for the quarter ending June 30 from thirty-two divisions, and for the quarter ending September 30 from twenty-five divisions. On September 26 the G. W. P. had organized Harecourt Division, No. 438, with a membership of forty. Gantaldi Division, No. 161, and Pokiak Division, No. 312, had been reconstituted. Other divisions had resumed active work. The returns from the divisions gave the following statistics: New members, 88; joined by card, 6; members reinstated, 12; withdrawn from membership, 40; suspended, 186; expelled for violation of pledges, 8; expelled for other causes, 1; deaths, 2.

There were 51 sub-divisions on the roll, giving a membership of 2216. What is known as the non-contributing membership numbers 5,303.

The financial position of the order was better than last year; \$163, of which \$50 had been paid, had been pledged for the support of a grand lecturer. Altogether they now had about \$400 for use in forwarding the efforts.

Thus, A. Lawson, grand treasurer, reported that at the last semi-annual session the balance on hand had been \$266.78. He had received \$222.99. The disbursements had been \$235.54 leaving a balance of \$248.23 which was a slight advance on last year.

The officials were installed by the past grand worthy patriarch, Rev. C. W. Hamilton.

Mr. Everett as secretary of the temperance committee submitted a review of the answer of the government to the request for charges in the license law.

Immediately after the opening of the Grand Division this morning, Most Worthy Patriarch W. B. Turgeon, of St. Catharines, Ont., was received in due form and afterwards he addressed those present.

Speeches in response were made by Grand Worthy Patriarch H. C. Tilley and Past Most Worthy Patriarch C. A. Everett.

The report of the Grand Superintendent of Young People's work was presented and referred to the committee on the state of the order.

The finance and audit committee reports were also presented and received.

It was decided to hold the next semi-annual session of the Grand Division at Newcastle on a date to be fixed by the Grand Worthy Patriarch. It was resolved to hold the annual session next year at Moncton on the third Wednesday in October.

A BRIGHTER DAY.

Greater Freedom in Russia. Equality of all Elements is Now Looked For.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—According to the Tribune, Oscar S. Straus, who is a member of the Hague Tribunal, when asked yesterday if he saw any significance in the reference in the speech of Lord Lansdown at the Lord Mayor's banquet in London "to the widely prevalent desire" that arbitration might be resorted to in the case of the present war in the Far East, said: "I have long had the impression that we shall wake up some morning to find that through the good offices of great Britain, with the tacit consent of the signatory powers to the treaty of Berlin, arrangements have been agreed upon by which the near Eastern and far Eastern questions have been settled by one stroke. That is to say, Russia will have to come to an agreement with Great Britain and secondarily with signatory powers for having free access to the sea through Dardanelles, in return for which a permanent adjustment of the Afghan boundary and Great Britain domination of the Persian Gulf will be granted, and in the far East Japan's sphere of influence will be recognized in Korea, while Manchuria with certain rights to Japan secured will revert to China. This done the peace of the world will be insured, certainly for our generation and by the end of that time the nations will have become so accustomed to availing themselves of the Hague Tribunal that wars will be largely eliminated.

"What is your reason for so optimistic a view?" Mr. Straus was asked.

There is every reason for such optimism, he said. The peace idea is uppermost in the minds of the cabinets of Europe, as well as in the minds of the people. The desire for peace has been awakened and strengthened by President Roosevelt's decision in response to the resolutions of the inter-parliamentary union, to convene a second peace congress in accordance with the wish expressed and the plan outlined by Hague Conference of 1900. It has been maintained from the beginning that some

phases of this far Eastern situation sooner or later will have to come before the Hague tribunal, as the interest of the neutral nations nowadays in such that they cannot permit one or two combatants to exact such terms, especially when territory is considered as the victor man be powerful enough to insist upon.

We came through a very beautiful farming country till we came near the American boundary when we struck a well wooded country through to the small town of Warroad in Minnesota. After we left Warroad we saw nothing on both sides of the track but woods till we came to the Lake of the Woods and the mouth of the Rainy River where the town of Rainy River is situated in a very busy lumbering country. We arrived at Fort Frances at 6.30 in the evening. After tea we crossed Rainy river by the International Falls, Minnesota where we spent a very enjoyable evening. In the morning we left by the steamer Majestic for the camps. The next morning with the foreman John Walton and a crew of seventy five men we started to build the camps. The cook camp is 10x50 and the men's camp is 50x60. The stable is large enough to hold 10 team of horses. We completed them all in a week and then we spent a very enjoyable evening by singing and dancing and violin playing. There were mostly consists of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island men. Among those from the Miramichi are—Dixon Dalton and John McCormick, Newcastle and John Newman, Thomas Newman, Charles Newman, Miles Cleuston, Albert Carroll and Edmund Russell of Millerton. This is all the news we can think of this time as we are just about starting logging.
