In attending the meetings of last week, one must have been instantly struck with the fact that there are in the Council two currents—we had almost said two parties—both vigorously opposed to the skepticism of the day; but one liberally so, and the other narrowly and bitterly so. One is for freedom of investigation and a large liberty.

What is the faith? A young man full of the desire to preach salvation, and, believing that he is prepared for it, is brought up all standing by the creed. He can't make it all out in the way the Church interprets it. What are you going to do with him? Shall he be ferbidden to preach? He asks you whether you have any right to impose on him conditions that Christ did not impose. Well, you tell him there are other Churches. other narrowly and bitterly so. One is for freedom of investigation and a large liberty of difference within the Church; while the other would hold every Presbyterian rigidly to the old beliefs. As an illustration of what we mean, we may mention that in twenty minutes' discussion on the burning question of inspiration the venerable Principal Cairns had uttered what was to him hardly more than a commonplace that, however definite might be the Christian's own faith in the doctrine of inspiration (on which he himself inclined to a conservative view), yet it must be romembered that this is not a doctrine to be used in Apologetics, in contest with unbelievers, because as Christians we can stand without it and need not burden ourselves with it, in our defence of Christianity; and, further, that the doctrine of inspiration without insisting that the contrine of inspiration without insisting that the conditions that Christ did not impose.
