### Arrival of the "Arabia."

New York, June 14, 1854.  
The Steamship Arabia arrived last night, 8,000 French troops had landed at Piræus and taken possession. King Otto has accepted the ultimatum of France and England, and summoned a Ministry.  
The Anglo French Squadron has been ordered to the White Sea. Admiral Napier had battered the outposts of Hango, but to the 22d had not captured the main fortress. Silistria was holding out bravely.  
On the 27th Lord Palmerston would probably be appointed Minister of War in England.  
Omar Pacha is advancing with 20,000 men to relieve Silistria.  
Independence of Georgia is proclaimed.  
Pinar and Cerna had declined a truce.  
Consols 91½.

The Prices of Flour.—Now that flour has advanced in this market to a figure, so high, if ever, before attained, says the Rochester American of the 3d inst., it may not be uninteresting to our readers to know what is paid for the article elsewhere. We subjoin the following statement of prices of best flour in different markets as gathered from our latest exchanges. It will be remembered that the quotations are the wholesale prices, to which must be added the retailer's profit, from twenty five to seventy five cents per barrel to get the price paid by the consumer.

### SINIP TIMBER.

As the demand for ships has increased and the most accessible timber has become exceedingly valuable, and an important question arises as to whence future supplies are to be derived, and what effect the growing scarcity of timber will have upon the interests of commerce. Already ship builders are sometimes greatly embarrassed for lack of suitable timber; and in a few years, except from the distant interior, the supply must entirely fail. Speculators and foreign agents are scattered through the country, in all directions, from the British Provinces to the Florida Capes, supplying not only the demand for domestic consumption, but sending off enormous quantities of timber to England, France and other portions of European continent. The rapid extension of railroads has opened vast sources of timber lands, affording temporary relief, but New York and New Jersey which were formerly the great timber States, have nearly failed, and Virginia, Delaware, and Maryland, are now the principal timber States. Very recently, live oak has been procured from Louisiana, knees from Michigan, and other varieties of timber in this State, but it is too straight for ordinary purposes.

The New York market is chiefly supplied with occasional arrivals from Ohio. Live oak framing timber comes from South Carolina, Georgia, Florida and Louisiana. One of our largest builders says that eventually some other means of strengthening ships must be adopted than those now employed. The rich forests of the South West present rich fields for individual enterprise; where large purchases are being made; and though they may now be quite inaccessible, are only reserved for a time, till they shall be penetrated by railroads, and become mines of wealth to their possessors. - N. Y. Journal of Commerce.

### A RACE, FOR LIFE.

As the Railway train on the Old Colony Railroad was on its way for Braintree the engineer discovered at some distance ahead an old horse grazing on the track. The whistle was immediately made to utter its most alarming shriek, when the horse signified his cognisance of the "ugly customer" in his wake by very loudly neighing and a lofty tumbling of the heels. ### THE COMING STRUGGLE.

MR. EDITOR.—Your insertion of my last communication has encouraged me to again seek a spare corner in your independent Journal. In my last I endeavoured to impress upon the freeholders of the County the responsibility resting upon them in the exercise of their suffrages, and to call their attention to the character, qualification, and motives of the men they may select to represent them for the next four years. We have many sectarian creeds. The last should not for a moment be brought into consideration, (alho' it has hitherto been a prominent ingredient.) The first is all important, and should be earnestly and dispassionately examined into by the electors at large. The House of Assembly is a Political Body—and alho' politics have never been made a test of a candidate's qualifications in Charlotte, the day has arrived when men should be selected to represent us whose political opinions are firmly established upon a liberal basis—and who would not "be every thing by turns, and nothing long."

In conversation a few days with one of our hardy and intelligent Backwoodsmen; he illustrated the position of the Electors of the County, somewhat after this fashion: "We are about fitting out a crew for the woods, and our first object is, naturally, to secure men who are well qualified to perform the different duties assigned them: a good teamster, a good chopper, a good swimmer, and a good cook, are indispensable; men who would work amicably together, and keep all things drawing; we want no 'hawking off' or 'crowding,' and as we shall probably operate for the next four years on the same permit, it is desirable that we should exercise due caution in our selection of the crew: in selecting our teamster then, let us go into the agricultural districts, and we shall have no difficulty in selecting a man who would even keep his cattle upon brown top, do a good winter's work, and bring them in good condition in the Spring. In looking round for a chopper, as the quality of the lumber will much depend upon his judgement, it would be good policy to secure a man who 'knows the standing tree,' even were we to give him a *gill* more than others could be secured for, but whose services might not be so profitable. If the man we should select for a swimmer was not only qualified to Bash out the Road, but also to *McAdamize* it, if requisite, it would be all the better; and, in selecting a cook, we would require a man who would be prudent and economical in the management of the grub, and one who would be on hand day or night to see that the crew were comfortably provided for—alho' the selection of the latter officer might by some be considered of minor importance. With such a crew we might safely flatter ourselves that the Landing in the Spring would not be encumbered with a superfluity of *concessus, rotten or hollow butted logs*, whatever the quantity might be."

