At that time she stood greatly in need of our trade favors; at the present time Canadian trade is much more of a consideration to us than our trade Dar-es- is to Canada-that is, if trade intercourse between the two countries suddenly came to an end, the Canadians would find it a much easier task to dispose in other markets of the surplus which they ordinarily send to this country than we should in the task of endeavoring to find customers for the goods which the Canadians had ceased to take. To gain this end the Canadians have had to pay large sums of money drawn from their taxes. That these payments have been made, and that they must be taken into account in any attempt that may be made to deflect trade into other channels, is something which firmly impresses itself upon the minds of those responnorthern neighbor.

Aside from its novelty there seems little to recommend endurance bowling. 

On arrival at Washington it was placed in the rotunda of the capitol, and then broke forth a storm of cratory, in which the work was most severely criticised and ridiculed. both as to its design and its execution.

To preserve it from injury during the winter it has been the custom for many years to erect over it a wooden house in the late fall.
