Ottawa, March 15.--"One way in which to keep our country on its high level is to make a firm resolution that it shall be Canada first, Canada last and Canada all the time," declared Sir Wilfrid Laurier, leader of the Opposition in an address at an Irish concert last night.

The Liberal chieftain reviewed the Irish question briefly, and de-clared that John Redmond had died broken-hearted. Redmond had fol-lowed in the footsteps of Daniel O'Connell and Parnell, declared Sir Wilfrid, and had even succeeded in 1914 in having placed on the statute books of Great Britain a law for which O'Connell and Parnell had struggled, but failed to secure. The law was not put in force, however.

John Redmond's Glory. "Why was it held up" asked Sir Wilfrid. "It was not put into effect because some men under the guise of loyalty promised to bring

# MADE BY LONDON ELECTRIC CO.

Turns Down Proposals To Pur chase the Plant or Guarantee Revenue in Favor of Request To Ontario Power Commission For Power and Order From Dominion Controller To Keep Plant Running.

The special committee, dealing with the offer of the owners of the London Electric to sell the plant to the city or operate it for six months with a guaranteed gross revenue of \$12,000 a month, took only a short time to recommend filing the propositions. The Ontario Hydro Power Commission will be asked to furnish hydro power for the customers, and Sir Henry Draydon, power controller, will be asked to compel the company to operate the plant until such times as the customers can be taken care of,

"If the hydro can take core of the customers we need not waste a minute on that proposition," declared Ald. W. A. Wilson

"The propositions are three in unmber," continued the mayor. "The company will not lease the plant to us, so we need not consider that. The company will sell on the basis of arbitration values. This is out of the question. It is getting less than 2½ cents a kilo-watt and wants us to pay the and I cannot see those figures for a minute."







Even if they were not needed on their own farms, as long as they continued to farm, their exemptions would hold good, according to the authorities.





# The Dominion Income War Tax

## Its Meaning and Application

HE Dominion Income War Tax Act, passed at the last session of Parliament is now in force and all those liable to taxation under the provisions of the Act must file the required returns for the year 1917, on or before 31st March, 1918.

The Act provides that there shall be assessed, levied, and paid upon the 1917 income of every person residing or ordinarily resident in Canada, a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of unmarried persons and widows or widowers without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons.

Corporations and joint stock companies carrying on business in Canada, no matter how created or organized, shall pay the normal tax upon income over \$3000. The fiscal year of corporations and joint stock companies may be adopted if desired.

Your Immediate Obligation.—You are now required by law to fill out in triplicate, one or more of the five special forms enumerated below. Read the particulars about the forms provided, then note the form or forms that fit your case. Don't forget to make three copies. You keep one copy, and in the case of Forms T1 and T2, deliver two to the Inspector of Taxation for your district. In the case of Forms T3, T4 and T5, two copies must be filed with the Commissioner of Taxation at Ottawa.

Penalties.—Default in filing returns renders the person or persons liable on summary conviction to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day during which the default continues. Any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister of Finance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten thousand dollars or to six months imprisonment, or to both fine and imprisonment.

#### FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED

Individuals.—Form T1 is for all individuals having the requisite income. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3, make no marks on page 4.

In giving particulars of dividends received, state amount received from each company, listing Canadian and Foreign Companies separ-

Partnerships as such need not file returns, but the individuals forming the partnerships must.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies must fill in Form T2, showing total income. Amount paid during the year to Patriotic and Canadian Red Cross Funds, and other approved war funds, should be shown under Exemptions and Deductions. A financial statement should also be attached. In giving particulars of dividends received, state amount received from each Company, listing Canadian and Foreign Companies separately.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assigness use Form T3, to state particulars of the distribution of income from estates they are handling. A separate form is required for each estate and total incomes must be given as well as distribution thereof.

Employers. On Form T4 employers shall make a list of the names of employees and amounts paid to each in salaries, bonuses, commission, or other remuneration wherever the combined sum of such remuneration for the calendar year 1917 amounted to \$1000 or more. This applies to all classes, regardless of number of such employees.

Corporations Listing Shareholders. - Corporations and Joint Stock Companies shall list on Form T5 Shareholders residing in Canada to whom Dividends were paid during the calendar year 1917, stating the amounts of dividends and bonuses paid to each.

Don't wait till the last minute. Get the necessary forms now, and make your information accurate and complete.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Postage must be paid on all leiters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspector of Taxation.

And think what a fireless cooker would mean on a blistering hot day in summer!

