

JAPANESE POLICY AROUSES INTEREST

COMMISSION HAS SUFFERED NO DAMAGE
Hon. Adam Beck's Statement in Reply to Financial Post.

"No machinery has been finally taken over by the hydro electric commission; the apparatus in the stations is all under test, and should be ready to do the work required, or should be developed, it will have to be remedied or the machinery taken out of the stations, taking the power. For the last two weeks we have not had a single complaint from anybody anywhere."

"This is the answer that Hon. Adam Beck, chairman of the commission, gave in Toronto last night to criticisms made during the last few days of the Financial Post, that losses to machinery alone of \$100,000 had been sustained up to the present."

"During the test of the machinery installed in the stations and of the transformers and other apparatus put up along the line, there were a few defects found," Mr. Beck continued. "The damage sustained at the stations in this connection, however, was very, very small, trifling, in fact, and such as they were they fell on the companies organized to take the power. But where defects developed during the tests, the manufacturer, Mr. Beck added."

"At Berlin a month ago there was some interference with the transmission of power by a malicious nature; someone had thrown wires over the cable. This was remedied and we offered a reward for the culprit. That was all there was to that. There has also been some trouble in connection with operation at Stratford, which is a minor nature. We are always glad to hear of a genuine complaint," Mr. Beck added.

"Mr. Sotman, chief engineer of the commission, said that he could meet all the claims for damages to the hydro electric with the small change in his pocket," said a reporter.

SOUTH AFRICA RESENTS PARDON OF CRIMINAL
Gladstone Commuted Death Sentence of Woman-Assaulter.

London, Jan. 24.—Great excitement and resentment have been aroused in Rhodesia and South Africa generally, according to dispatches received here, on account of the Governor-General, Viscount Gladstone, commuting the death sentence passed on a native for a criminal assault on a white woman.

Influential members of protest have been held in Johannesburg, and a petition which Governor Gladstone's interference has been hotly denounced. For Viscount Gladstone, who is now on his way to London, it is said that he must have had special reasons for his action, that he only received the accused after consulting with the judges, and that in general he is entirely in agreement with his advisers in the question of the death penalty.

Gladstone's appointment as governor of United South Africa was not popular and it is probable that a strong agitation will be raised against him, based on the political feeling.

BUSY SESSION AHEAD FOR BRITISH HOUSE
All Time Until Easter Will Be Occupied With Government Affairs.

London, Jan. 24.—All the party leaders have issued letters calling their supporters to close attendance when Parliament meets on Feb. 6. It is the Government's intention to get the business disposed of before the coronation and this practically will complete the session of the House until Easter to Government business, and which will likely cause considerable grumbling among members anxious to push out their legislative program.

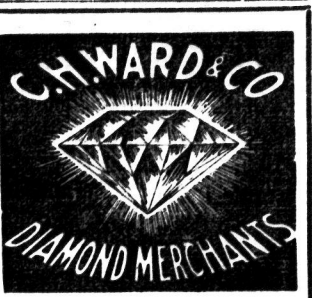

Ottawa, Jan. 24.—The House of Commons debated the following amendment to a motion to go into debate, moved by Mr. Richard Blain, of Peel:

Famous Surgeon's Optimistic View of Present Treatment.
London, Jan. 21.—For the twenty-ninth annual Bradshaw lecture, delivered at the Royal College of Surgeons on Wednesday, Sir Alfred Pearce Gould, K.C.V.O., senior surgeon to the Middlesex Hospital, chose the subject of cancer.
He pointed out that cancer occurred not only in all races of men, but in all vertebrate animals, birds, reptiles, and insects. He said that experiments upon mice, rats, and dogs had proved that it could be transferred from "host to host," but lowering above these facts the greater and all-important one, that cancer could not be transferred to an animal of another species.
The result of a breach or failure of fundamental cell law, a law so majestic that obedience to it results in the perfect development, health, and the full measure of days, and disobedience to it might slowly spell out all the inscrutable woes of cancer.
Certain conditions known to exert an influence on the causation of cancer were next dealt with, including the smaller shops in the suburbs and the attendant habits as regards alcohol. Statistics revealed the fact that cancer was twice as frequent among brewers and publicans as among other classes, and that the cancer incidence in any trade varied with the attendant habits as regards alcohol.
With regard to these various conditions, Sir Alfred expressed the opinion that clinical experience and experimental pathology threw some ray of hope across the dark sea of malignant disease.
Those who were studying the disease in mice reported that in these animals it was quite a frequent occurrence for a grafted cancerous growth, after attaining some size, to slowly shrink and disappear, and in some series of experiments a large proportion of the grafts that had spontaneously vanished.
In regard to various cases of cancer which he had treated at the Middlesex Hospital, he said, though in some of these cases the disease was not "cured" in the sense of being wholly and permanently removed, yet the patients were able to live for long periods of time, and he thought that the word "cure" could be justly used. In recording these cases he did not mention the treatments employed, because his present purpose was not to vaunt a

AUSTRIAN EMPEROR SAVING THE PENNIES
Reign of Economy Has Set In at the Court of Vienna.
London, Jan. 24.—A reign of economy has set in at the court of Vienna, the aged Emperor Francis Joseph is one of the most unpretentious of men, sleeps in a plain iron bedstead, and one of his oldest personal servants is credited with the remark that he "would undertake to cover the Emperor's daily expenses with 10 kroenas (\$242)."
And yet the Emperor spends millions of kronen every year, the Emperor's part of the cost of the Emperor's duties attached to his position as monarch. Far more than the smaller shops in the suburbs and the attendant habits as regards alcohol, the Emperor's household, Baron Wiclied, has been obliged to cancel many ancient privileges of the household staff.

In their different households these inquiries have been the province of the price of provisions and of the articles in daily use.
