FAST FLYING MACHINES.

LATEST AND MOST WONDERFUL EFFORTS OF INVENTORS.

Remarkable Contrivances Which Won't Go -New and Strange Devices For Water Navigation_The "Kentucky Senator"_

Curiosities of the Patent Office. All that has been written about that wonderful museum of original ideas, the collec-tion of models in the Patent Office has scarce tion of models in the Patent Office has scarce begun to give a notion of the extraordinary freaks of human ingenuity therein display-ed. It might be appropriately regarded as a chamber of horrors if one could know what tragedies of disappointed hopes, productive of lunacy and suicide, are represented by these multitudinous contrivances. Flying machines and devices for securing perpetual motion are turned out on new plans as, plen-tifully as ever, as is likewise the case with machines and devices for securing perpetual motion are turned out on new plans as plentifully as ever, as is likewise the case with every imaginable sort of product of more or less disordered inventive faculities. So far as the navigation of the air is concerned, it must be owned that the problem has not yet been proved insoluble; but, unfortunately the inventors do not seem to advance a particle with jit. The patent most recently granted in this line, only a few weeks old, is for an equipment as nearly like a bird's as possible, with folding wings and tail made of enormous feathers of tin and silk. But the gentleman who suggested this apparatus for aerial exercise equips himself at the same time with a balloon big enough to support his weight while he flops along and steers with his tail feathers. And those would-be-flyers who do not expect to avail themselves of balloons are in no case able to devise any other method of elevating themselves in the atmosphere than by inclined fans or sails revolving. These ought to raise them, of course, but in practice they don't, somehow. One man, after he has once got up in the air by means of his revolving fans, expects to make his way in any desired direction with propellers at each end of the little boat he sits in. Another thinks tol utilize a kite of vast area, within which sails revolve, while a basket is suspended beneath. Another device of domestic economy is applied to the common barnyard lowl, and is called the "hen persuader." Rubber earth-worms for fish bait are curious things, and so is a contrivance which dumps the servant out of bed by clock work at the proper time in the morning. Specimens of cloth, woven out of glass, spun inconceivably fine, are likewise interesting. The stuff is most beautiful for curtains, filtering the light through its substance in vari-colored rays. 

RELICS OF BURNS

To Be Auctioned Off-Charce for a Scottish Club. Every summer thousands of visitors make pilgrimages to the cottage in which Robert Burns was born, near Alloway Kirk and the Banks o' Doon, says London Truth. They are snown the room in which the poet first saw the light, as well as the "original" furniture used by Burns parents. Will it be believed that all the genuinely original furniture of the cottage was sold off by public roup in September, 1843, most of it being now in the possession of a gentleman in Manchester, who wants a thousand pounds for the following articles: The father's chair, the mother's chair, the poet's chair, Pembroke table with flap, another without flap, the mother's work table, chest of drawers, eight day clock. Corner cupboard, drinking cup of wood, ale horn, toa bell, tea-caddy, toddy ladle, twelve chairs supplied by "the Miller Goudie," the sword worn by Burns as an exciseman and the probe he used on his preventive excursions. All these are authenticated by letters from men who had seen them before 1843. The seller throws in five visitors' books—trom 1829 to 1843—containing 7,000 autographs, as well as a letter of the poet. Here is a chance for some Scotch museum or Burns club. They were offered for sale to the Secretary for Scotland, but his secretary, wrote that while they were of "no value," they might be given to the nation. The seller replied that as the nation had never given him anything, he hid not see his way to carry out his proposal. A sixpence from every member of a Burns Club would secure the collection, o'clo

We do not ripen necessarily because our years fulfill their tale; gray hairs and great grace are not inseparable companions. Here it may be well to note that there is no reason why a young Christian should not make great advance toward this maturity, even while young.—


So the gentleman had helped to save a life though he had not put out a hand or rope or boat go car; he had simply let his light shine.