Mrs. M. K., London, has recently invested in a fireless cooker, and is quite jubliant over its achievements and possibilities. "I can go in and play the plano," she says, "while the dinner goes on cooking, and never a thought of worry whether the soup is scorching, the vegetables boiling dry, or the meat needs basting. Our kitchen is heated by the furnace, so, of course, no other heat is required. I just chuckle over the saving in my fuel bills for cooking. When I want to heat the soap-stones for my fireless, I slip them into the furnace, and they are ready in next to no time with not an additional cent of outlay for heating them. Then I put them back in place, and everything is ready to put in the dinner or whatever other meal I am cooking. Last Sunday I went to church with the most serene mind. When I got home, there was a fine, hot dinner, awaiting the family, and no danger of fire or burning in my absence. The pot roast was done to perfection, and the baked potatoes were simply delicious.

"When it comes to making soup, there isn't anything too good that can be

said for the fireless, or for winter vegetables, like cabbages and turnips, which take a long time to cook. Cereals are absolutely perfect cooked in this way. Every grain of rice stands out by itself, every flake of oatmeal. You don' know how to properly appreciate cereals until you have eaten them prepared in a fireless cooker. Of course, like everything else, you have to learn how to se the cooker to best advantage. So far as my short experience goes, I do ot think I should use it for things requiring quick cooking like biscuits. But am going to try it for bread next week. To me, the advantages are that the freless cooker saves fuel, work, worry, cooks to perfection the things that require a good long time, and conserves all the flavor and food value. I conider my 'fireless' one of my most precious treasures."

#### "HEALTH FIRST."

From all directions come reports of the widespread influence of London's Child Welfare Exhibit some weeks ago. There has been a general awakening n London, as everybody knows, in regard to the necessity for saving little hem a chance to grow up healthy, robust, efficient citizens. It is gratifyin o the many who had a part in promoting the exhibit, and in making it a suc ess, to know that in a number of points in Western Ontario, consideration is eing given to holding a Child Welfare Exhibit, and also, in the not far distant future, organizing some kind of permanent work along these lines. A corespondent writes from Port Stanley that the young mothers from that district who took in their babies to the clinic on Western Ontario day, were delighted ighness of the examination given and suggestions made by t doctors in charge, concerning general care and feeding of the little ones. Child Welfare educational propaganda is placing a new ambition before parents for heir children, "Health First," with the promise, "And other things as required shall be added unto them."

#### A RED SEAL ON THE MAP.

It isn't an exaggerated statement to make that the eyes of Western Ontario, or at least an important part of Western Ontario, have been on London since the Child Welfare Exhibit, to see how London was going to follow it up. Just a month and a day from the time the first child clinic ever held in London was attended by more than one hundred bables, on the opening day of London's first Child Welfare Exhibit, a permanent clinic for sick and alling children of pre-school age was inaugurated by the London Child Welfare Association. This association has been organized, and started its work, all since the close of the exhibit on Saturday evening, February 16. For the present, the child clinic will be the chief feature of the work, and this will be held each Tuesday forenoon from 8:30 to 10:30 o'clock at Victoria Hospital for the present. On the very first day, 27 children were brought in, many of them suffering as a result of improper diet. The big rush of Tuesday to the clinic recalled vividly the daily rush of well babies and apparently well babies to the clinic of exhibit week. By the way, it was discovered that 75 per cent of those apparently well babies of the 500 or more taken for examination were suffering from more or less serious troubles, hernia, adenoids, tonsils, etc., which needed correcting o give a chance to the children to grow into vigorous boyhood and girlhood. The rapidity with which organization of permanent Child Welfare work has been launched in London has really been in the nature of a record-breaking feat. Miss Mary Power, director of the Bureau of Child Welfare of the wincial Board of Health, has written to the editor of this department as

"In our work, we are rather prepared to see any time from one year to five pass before any tangible results can be shown after the inauguration of a Child Welfare movement. The fact that London is inaugurating a Baby Clinic this month means a great deal. Of course, it also means a large red seal on the map in the western section of the province, in other words, on the county town of Middlesex."

It will be remembered by those who attended the Child Welfare Exhibit in London that a big map of the province with seals in three colors pasted at various points was a feature of the provincial exhibit. The seals in blue, maroon and, biggest of all, in red, represented municipally aided hospitals, medical inspection of schools, and permenent Child Welfare work in the points. at which they were pasted. In February, London had two seals, a maroon and a blue. In all the province, there were only three big red seals, in Hamilton, Toronto and Ottawa. And now London has a big red seal attached to that

London has the clinic, but the needs of the work, as demonstrated in the exhibit week clinic, and the first permanent clinic of Tuesday, indicate that work is required on a real grown-up sized scale, if it is to be adequate and

