



Recommendations made by the special health survey committee appointed by the board of education with regard to the medical examination of public schools received the unanimous indorsation of that body yesterday afternoon.

The committee, under Trustee Rev. R. D. Mess as chairman, recommended that the plan suggested by the Western Ontario Academy of medi-cine be given a year's trial, begin-ning with the school year next Sep-

ember. The plan advanced by the academy embraces the voluntary examination of each child by the family physician upon admission to school. The examination will be performed by the members of the academy at the nominal fee of \$1, which fee will

be paid by the board.

In each case the results and infor-nation secured from the examination

mation secured from the examination will be recorded on standard forms supplied by the board and will be kept on file for future reference.

The academy of medicine is to be asked also to appeint a standing committee from among its members to act in a consultative capacity in cooperation with the board in all work work pertaining to the medical inspection of the pupils of the public schools.







SETTELL IS SENTENCED TO SERVE THREE YEARS

Former Private Secretary To Sir Adam Beck Is Found Guilty of Attempting To Steal \$30,000 From Hydro Commission-Goes To Portsmouth Penitentiary.

ORIGINAL CHARGE IS REDUCED BY JURY

Canadian Press Despate Hamilton, Dec. 4.-Found guilty by a jury under Judge Evans on a charge of attempting to steal \$29,925, the property of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, after his counsel, R. H. Greer, K.C., of Toronto, had pleaded for his freedom on the grounds that he had "boozed, boozed, boozed" and given his mind, time, body "and even his soul" for hydro, E. Clarence Settell, former secretary to Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Ontario hydro-electric commission, was late this afternoon sentenced to three years in the Portsmouth penitentiary.

The term will date from October 3, when he was arrested while attempting to cross the border at Niagara Falls, after cashing the hydro check for \$29,925 at Hamilton, on the pretence that he was to pay for a right-of-way for the commission. •

Reduces Charge.

The jury reduced the charge from that of "theft" to "attempted theft," which Judge Evans declared was quite within their rights, and which he said, in his opinion, was a reasonable and lenient view to take. Settell was unmoved when sentence was passed. He clasped the hand of Mr.

Greer warmly and thanked him for his efforts in his behalf.

Settell told of his connection with the hydro and of his plans to start a new life in South America when the trial resumed this morning, and the defence closed its case about noon. trial resumed this morning, and the defence closed its case about noon. Crown Attorney Sillard and Defence Counsel Greer afterwards addressed the jury, and the judge finished his charge at 4:15. After being out almost two hours, the jury returned its verdict of guilty of attempted steeling.

Money Recovered.

Mr. Greer addressed the judge before sentence was bassed. He remarked that the case was a rathe unusual one as all facts in connection with it had been made available and submitted to the jury for consideration, and asked the judge to consider that Settell had been in custody since Oct. 3 and that the money had been fully recovered.
