THE ONTARIO REFORM CLUB—SIR RICHARD'S ADDRESS.

The annual meeting of the Ontario Reform Club at Toronto is usually a quiet affair, devoted mainly to routine. But the club does not usually have its meeting at the opening of a great political campaign, nor have the members of the club ever before had the pleasure, as they had yesterday, of receiving at an annual meeting the loved and honored leader of the party. The meeting was called for 2 o'clock and the call was responded to by a large assembly of leading Liberals, the flower of the party in the city. The moeting was called to order by Sir Richard Cartwright, president of the club. Sir Richard Cartwright referred to the crisis in political affairs which had been precipitated by the Government's action in dissolving the House. In respect of that dissolution he made abundantly clear the position taken by true I thorals. The object of the disso. by true Liberals. The object of the disso by true Liberals. The object of the disso-lution is clearly not what is pretended by the Government, but partly to avoid com-ing complications arising out of their own mal-administration and corruption, and partly to take advantage of their opponents and snatch a verdict. Inasmuch as the dis-solution is ordered in the face of solemn gledges that no such step would be taken until the census had been completed and any necessary readjustment made, and inasmuch as it has defranchised many thousands of young men by reason of the suspension of the list-revision under the odious Fran-chise Act, Liberals protest against the of the list-revision under the odious Franchise Act, Liberals protest against the election as a subversion of the constitution and an invasion of popular rights. But inasmuch as it brings about an appeal to the country, which they do not fear, they intend to fight the Government on the plain lines of an honest, workable policy of extension of trade relations, as against the sham proposed by the Government, which cannot and is not intended to result in any good to the country, but only to deceive the country into a further term of vassalage to the combines.