The very first clinic has raised the question of housing for the clinic and other work of the association, and pointed out the importance of obtaining as early as possible, at least one permanent nurse to follow up cases. The doctor on Tuesday told one young mother to give her baby an enema as a part of the treatment the little one required to restore it to health. She didn't know what this meant, but was timid about asking the doctor, and inquired as she was leaving of Mrs. Hill, the first vice-president, who made a

point of being present during the first clinic.
"We should have a nurse right now to follow up cases," said Mrs. Hill, as she related the incident afterwards. "We should have a nurse to go to the homes of the mothers within a day or so after the clinic, and explain to them the things they have failed to understand, teach them to properly prepare the baby's food where a change of diet or modification has been ordered by the

While there is genuine, pressing need of efficient Child Welfare work, it requires a certain amount of money to carry this on and provide for contingencies, notwithstanding free quarters at the present for clinics, and voluntary service of doctors and nurses for the clinic. The raising of this money to save the lives of the city's babies and to help them to grow up into strong, capable citizens is a problem which is facing the Child Welfare Association at the very inception of its work. Doesn't this service for the city's children seem as much the city's responsibility as keeping of sidewalks and pavements in condition and providing fire protection and park decoration?

#### WHERE THE CHILDREN CAN SERVE.

A nation-wide campaign is being organized in the United States to enrol the children, some 5,000,000 in all, in a food production army, to be known as the United States Gardening Association. Branches of the association will be formed cities and towns as well as in the rural districts. It is purposed through the association to supply the family of each member with vegetables, small fruits and eggs. The announcement was made of the plan a few days ago by the department of interior, which will take charge of organization in the cities, while the department of agriculture will look after organization in the farming

There is to be nothing hap-hazard or go-as-you-please, trust-to-luck about this plan. Forty thousand teachers will be in charge, and general superintendents are being appointed for the four or five districts, into which the country is being divided. Competitions will be arranged in the various districts, and prizes awarded to winners. Cardinal Gibbons has pledged the support of the parochial schools to the mayament. The members of this invention ford production arms. schools to the movement. The members of this juvenile food production army will be permitted to wear the insignia of the new service, "U. S. G. A.," which stands for "United States Gardening Association."

What about forming an order among the children gardeners of London this season, and seeing that their work is properly supervised?



# What Will Happen If Japan Intervenes In Russia

Delicate and momentous questions of Allied diplomacy charged with the gravest military possibilities are raised by the proposal that Japanese troops intervene in Siberia to save from Germany's clutches the great military stores accumulated at Vladivostok and along the Trans-Siberian railroad, and to forestall the German penetration of Asia.

Such intervention, of course, might produce friction, if not hostilities, between Japan and Russia, and Germany is quick to see the advantage, for it would soon lead, in the opinion of the Cologne Volkszeitung, either to a Russo-German agreement against Japan or to an undertaking between Japan and Germany. On the other hand, the Boston Transcript suggests that "perhaps Japan's sword will avail where America's pen has failed either to help Russia or hinder Germany's operations against Russia."





## ROSS MAJORITY STANDS AT 398 AFTER RECOUNT

Judge Refuses to Count Ballots Rejected According to Law.

IMPORTANT DECISION

Will Have Large Bearing on Other Cases Which Are Pending.

Duncan C. Ross, M. P., West Middleex, lost one vote as the result of the recount of votes cast in Canada in the recent elections, his majority standing at 398, not 399 as officially announced. One vote counted for Ross was thrown out by Judge Macbeth. It was marked for him, as well as the Labor party. As there was no labor candidate in his As there was no labor candidate in his riding, the vote was counted by the deputy, but Judge Macbeth ruled, inasmuch as there were two crosses on the ballot, it was a spoiled ballot. That reduced his majority by one.

However, that was not the game that George Elliott, the deleated candidate, was after. There were 109 military votes cast, which were not counted. They were rejected for several reasons. Some were thrown out because they were not sworm to by the deputy. Some were thrown out because they were not sworn to by the deputy. A large number were thrown out because the voter did not substantially conform to the law set out by the general returning officer, in answering certain questions, such as where the soldier resided, where he enlisted, and other like questions. Others were thrown out because they were not considered soldier ballots.

Were Not Counted. Were Not Counted.

The lawyers of George Elliott, W. A. Boys, M.P., Simcoe, and Edmund Meredith, K.C., asked the judge practically to allocate the ballots, not recount them. They wanted him to count these ballots, rejected on the law set out by the general returning officer. The latter had set out that uniess the ballots were properly indorsed, they could not be counted, and the deputies did not count them,

not be counted, and the deputies did not count them.

Judge Macbeth decided that he could not under the statutes deal with any-thing but the ballots placed in the boxes by the returning officers, the offi-cials of the Government. There was no authority, so far as he could find, for him to review the work of these depu-ties. The ballots had been disallowed by the officials of the Government, and he had no power to review their deby the officials of the Government, and he had no power to review their de-

The 109 votes in question were nearly all cast on this continent by the members of the Royal Flying Corps. That number certainly did not come from West Middlesex






