LONDONER WOUNDED The opening of the battle of Pinsk marks the second effort of the Russians after the long period of quiet which followed the revolution. The point selected for this attack is about 175 miles north of the sector in East Galicia along which the Russians made their first onslaught resulting in the capture of about 18,000 men in two days. Pinsk is at the mid-dle of the Russo-Galician battle line. There has been no heavy fighting in this region since the conclusion of the great Austro-German drive which began in the spring of 1915. During the summer the Russians were driven out Western Galicia, Poland, and most of the Baltic provinces. Pinsk was captured by the Germans on September 15, at the high tide of the Austro-German inva-Subsequently the Russians held up the Germans on the Riga front, and since that time the heaviest actions have been fought on the northern end of the line or in Galicia. Pinsk had a population of about 30,000 before the war. It lies within the great arsh and swamp region of White Rus-

Washington, July 7 .- All Germans formerly connected either with the German embassy or any one of the many consulates in America have been requested to leave the United States. Notification that their presence in America is undestrable has been sent to them by the state department.

WORKMAN STRUCK GLANCING BLOW BY LOCOMOTIVE


Thomas E. Mollett Thought Yard Engine On Outside

After Being Seriously Injured.

Thomas E. Mallett, 728 Queen's avenue, a G. T. R. car repairer, was struck by a yard engine just east of Egerton street at 11 o'clock today and sustained two broken ribs.

Mailett, in company with several other workmen, was gathering up material and tools along the switches when the yard engine, going east, approached. He was facing east at the time, and although he heard the warning whistle of the slowly-approaching locomotive, believed it to be on the tracks to the south of him. He stepped out a few feet, and the engineer, seeing he was clear, made no effort to stop. At that moment, just as the engine was a foot or so behind him, he stepped nearer the track and was struck a glancing blow and suffered the injuries above mentioned. He declined to go to the hospital, and was removed to his home, where his injuries were attended to by Dr. F. R. Clegg. He has been in the employ of the company for a number of years.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—Lord Northcliffe, head of the British missions in this country, today authorized publication of parts of a confidential speech on spies and censorship made to the National Press Club, July 4. He described the work of spies in England and the flood of fatal information that pours over the cables through neutral countries to Germany, and spoke of the dangers of any except technical military and naval censorship of the press. The address in part follows:

"We in England were loath to believe in the existence of an extensive address in part follows:

"We in England were loath to believe in the existence of an extensive German spy system in our midst until strange happenings by land and sea proved that their spy preparations, firmly establishd in England years before the war, were just as effective as all their other preparations.

"The German spies are divided into five or six classes, working independently of each other.

"There is the business spy, whose work is the gathering of information personal and otherwise. An establishment called "Schmmelpfennings" opened up in England, purporting to be something like your Bradstreet's or Dun's, but really with the object of ascertaining the capacity for making guns, munitions and what not of every plant in England, together with any other information that might be useful to Germany when she went to war.

"A second form of spying was organized by the German consuls in Great Britain, who collected information by means of hotel waiters, barbers, waitresses and governesses and domestic servants, to whom they paid comparatively small sums monthly.

Copenhagen, July 7 .- The Ekstrabla det and the Government organ Politiken supplies to Scandinavia and Holland, complain that the Entente powers with merica at the head lack appreciation of the difficult position of small neutrals | Special and proposed measures of the great powers fighting in the name of liberty justice and civilization are calculated to crush these small states whose sole desire is to maintain true neutrality toward both camps.

Judging from these newspaper reports, the situation is regarded as desperate. Neutrality, which time and again has been recognized by previous belligerents, no longer suffices, and with the entry of the United States into the war hostilities, the Politiken says, operated against the unfortunate small states. The paper says America seems to lack the most elementary appreciation of Denmark's difficulties. It says that articles from influential American papers indicate that the United States intends to force Denmark either to join Germany and starve, or join the Entente and share the fate of Belgium.


