Our guns have been busy nearly a fortnight. You will be pleased to hear they are performing splendidly. Firing is continuous and heavy night and day. did not take our gunners long to remove any misconception which the Huns may have possessed with regard to the efficiency of Canadian artillery. Everybody in fact is surprised at the excellency of the work; that is everybody except those who really knew of what our gunners were capable. Not only is their marksmanship excellent, but the behavior of the men is splendid. too. They go about their work as calmly and methodically as any veterans. Fire from German guns does not discon-

It was the first time a great majority of them had ever been in action, but the control they maintained over their horses was magnificent. The hospital cot on the left is occupied by James tons, owned by J. and P. EVIDENCE FROM CAPTAIN

First Footwear Received by Halifax Men Soon Wore Out.

Ottawa, March 17.-Captain Kaiser, of the 63rd Regiment, who had pre sided over a board of inquiry into the boots on McNab's Island, Halifax, on September 29, was the first witness called at the resumption of the parlamentary boot inquiry this morning. He testified that the boots which had been part of an issue of Gauthier boots had been served out on August 14, and had worn out under fairly heavy service, including trench digging, in two or three weeks. The witness said that a second issue of boots received on October 12 had proved satisfactory and, though they. received harder service than the first ones, had caused no complaints. 

Wheat flour is high and it's steadily going higher in price, but instead of worrying about the high cost of flour, the canny housewife supplies her family with graham bread, rice bread, whole wheat bread and other variations of the staff of life made from cheap but wholesome flour.

To make good bread one must have good flour that is fresh, clean flour, not necessarily the highest priced flour on the market, and the yeast, too, must be of good quality.

There are fifteen billion of yeast cells in a three-cent cake of yeast. Combine this yeast force with the proper [BY CAROLINE COE.]