Now, Mr. Editor, those remarks might be forcibly applied to our present position, as regards the selection of our future Representatives. We want sound, practical men, men of action, and not mere men of words; men who will stand fearlessly forth in defence of our rights and privileges; men who will oppose all monopolies tending to make the rich richer and the poor poorer; men who can by no undue influence be swayed from pursuing that course which they conscientiously believe will be the most favorable to the many, alho' perhaps not approved of by the few.

Let every candidate be fairly tested, and let all prejudices be thrown aside. The Editor of the St. Stephen Patriot some ten months since, in a series of Editorials upon the subject, no doubt succeeded in eradicating and effectually removing the ridiculous and ungrounded prejudice formerly existing in the County against the return of Members of the legal profession to serve as our Representatives—at least I can only speak for myself. He fully convinced me that: such men could not by any possibility be actuated by other than the most patriotic motives in declaring their willingness to sacrifice their professional practice and prospects in order to serve their dear friends, the electors, in the legislative halls. That the prospect, however remote, of being able to shape their course as to secure the exchange of their poplin for a silk gown, never entered into their philosophy. I have had little cause for employing the professional services of any Member of the Bar in this County, but were I unfortunately to become entangled in legal meshes, I should feel confident of securing a speedy release: could I rely upon my counsel to exercise a title of the energy, ingenuity, perseverance, and recklessness the professional candidates are now displaying in order to convince the dear people that they are wholly disinterested in appearing before them for their suffrages, and utterly regardless whether elected or rejected. Verily, Mr. Editor, it will be a hard task to convince some at least that such disinterestedness is real, alho' for my part I candidly confess I believe them. There is one trait however in the character of the Bar of this County which most assuredly can no longer be justly applicable—viz *modesty*! So celebrated has the legal profession become for this qualification in Charlotte County, that when a Brother in any part of the Province displays a degree of bashfulness and timidity in his pleadings somewhat unusual in the profession, he was at once set down by the Order as being "As bashful as a Charlotte County Lawyer." Now, Mr. Editor, the fact that one had been seeking Baristers in this County are now seeking Political Honors, must be ominous of something—What that something is it will be well for the Electors

of the County to endeavour to sift out, and let no undue influence be brought to bear in such a manner as to cause a wavering in the exercise of the suffrage of any one.

### FROM LATE ENGLISH PAPERS.

The Turkish fleet was off Varna on the 11th, on the way to the Circassian coast. On the 13th of May the Russians lost 1500 men in an attack on the new fort of Abdul M-kid.

Marshal St. Arnaud is appointed generalissimo of the combined forces. He and Lord Raglan were to meet Omar Pacha at Varna to conclude a plan of campaign.

Naples has declared in favor of neutrality. It is reported from Cronstadt that prayers were read in all the churches of Warsaw for the success of the Greek insurrection.

From Vienna, Monday, May 29, the following is telegraphed:—The admission of the Germanic confederation to the Austro-Prussian treaty is secured. A committee has been appointed by the Frankfurt diet to prepare the document of adhesion.

The Journal de St. Petersburg says that two frigates cannonaded Witsland on the 19th, and next day approached Ekenas, but were repulsed.

From private telegraphic accounts it is reported that the Russians were menacing Erzeroum. They have recently made a compulsory enrolment of 30,000 Armenians. From Malta we have a report that the allied fleet had bombarded Kaffa or Theodosia, a Russian port on the eastern coast of Crimea.

The English mail at Marseilles brings the Russian treaty with the Affghans. Russia promises never, till the end of the world, to interfere with the interior concerns of the country. In return for which promise the Khan of Khiva accords to Russia the right to build fortified barracks in the districts of Hourgani. The stations named will be immediately occupied by Russian troops.

It is reported that the vast merchant quarter of the city of Riga had been demolished by the military authorities in preparing for defence.

It is also reported that an allied force of 17,000 strong was to be landed in Sweden preparatory to that power declaring war on Russia.

Advices from Constantinople say that the Turkish corps at Kar almost entirely dispersed on the approach of the Russians, May 5.

### CANADIAN ITEMS.

THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL QUESTION.—We understand that the Imperial Government has decided upon the course to be pursued in reference to the Address of the Legislative Assembly of this province praying for an elective Legislative Council. It will be recollected that the Address proposed, in detail, a scheme for altering the constitution of the Legislative Council. The Imperial Government it seems refuses to take upon itself the task of altering our constitution; but it proposes to do something far better—to authorize this province so to alter the constitution as to place the Legislative Council upon any basis we may think proper. A bill for this purpose will, if we are correctly informed, be introduced into the Imperial Government during the present session. This liberality is in precise harmony with the declaration of Lord John Russell, at the Elgin banquet, that Canada would be allowed to mould her institutions as she might think proper. If the precise thing which our Legislative Assembly prayed for is not to be granted, we are to have something more liberal than that body has yet ventured to ask.—[Toronto Leader.]

