SHALL THE PRICE OF WHEAT BE FIXED?

There having been a demand made in Sask that the present government price of \$2.24 on 1918 wheat be continued on the 1919 crop, the quesarises, Whether this may fairly be done?

In peacetimes, Liverpool sets the world price of this cereal. Whether it is high or low depends on yields and the surpluses which graingrowing nahave to export.

Since the armistice was signed, Australian wheat, at had been held for several years in storage, for lack of bottoms, is finding its way to the principal market. This can now be laid down at Liverpool at \$1.44. As ships can be released from other occupations, the world-price of wheat will recede. It is ed that come July, wheat will not fetch more than \$1.25.

The request that the Canadian authorities continue the price at \$2.24 would probably mean payour graingrowers a bonus of \$1 per bushel on 1919's eat harvest, and thus mean a tax of between two and three hundred millions of dollars on the Canadian people.

ose who advocate a continuation of price fixing. claim that it is as reasonable to do this as to expend blic money on provincial highways, shipbuilding, using, and loans to Rumania and Serbia.

Is it? State-aided highways will benefit the farmers more than any other section of the population These will enable them to market their saleable pro-ducts easier, quicker, at less cost and all the year around.

The chief reason why the Dominion is abo build ships is that it wishes to get out from under the shipping combine. This organization now charges whatever it pleases, comes when it likes and goes when it likes. The higher its rates the lower the net amount the farmer receives for his products. - Until recently foodstuffs have been the country's principal exports. Hence farmers will be the greatest gainers from national shipping.

As far as housing is concerned, the state loans not to be confined to towns. Rural and urban municipalities may alike borrow money for the erec-tion of homes for workmen. It is not a gift. The money will be repaid with interest. Credits to Rumania and Serbia are to be

made for the purpose of enabling them to buy in Canada the necessaries of life. This will include both food and clothing. The farmers will likely supply as great a proportion of the goods sold them as any other ndustry. They will be certain of getting their money nd the Canadian government will later collect the

ne of the arguments advanced by those advo cating a bonus on wheat, because the country is about to undertake certain public works, is watertight. It is noteworthy that the graingrowers of Manitoba and Alberta have gone on record as being opposed to the mment fixing a price on the next wheat crop.

It may be that the growers of Saskatchewan have noted that the American government, reckoning that the war would not end until next summer, fixed the price at \$2.26 on the 1919's crop. To fulfil its agreein face of a falling world market, it has had to provide a billion dollars to take up the expected loss. It should be remembered that this price-fixing was done last year. Our Saskatchewan friends are simply asking that a free pie counter be set up in Canada.

The well-being of millions of consumers are directly cted by this proposal. Bread is the staff of life. To take unnecessarily \$200,000,000 out of the pockets of the wage-earners of Canada in order to place ous wheatgrowers on the same footing as the American farmers, would be a hardship.

The reason American farmers are to enjoy a gift of \$1.00 per bushel is due to an error of judgment the part of U.S. legislators. They took a long ance and missed. This miscalculation will cost every American household \$50. Before the matter is ended this wheat tax will have been added to the cost of verything the farmer buys.



MEMBERS SPEAK OUT IN CAUCUS

Reterring to the caucus of government M.P.P.'s, at Toronto, the Mail and Empire says that: It was, as cancuses go, a fairly peaceable affair, chiefly marked by evidences of a desire on the part of the members for closer co-operation between the members of the Government and the rank and file.

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SHALL THE PRICE OF WHEAT BE FIXED?

There having been a demand made in Saskatchewan that the present government price of \$2.24 on 1918 wheat be continued on the 1919 crop, the ques-tion arises, Whether this may fairly be done?

In peacetimes, Liverpool sets the world price of this cereal. Whether it is high or low depends on yields and the surpluses which graingrowing nations have to export.

Since the armistice was signed, Australian wheat, that had been held for several years in storage, for lack of bottoms, is finding its way to the principal market. This can now be laid down at Liverpool at \$1.44. As ships can be released from other occupations, the world-price of wheat will recede. It is expected that come July, wheat will not fetch more than \$1.25.

The request that the Canadian authorities continue the price at \$2.24 would probably mean pay-ing our graingrowers a bonus of \$1 per bushel on 1919's wheat harvest, and thus mean a tax of between two and three hundred millions of dollars on the Canadian people.

Those who advocate a continuation of price fixing. claim that it is as reasonable to do this as to expend public money on provincial highways, shipbuilding, housing, and loans to Rumania and Serbia.

Is it? State-aided highways will benefit the farmers more than any other section of the population. These will enable them to market their saleable products easier, quicker, at less cost and all the year around.

The chief reason why the Dominion is about to build ships is that it wishes to get out from under the shipping combine. This organization now charges whatever it pleases, comes when it likes and goes when it likes. The higher its rates the lower the net amount the farmer receives for his products. Until recently foodstuffs have been the country's principal exports. Hence farmers will be the greatest gainers from national shipping

As far as housing is concerned, the state loans are not to be confined to towns. Rural and urban municipalities may alike borrow money for the erection of homes for workmen. It is not a gift. The money will be repaid with interest. Credits to Rumania and Serbia are to be

made for the purpose of enabling them to buy in Canada the necessaries of life. This will include both food and clothing. The farmers will likely supply as great a proportion of the goods sold them as any other industry. They will be certain of getting their money and the Canadian government will later collect the

None of the arguments advanced by those advocating a bonus on wheat, because the country is about to undertake certain public works, is watertight. It is noteworthy that the graingrowers of Manitoba and Alberta have gone on record as being opposed to the government fixing a price on the next wheat crop.

It may be that the growers of Saskatchewan have noted that the American government, reckoning that the war would not end until next summer, fixed the price at \$2.26 on the 1919's crop. To fulfil its agreement, in face of a falling world market, it has had to provide a billion dollars to take up the expected loss. It should be remembered that this price-fixing was done last year. Our Saskatchewan friends are simply asking that a free pie counter be set up in Canada.

The well-being of millions of consumers are directly affected by this proposal. Bread is the staff of life. To take unnecessarily \$200,000,000 out of the pockets of the wage-earners of Canada in order to place ous wheatgrowers on the same footing as the American farmers, would be a hardship.

The reason American farmers are to enjoy a gift of \$1.00 per bushel is due to an error of judgment on the part of U.S. legislators. They took a long on the part of 0.5. regaments. This miscalculation will cost every American household \$50. Before the matter is ended this wheat tax will have been added to the cost of erything the farmer buys.

The high cost of living affects everyone, including the farmer. His dissatisfaction is being shown by his attacks on the tariff, which is thought to be the root of the evil. It is becoming convincingly clear that he high cost of foodstuffs has most to do with the abnormal costs of everything else, since wages must attempt to square with the cost of food. 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




