Loxbon, July 31.—A dispatch from Bangkok dated Monday, 7 p.m., says: "The uneasiness among the people here lar from lessening is increasing. Seven more French gunboats have arrived at Koh-Si-Chang, making a total of thirteen now there. Negotiations are still going on, but the progress made is not reported. The intentions of the French are awaited with fear and apprehension. Rear Admiral Humann, commanding the French squadron has issued a second blockade notice to take effect three days from Saturday. He will order the British warships Pallas and Swift, now lying off Bangkok, to go outside the blockade limits. M. Pavie, the French Minister resident, has gone to Saigon, and Rear Admiral Humann is under direct orders from Paris. Unless the French Government interposes quickly an attack on Bangkok seems certain. The trading community is surprised that Humann is still allowed a free hand.

London, Aug. 1.—The Post's Paris correspondent says: A lengthy interview on Monday morning between M. Develle and Lord Dufferin resulted in a friendly entente, permitting Siam to be maintained as a buffer between the British and the French parts to which England lays claim as having formed part of Burmah previous to Theebaw's overthrow. England agrees to the necessity of an accurate adjustment of the Siamese frontier in relation to Tonquin and Annam. The entente is so complete that Lord Dufferin will probably return to England on Tuesday or Wednesday.

THE FINANCIAL FLURRY

Not So Bad as Reports Have Made It

Washington, July 31.—Because of the conflicting statements regarding the number of failures of national banks, Controller Eckels has prepared a statement which will undoubtedly strengthen public confidence. He says: "Recent dispatches having appeared in the newspapers to the effect that since Jan. 1, 1893, '200 banks' have failed, instead of 200 having closed their doors, but 105 have gone into the hands of the Controller of the Currency. Fourteen of this number have already resumed business under favorable conditions and possessed of Appear. under favorable conditions and possessed of the confidence of the communities where

the confidence of the communities where located, and during the ensuing week it is expected several others will have complied with the requirements of the controller and reopened, while prior to Sept. 1 an equal number will resume."

The statement concludes: "The majority of those that recently failed are absolutely solvent, and only closed through an unwarranted lack of confidence in them, causing disastrous runs. Following is a resume: Number now in operation, 3,785; number failed since Jan. 1, 1893, 105; number reopened, 14; number in hands of receivers, 33; number in hands of bank examiners, with application to Controller for resumption, 58." sumption, 58.

DETROIT, July 30.—Beginning Tuesday next, Aug. I, the horsesheers of the city will work but nine hours per day. All the shop owners in the city have signed a paper agreeing to stand by the new rule. They respectfully ask all horse owners to endeavor to assist them in this matter by sending their horses to the shop sufficiently early to allow the men to get through their labor within the prescribed hours.

"Then we demand equal rights for both sexes. We believe woman should have the ballot, but we hope she will use it more intelligently than some men do.

"We believe in government ownership of railroads, but first we believe in government ownership of the telegraphs."

The only conspiracy he was in was with 60,000,000 of his countrymen to keep this country forver from all foreign domination or interhis countrymen to keep this country for-ever from all foreign domination or inter-ference of every kind and character. He would sever his right arm before he would cripple the grand public school system which gave him the little education he

had.



Results of the Collegiate Institute Entrance Examinations. Successful Candidates Number 256

Out of 344 Writing. London Beats Its Own Record—Miss Lillie Rolles in the Lead—Medals and Memorials.

London's public schools and London pupils have surpassed themselves.
Yesterday Inspector Carson received the long-looked-for returns of the Collegiate Institute entrance examinations from head-quarters. The result is eminently gratifying to the educational authorities here. No less than 256 passed, by long odds the highest number London has ever turned out. In 1892 there were 1865successful candidates, which broke all previous records; so that the relative number this year is enormous. Nominally 334 tried the recent examinations; the percentage of passing candidates is therefore centage of passing candidates is therefore cemarkable.

remarkable.

The total obtainable marks were 764 or 382 to pass. Miss Lillie Nelles, the clever daughter of Mr. H. E. Nelles, leads the entire list with 671 marks—an excellent showing. The names in the appended tables are in alphabetical order, boys first and girls second, with the marks made by each. The pupil making the highest marks in each of the public schools receives the Boyle memorial prize.

Trustee E. J. McRobert offered a gold and a silver medal to the two leading pupils in the Waterloo street and Princess avenue schools, and Trustee D. W. Blackwell made similar awards for the Lorne avenue and Rectory street schools. Waterloo beth the former and and Rectory street schools. Waterloo street school captures both the former and Lorne avenue the latter. In Waterloo street school Lillie Nelles made 671, Aggie street school Lillie Nelles made 671, Aggie Halstead 558 and Mamie Hance 537. It is optional with Lillie Nelles to choose the gold medal or the Boyle memorial. If she takes the former Aggie Halstead may own the sliver medal, and Mamie Hance the memorial prize. In the Lorne avenue school Eva Williams, with 586, Frank Cooper with 574 and Charles Anderson with 563, lead. In the same way the choice of gold medal or memorial prize rests with the foremest.