ACCIDENT ON THE GREAT WESTERN RAILROAD SEVEN LIVES LOST.—We are informed that yesterday afternoon about 2 o'clock, three of the cars on a train going east were thrown off the track a few miles west of London. Six Norwegians were killed and some others injured. The engine was not thrown off the track.

On the previous night a few miles east of Chatham a young man named Worthington, the conductor of an Express train going west, was killed. He was on the platform of one of the cars leaning out to look at some part of the machinery when his head struck against a gate post, and he fell from the cars a corpse.

We understand that, although over 90,000 persons have travelled over this road since it was opened up to this time no passengers have been killed or seriously injured.—[Toronto Globe, 3rd June.]

CLEANSING OUT THE BOSTON SLAVE PEN The city government of Boston have served legal notice upon the U. S. government to vacate the rooms now occupied by them in the Court House. The last day of the present month is the time when the Marshal and all other U. S. Officers must quit the premises.

CHARLOTTE ELECTION.—Ere our paper is issued again, four men will be chosen to represent this County in the next General Assembly. This County requires honest, independent men, of good common sense and sound practical views, who are acquainted with the business of the country, and its wants—men who will work and not occupy the time by declamation,—men who will look to the interests of their constituents and not to their own aggrandizement,—men whose characters are above suspicion,—are well known to be liberal in their views and who possess the confidence of the Freeholders.—Such persons can be found in the list of candidates, and although but four out of the number can be elected, we hope they may be the best.

The nomination takes place to-day and we intend "taking notes," and printing them in time for circulation throughout the County, prior to the Election, if time permits.

INQUEST.—On Tuesday last, an Inquest was held by Dr. S. T. Gove, Coroner, on the body of a young man, between 20 and 30 years of age, dressed as a seaman, which was found near low water mark, on the landing of the farm of Mrs. John McCurdy.

Decomposition having already taken place, and in the absence of evidence, the Jury returned the Verdict of "Found Drowned."

Parties requiring further information as to the dress, &c. of the deceased, can obtain the same of the Coroner.

FIRE.—On Thursday night last, the large dwelling on Joe's Point farm, known as the Dunn house, and partly occupied by Daniel Hynds, was discovered on fire, and before assistance could arrive, was burnt to the ground. The family had a narrow escape, losing their clothes and furniture, saving only a few chairs. The fire originated in an unattended part of the building,—cause unknown.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—A young man named Samuel Peyton, at work in Cox's ship yard, Robinson, was accidentally killed on Saturday. He was engaged at the time hoisting a part of the frame, and called to one of the men to slack the guy a little; the man accidentally let the rope slip and Mr. Peyton, losing his balance caught the derrick and fell with it to the ground, a distance of thirty feet, killing him almost instantly. He has left a wife and one child to mourn their loss. The deceased was a sober and industrious young man, much respected by all who knew him.

THE Anniversary of the "COLD WATER ARMY, No. 1," was held yesterday. The boys marched in procession with regalia and banners, making a respectable appearance. At the "Grove" they partook of a sumptuous repast, provided by their friends; after which several excellent addresses were delivered, and the party separated highly pleased with the proceedings.

\$1,000 FOR A VOTE!—Were it in accordance with the law of the land, that votes might be bought and sold as stock in the market, we apprehend they would bring a high price on Tuesday next. There is a greater number of Candidates soliciting suffrages, than we have at any time seen in the County. Eight of them will undoubtedly "remain at home," that is a decided point, as the law allows this County but four. There appears to be two operating causes why the number of candidates is so large compared with bygone years,—the County is older, has a greater number of inhabitants, and men of more genius and education are to be found ready to serve their country.—The next cause is, there is not that expense, bustle and vexation attending elections now, that formerly existed, in consequence of simultaneous polling in the Parishes. All the votes are now taken in the short space of eight hours. Yet an extension of the franchise and vote by ballot are wanted, and will ere long be introduced into the Election law.

MASONIC CELEBRATION.—The Masonic Brethren at Eastport, intend celebrating St. John's Day 24th inst., by a Procession, Address, Dinner, &c. Preparations on a large scale have been made, and invitations sent to Masonic Lodges, around a Band from Boston or Portland will also be present—in a word, the Brethren of Eastern Lodge, will make an imposing display on the 24th.—The steamer Nequasset, Capt. Cary, is advertised to make an Excursion on that day, at the low fare of 62½ cents for the trip.—Give him a full "Boat."

THE ANGLO-AMERICAN MAGAZINE for June has come to hand.—It contains a number of plates, and the usual amount of literary matter. It deserves an extensive patronage in the Provinces.

THE Canadian Parliament was opened by Lord Elgin on the 13th inst. After alluding to the co-operation of England and France in the war—stated "that the treaty which he concluded at Washington, would prove advantageous to the Colonies generally." There is a difference of opinion on this point as far at least as New Brunswick is concerned.

THE TEMPERANCE DEMONSTRATION held at St. John on Thursday last, is described as being an imposing display. Several distinguished visitors from the United States and B. Provinces, joined in the Procession. The streets were decorated with flags, banners, &c. and the whole affair passed off admirably.

millions of acres of land, the greater part of
