Communication Interrupted In All Sections Enough Snow For Sleighing

Winter was ushered in Monday by a violent storm which did some damage about the Miramichi. The snow fell in heavy showers, gradually increasing in intensity until it was a steady fall of several inches. The wind was from the north and the fury of the elements was such that it was difficult to see more than a few feet in any direction.

THIS MAN SAW NINETY MOOSE

Up In Gloucester County They Wait Until They See A Head Which Suits.

The Advocate's Bathurst correspondent writes of a great many of the strangers who were hunting in the vicinity of Bathurst and the Upper Nepisquit have returned to the States, well satisfied with their hunting trips, while the heads secured this year were perhaps as a rule, slightly smaller on the average than those got last fall, all some magnificent trophies were shipped to the taxidermists at different points to be dressed. Some of the hunters tell great tales of the number of moose seen, one gentleman informing one of our members of the Assembly that he actually counted ninety moose at different places before he shot an animal with a head to suit him. Mr. Wetmore expressed himself as much pleased with the structure, and said the work was first class in every respect. The bridge was built by Contractor A. E. Smye, of Alma, Alberta county, one of New Brunswick's best bridge contractors. The bridge is 2,410 feet long and is perfectly straight and level, and has a sidewalk four feet wide raised above the roadway the entire length of the structure. It will be lighted by electricity.

The following are the dimensions of the edifice:—Main body 105 x 50; chancel 27 x 35; side chapel 12 x 45; vestry 28 x 25; height from ground to cross 120 feet. The work was carried on by Mr. Thomas Power of Newcastle. The plans and details were also drawn by him and it all speaks volumes for his mechanical taste and workmanship.

The Advocate is in receipt of the following letter from Mr. Charles Newman, dated from Fort Frances, Ont. Nov. 11:—I thought I would drop you a few lines from the west to let you know how we are getting along. We left Winnipeg on the 3rd of Oct. by the Canada Northern Railway for Fort Frances. We came through a very beautiful farming country till we came near the American boundary when we struck a well wooded country through to the small town of Warroad in Minnesota. After we left Warroad we saw nothing on both sides of the track but woods till we came to the Lake of the Woods and the mouth of the Rainy River where the town of Rainy River is situated in a very busy lumbering country. We arrived at Fort Frances at 6:30 in the evening. After tea we crossed Rainy river by the International Falls, Minnesota where we spent a very enjoyable evening. In the morning we left by the steamer Majestic for the camp. The next morning with the foreman John Walton and a crew of seventy five men we started to build the camp. The cook camp is 10x50 and the men's camp is 20x60. The stable is large enough to hold 10 team of horses. We completed them all in a week and then we spent a very enjoyable evening by singing and dancing and violin playing. The crew mostly consists of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island men. Among those from the Miramichi are—Dixon Dalton and John McCormick, Newcastle and John Newman, Thomas Newman, Charles Newman, Miles Cleunton, Albert Carroll and Edmund Russell of Millerton. This is all the news we can think of this time as we are just about starting logging.