How near Great Britain and France came to war is shown by a usually well-informed cable correspondent. When Lord Rosebery, British Foreign Minister, learned that a blockade of the Siamese coast had been declared without notifying England he sent through Lord Dufferin to the French Government a short and simple note to this effect: "Great Britain refuses to recognize the blockade begun on the coast of Siam. If English commerce in those waters is interfered with by France, such action will be construed as a de liberate attack upon the English flag." After dispatching this ultimatum the Gladstone Government began active preparations to insure free commerce to and from Bangkok. In other words, the British notified the French Government that they meant to have free trade, even if war were necessary to insure it. The French Government, having no real grounds for obstructing commerce, in view of Siam's conciliatory attitude, has no other reasonable option than to back down. Complete surrender was betokened in its aunounce-ment that the French blockading force would be instructed after Sunday to allow English vessels unimpeded intercourse with Siamese ports. Inasmuch as nine-tenths of the Siamese commerce is in British ships of the Stamese commerce is in British ships this concession amounted to abandoning the blockade. Siam meanwhile has announced that she gives up to France all the territory which the republic demands; but as the land in question is claimed either by Great Britain or by China, the practical effect of the surveyed in the results of the wark kingdom the practical effect. render is to replace the weak kingdom by these much stronger nations, with the rulers of which France will now have to deal. ### British Gossip by Cable.

Though the Siam embroglio occupied the tiention of diplomats and parliamenarians a great deal last week, the British public seemed far more interested in the ow which took place in the House of Commons on Thursday night. The riot, in fact, overshadowed every other public opic. More significant than the brutal vent itself are the keenness of the repentance of all concerned, and the disgust and shame which the whole country is expressing. Scarcely any national disgrace would be more deeply felt. No feature of British life has been an object of greater popular pride than the time-honored dignity and decorum of the mother of Parliaments. One of England's fondest boasts has been that ich personal encounters as have disgraced the French Chamber and some American Legislatures were impossible in the great chamber of British gentlemen. It is the loss forever of this privilege of comparison which seems to be most keenly felt. There is a good deal of crimination between the paricipants in the fracas, but there is also whole some confession and shame on the part of nearly all involved. But there seems to be a consensus of opinion that the intensity of the row was really set by Mr. Chamberain when he applied the epithet of "Herod" to Gladstone, and brought forth the retort of "Judas" from O'Connor. The shame with which the affair is regarded by all the members of the House was illustrated Saturday afternoon. The terrace overooking the Thames was filled as usual. Passengers on the passing steamboats shouted gibes to the honorable members There were suggestions that Jem Smith should be engaged as chairman of the House, and that Marquis of Queensberry rules be enforced. Some jeering critics squared off in boxing attitudes. The effect was that a few minutes the terrace was entirely deserted by the members. Several veteran reporters in the gallery of the House regarded the fight as the logical outcome of the steady deterioration in Parliamentary manners that has been going on for years. The courtly form of address, "My nonorable and learned friend," is undergo ing contraction in favor of simply "The norable member." Mr. Gladstone is one of the few who adhere to the old style of address. Formerly the whips, on ascend ing the floor of the House, bowed three times to the chair. Now they straggle along, recognizing the Speaker or chairman of the committee with a familiar little nod. In fact, the old stateliness i evidently passing from the deportment of the House of Commons.

About Parliamentary Dress. "The change in the matter of dress,

writes a correspondent, "is especially marked. Saddening tweeds and slouch hats are now regarded as a matter of course, and a legislative epoch of white flannels and straw headgear is actually threatened. Only last night one of the smartest of the younger Tory members burst upon the House without a waistcoat, his coat being thrown open to reveal the blue shirt, with black silk cummerbund. The time was when such an apparition would have caused a sensation in the House, but nobody was disturbed by it last night."

While decadence in parliamentary manners may have been exmanners may have been exhibited on recent occasions, it is absurd to suggest that a movement in favor of common-sense summer clothing suggests retrograde action. A visitor to the British House of Commons on a warm summer day could not but see that in sticking by heavy broadcloth suit and tall hat the average British parliamentarian sacrificed comfort to appearance.

When the young Khedive of Egypt anmeed his intention to visit the Sultanhis nominal suzerain-a good many Englishscented danger to British interests, and they expressed an opinion that the ourney ought to be prevented. The visit was allowed, however, and the Khedive has was allowed, however, and the Khedive has returned to Egypt with increased wisdom, and possibly with decreased ambition. The English in Egypt have always treated him as a monarch, but in Constantinople, to his deep mortification, he was regarded as a mere wali or governor, and his pretensions to royal rank were studiously ignored. It suited the Sultan, for the moment, to play the English game, and he did so without the slightest reyard for the vain young vassal's feeiings. There is danger in this, for the exasperated Khedive may seek consolation in French sympathy. There is some reason to believe that he actually sought it before leaving Constantinople, in a secret interview with the secretary of the French Embassy, and that French help was promised to him whenever an opportune moment should come for throwing off the hated English yoke. Presumably, therefore, if the Siamese crisis should become scate, troubles will concurrently arise in Egypt.

It has been on the whole the gayest season the metropolis ever knew. The city was never so crowded, never so busy, and never so well entertained. The new flag will bear an imperial crown on a silver field, which will be encircled by a white band resting on red and black bands.

Want Denominational Teaching. The Tories have discovered in the educa-tional policy of the Government another excuse for wasting the time of the House of Commons. The education estimates will be introduced this week, and it is proposed to debate them at least two days. Mr. Acland, Minister of Education, is charged with deliberate intention to destroy voluntary or denominational schools and to replace them with "Godless" state schools. With this accusation as its basis the debate is likely to be an extremely bitter one, and the Tories will do their best to carry a vote of censure on the Government. They profess to expect the support of the Irish members, who mostly favor denominational education, but they will be disappointed. will be introduced this week, and it is pro




