REDS ARE ATTACKING POLES ALONG FRONT OF OVER 400 MILES

Bolsheviki Making Use of War **Material Taken From** Denekine.

FIGHTING FOR ROVNO

Place Is Being Stubbornly Defended by Polish Troops.

Warsaw, March 25.—Aftacks have been launched against the Polish line at scattered points along the front of The reds have been compelled to re-treat from several newly-acquired posi-tions along the front, but fighting still continues, the soviet troops using heavy artillery, tanks, armored cars and other apparatus captured from General Dene-kine on the south Russian front. Most severe fighting took place on uesday on the Polesian-Podolian front, near the Galician frontier, the Bolsheviki concentrating their attacks on this sector in an effort to capture Rovno, an important railroad centre, and Kamenetz-Podolsk, a city highly prized because of its strategic importance. Further north, in the region of Rzecycza and Kalenkowitz, northeast of Mozir, the enemy took several small villages which were recovered by the Poles after a day's fighting.

Heavy engagements are also reported in the vicinity of Zaslava, southeast of Rovno, and Staro-Konstantinov, where the Reds attempted to cross the Slutch River. East of Kamenetz-Fodolsk, the battle is still going on, both sides using artillery and bringing up reinforcements.

Rovno is particularly valuable to the Rovne is particularly valuable to the Poles, as through it runs the only railroad by which supplies can be shipped to the army along the southeastern front. In their drive again this city on Tuesday the Bolsheviki hurled two divisions into the battle in an attempt to outflank the Poles. Hand-to-hand fighting ensued in villages just to the east of the Slutch River, and the enemy was finally compelled to retire. He resumed the onsleaght, however, and the struggle is still going on in the the struggle is still going on in the vicinity of Bubar and Ostropol, where in spite of their use of heavy artillery in preparation for their assault, the Reds have not succeeded in crossing the Slutch.

THOMAS W. LAWSON ARRESTED OWING TO STOCK EXPLOITATION

Well-Known Broker Charged With Violating Massachusets Law.

PROMOTED "SILVERS"

Warrant Sworn Out by Order of the Attorney-General.

Boston, March 25.—The crusade of Attorney-General Allen against promoters and brokers who have been exploiting silver stocks led to the arrest of Thomas W. Lawson today. He surrendered himself at police headquarters to answer to a warrant charging him with violating on four counts a state law regarding the filing of information regarding stock issues. Four other operators and brokers were arrested yesterday, including L. C. VanRiper of New York, former secretary to Lawson. The latter is well-known in Canadian financial circles.

Lawson and VanRiper in recent months have been active in the promotion of silver stocks, which in the Lawson advertising were featured as "silvers, the greatest gamble of the age." Each announced he was developing certain individual silver mine properties as units of general-holding companies. In the campaigns the prices of individual stocks advanced from a few cents to \$8 and \$9, with subsequent reversals and fluctuations. After news of the arrests yesterday, these prices tumbled further. Nearly all the silver stocks which are named in the charges against Lawson, VanRiper and the other men, are now selling for so many cents a share.

It was the fact that securities were offered so cheaply, the attorney-general said in a statement yesterday, that attracted to them a class of persons without investing experience, who sacrificed Government bonds and savings accounts to obtain funds for stock purchases in hopes of early riches.

E. That in all policies of immigration to be adopted, encouragement should be

to be adopted, encouragement should be given to get the best type of immi-grants, such as the practical farmer and experienced mechanic, with particular preference to our comrades in arms in he imperial forces.

F. That the immigration act should

be amended, so as to debar from entry into Canada for 15 years any subjects of those countries with which we were at war during 1914-1919, and that a physical and mental educational test be instituted at the close of this period.

BUILDING SOCIETIES WERE FORERUNNERS OF LOAN COMPANIES

Maj. Cronyn Explains Method of Doing Business to Businessmen.

The loans and savings corporations of today followed the old English building societies to a great extent, Major Hume Cronyn stated last night, in a lecture at the businessmen's forum. The companies at that time were not allowed to borrow money and went on with their building on what capital they originally had.

The companies at present, he stated,

The companies at present, he stated, were allowed to borrow money through the issuing of debentures and also obtain money for use by the taking of deposits the same as a bank. They, however, differed from the bank in their ways of loaning money. While a bank could loan money on a personal note the loan company could not.

London, said Major Cronyn, was one of the most remarkable cities in the country for loan and mortgage companies. The reason given for this was the very rich district in which the city was situated. The farmers of the district who were borrowing money a great deal on their farms some fifteen years ago, were now loaning money to years ago, were now loaning money to the same companies they borrowed from at that time.

from at that time.

The western part of Ontario, the speaker said, was at one time "plastered" with mortgages, but had since been cleared up, and at present there were very few farms in the country surrounding London which had mortgages on them, as the people were too anxious to keep the farms and pay The fact that the farmers and the

owners of homes paid up made them the most desirable of the lot to lend to, said Major Cronyn, as the companies had very little trouble in collecting the interest and principal.

Scotland was one of the greatest countries in the world in which loaning of money was carried on most of it. countries in the world in which loaning of money was carried on, most of it being sent to Canada for Investment. Canada had for the last forty years had Scotland as one of her chief resources in the floating of money for loan and mortgage concerns. The theory to account for this was that Canada was considered a very safe place in which to invest money.







What About Sea Lords.

Admiral Jellicoe's report is more Canadian than the Canadians. He suggests a Canadian minister of the navy with a naval board of Canadian experts to advise him—the admiralty and the sea lords all over again. For people who have been obliged to drink so much water lately we know very little about the unstable element as a medium for floating battleships. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

CLASS 1 Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920:

Trustees, executors, administrators, agents and assignees must use Form

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5. NOTE.—Individuals comprising partership must file returns in their individual capacity on Form T 1 or T 1 A.



DR. MENZIES, FORMER AILSA CRAIG CITIZEN. MURDERED IN CHINA

Missionary Sent Out From Toronto Reported To Be Victim of Robbers.

Toronto, March 25.—Rev. James R. anzies, M.D., D.D., a Presbyterian issionary from Toronto, is reported to have been killed by robbers at Swait-ingseu, province of Szechwan, China, according to cabled advices received, here yesterday. No direct word of the tragedy has been received by Presby-terian missionary headquarters here, and there is a growing hope that some mistake has been made and that Dr. mistake has been made, and that Menzies is still safe and sound. Presbyterian officials cannot un stand how Dr. Menzies could have at Swaitingseu, a district looked by the Methodist Church of Car the way stational of Car by the Methodist Church of Canada. He was stationed at Hwalching Fu, in North Honan, which is upwards of 1,000 miles distant from the scene of the reported murder.

Dr. Menzies' wife and family reside at 32 Hampton avenue, Toronto. Until two years ago, Mrs. Menzies was in Honan with her husband. When her health broke down she came back to Toronto.

Born in Ailsa Craig.

James R. Menzies was born in Ailsa Craig, Ontario, and was a brother of Rev. George Menzies, M.D., who died at Mhow, Central India, in 1903. In 1895 he was graduated in medicine from Trinity University and in theology from Knox College.

Almost immediately after graduation Almost immediately after graduation he left with his bride for Honan, China, as a medical missionary, and has been there practically ever since. Dr. Menzies was the builder and architect of a flourishing mission, and was in China throughout the Boxer troubles.

Dr. Menzies is one of the hear harms. Dr. Menzies is one of the best-known of missionaries who have gone from Toronto. He was sent out by Bloor Street Presbyterian Church, and throughout his long years of service has been supported by the Bloor Street congregation. In April, 1918, Knox College conferred on him in absentia the degree of doctor of divinity. 


