POPE'S POSITION AS TO CONCORDAT

Declares France Has Broken Faith. But Hopes for a Reconciliation.

Rome, Nov. 14.-In the secret con sistory the Pope delivered an allocution recalling the origin of the con cordat and the reasons which induced Pope Pius VII. to conclude it with Napoleon, especially referring to the provisions made for the appointment of bishops, the budget of the ministry of public worship, which was regulated by what was practically a contract, and, finally, the free exercise of Catholie worship. He added that the so-called organic articles added in 1802 by Napoleon had never been recognized by the Holy See, either as law or as being part of the concordat. Therefore the Pontiff deplored the fact that the present Government of the French Republic had under various pretexts charged the Holy See with not having observed the concordat, adding that the church had never in the case of any country infringed an agreement made. The Pope concluded with saying that the French Government had broken the fundamental conditions of the concordat, a proceeding which was not only in violation of the concordat. but which was also opposed to divine and natural law. The Pope complained of the impossibility, due to the existing state of affairs, of appointing bishops to the vacant sees in France, but expressed the hope that an understanding would be reached.



The concert, which was to have been held in the Auditorium, was at the last changed to the Masonic

Temple, it having, unfortunately, not received the patronage that was reasonably expected. The audience, though small, was cultured, and in sympathy with artists, and the Woman's Music Club may be assured of the artistic if not the financial success of their under-

Mr. Martin, as a pianist, has occupied a position by himself in this vicinty for some years. Perhaps none has attained to the position of virtuoso which Mr. Martin has held since his arrival from Leipsiz, and he is one of the few purely concert planists in Western Ontario. His work last night was exacting in

both technique and temperament, and the test was well met. His touch was as powerful as of old, his velocity work, in both scale and octave, clear and accurate, and his climaxes proportionate and convincing. Two points may have been noted by

his admirers, viz.: That his touch was not as delicate as his previous work has led to be expected, and in the Chopin numbers, the interpretation was st'ff and constrained, something that certainly cannot be described as habitual on Mr. Martin's part. All the way through he did not come up to his own standard set in previous recitals. and his many friends in the audience were correspondingly disappointed. It is an undoubted advantage to have

This is the secret of his popularity here, and all are interested in his Lizst effort to maintain his executive perfection amid the cares of teaching. Mrs. Bollman was very quickly in sympathy with what was a strange audience to her. Her soprano is clear, almost flute-like in the upper register, powerful from third spare C upwards, but not at all below.

She belongs to a type rather rare in Canada, perhaps best illustrated by Mrs. Caldwell, well known here, but a type more common in larger centers. Her forte is coloratura work, arias of the older style represented by such as Strauss "O, Had I Jubal's Lyre," and the more brilliant songs of the nineteenth century Italian school. Her singing was a good illustration of perfection in a principle that is taught to a great extent right in our

own city, and taught in too many cases, to an injudicious extent. A great part of the cadenzas, etc., to be found in this class of songs is pure and simple vocalization, and it is this idea of vocalization on the straight vowels, oh, ah and aw, that leads to imperfect articulation, and, in the constant striving for a sweet tone, to a lack of confidence and support that eliminates the possibility of proper resonance and timbre, and, in some

eses even, proper placing, Mrs. Bollman, of course, made an art of her cadenzas, runs and arpezzios, but even with her, the before-mentioned possibility of indistinct articulation was realized to some extent. The proper combination of consonant with vowel in study work is the "means of grace" in such cases-a point which should not be overlooked by either pupils or teachers.

But not to stray from the artiste, her gracious personality, charm of manner and the beauty she sang into every run, captivated the audience. who were insistent on a recall, toward the end of the programme. By unanimous applause, she repeated her last number, Mozart's Short Aria from Der Zauberflote," which was sung simply faultlessly.

On its repetition, in a moment of abstraction, the solist sang a high, sustained note at the close of the aria. entirely out of the key.
