

Loss of Life At San Antonio Due to Overflowing of River Banks, Is Estimated As High As 500-Cotton Crop of Windward Islands Destroyed by the Cyclone — Heavy Damage to Shipping in All Parts of West Indies—South Dakota and Nebraska Report Loss of Life and Property.

San Antonio, Texas, Sept. 10.-Six are known to be dead and coperty in the central portion of the city has been damaged to the extent of several millions of dollars by a flood which swept through San Antonio last night. Grain Shops Looted in Broad Daylight—Several Arrests

Made.

London, Sept. 9—(By Canadian Press)—Reuter's correspondent at Allahabad, India, received a telegram from Meerut, reporting that serious rioting, marked by wholesale looting of grain shops, had occurred in broad daylight in the bazaar. In the course of two hours the entire stocks were removed by hand and in carts. A similar outbreak occurred at the corn mills, where the losses are estimated at 400,000 rupees.

The trouble started when two grain merchants were arrested on a charge of swindling a purchaser. This aggravated the great hatred felt against merchants owing to the present shortage of grain. Several of the rioters were arrested later.







Irish names, heroic names, are emblazoned with British names on scrolls of honor throughout the Empire which they made together. Now in England and throughout the Empire, Irishmen hold high office, administer British laws and work in fellow service wherever the rule of the British race reaches.

But all that black nightmare has been lifted by the truce which gives us all a chance for looking forward to light instead of back to darkness. The offer made by Premier Lloyd George, not only formally, but in his speeches and letters is a great act of statesmanship, which expresses the spirit of the whole English people, and fulfills the hope of all lovers of liberty throughout the world.



Like other students of the course of events, Mr. Root has not failed to recognize that a type of exalted virtue fired by the Great War developed the illusion that a new and better world would spontaneously manifest itself. It is scarcely necessary to ask if that has been realized. Like a fierce summer storm the conflict temporarily cleared the air, but did not dissolve or regenerate the old elements that make for mischief. It did clarify conceptions of the savagery and futility of warfare, and that creates a hope that the Christian social or political conscience will crystallize itself in a

to shut one's eyes to the ugly fact that selfish interests sinful passions still hold an alarming sway. Mr. Root appears to have left his theme at that point, but the evils which he recognizes have their rootage in the unrenewed heart and mind, as the Scriptures repeatedly and explicitly teach. Penetrating all disguise or veneer, the old prophet records that "the heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked." The Redeemer Himself, in words of most uamistakable clarity, taught the disciples that the thoughts which defile and destroy proceed out of the heart, bearing the fruitage of lust and greed and murder. The evil bent is there, and mischief-makers are ready to equip it with weapons that promote dissensions, destruction and death. Speaking before the Canadian Club at Vancouver, B. C., Lord Northcliffe made use of a happily-inspired phrase when he indicated as a supreme task for good men everyhere the duty of disarming the minds of the people. Were that generally and sincerely undertaken through the church, the school and the press, the tasks of statesmen and the disarmament conference in November would be vastly simplified. But behind and underlying all pacific movements lies the individual mind and will, actuated too often by jealousy and avarice. In their character and conduct nations will not rise above the type of people who compose and lead them. Conse quently a solution of the ills afflicting mankind must be sought in a renewal of ideal and will, working out in truth, mercy and justice. Field Marshal Earl Haig, the renowned British commander, has declared "the Gospel of Christ is the world's only social hope, and sole promise of world peace." The reason for this is that it reaches the individual life. Human nature self-regeneration. Even the mighty St. Paul realized after Paul Potter, exclaimed: "I see the bull all right; that he only became qualified to achieve in his moral undertakings through Christ, who strengthened him. "Be ye transformed by the renewing of your minds," was his inspiring message to others. The problem at last resolves itself into a spiritual one. The present generation has learned at a fearful cost never before approached that the Christian spirit must be evoked, and the rule of the Divine Peacemaker of Nazareth assume its rightful place in the councils of the nations. Then will be realized the vision of old: "Mercy and truth are met together; righteousness and peace have kissed each other."

EARLY THEORY OF PRODUCTION

OF PEARLS. The earliest theory of the production f pearls was that they were congealed dew-drops. Another notion was that pearls were the eggs of oysters. The Chinese solved the problem and found that pearls are due to the irritation roduced by the introduction of a foreign matter, such as a grain of sand, into the shell of the oyster. This bit of matter is coated by the oyster with nacre like that with which the shell is lined, and the result is a pearl.

The Chinese and Japanese carry on the artificial production of pearls to a considerable extent. The shells of the bivalve are separated gently and a small bit of mud of a tiny piece of lead is inserted under the flesh to serve as a nucleus for the pearl. The shell then closes and the oyster is placed care-fully in a stream of water and fed on manure. After an interval of four years the shells are opened and the uclei-coated with nacre, are remove Pearls produced in this way are gen-uine and wholly natural. He marked them all to ascertain whether the birds actually return to the same spots year after year. It is believed that they do, though the haphazard placing of the nests would hazard placing of the nests would seem to be against it. But this belief is only one of several that are amazing.

For instance, in the fall the gulls hatched that year emigrate and do not return. One of the old birds escorts the new colony to its section of coast, and then comes back alone.
