





Papers on Prayer, Praise, Scripture Reading, and the Offertory-Interesting Opinions.

Church Service" was read by Mr. G. W. Armstrong. That we may praise aright, we must have some knowledge of the character of God. Sessions should exercise careful control of the selections used in the praise service. Members of the choir should be church members in full communion; voluntary service in the choir is preferable; re sponsive readings were advocated, and also regular readings of the decalogue. In the absence of Mr. Courtenay, Rev. Mr. Wilson, of King Street Church, opened the discussion. He did not think that we could expect those who had spent time and money on a musical education to give their services for nothing. Messrs. Robert Johnston, Andrew Thomson, E. H. Sawers and W. J. 




