NEWS OF PEACE, which has arrived over cable, appears to b quite reliable and the conditions of surrender by the Boers are practically unconditional, with liberty to them to retain their guns for their protection against natives and wild animals.

The British Empire should be perfectly satisfied with such a great victory, notwithstanding that the accomplishment of it was brought about by the loss of so many lives and at such great expense.

15. If any person hereby disqualified, or declared ineligible, or incapable of being elected a member of the legislative assembly is nevertheless elected and returned as a member his election and return shall be null and void.

The Swedish strike has been com pletely successful. Stockholm has resumed its wanted aspect of watery beauty and peace, and universal suffrage is assured. But this is, it seems to us only the minor part of a great achievement. The Swedes have really done a great deal more than alter the list of voters of their native land; they have discovered a new political weapon of tremendous and incalculable force. This is not the less true because they do not seem fully to have recognized it themselves. It happened thus: Following the example of Belgium, which still sighs in vain for what the Swedes have won, the brave men of Stockholm decided to do no more work until they had gained a redress of grievances. So the big factories which are dotted among the islands of Northern Venice, were deserted. Still parliament would not give in. Then the carrying companies stopped work, but without success. After a space of waiting the street cars decided that they, too, had political aspirations, and ceased to run It was in vain. Finally, all unexpected, came the decisive blow; the printers went out-including the men who in times of peace, printed the parliamentary debates. Then the legislators came to order. If one's speeches were not to be printed, what was the use of speaking against universal suffrage; what was the use of being a legislator; what was the use of anything? So they faced the prospect with despair, and then suddenly gave in. Sweden has universal suffrage and a new and tremendous instrument, of popular right has emerge into the light of the modern world.

The preparation of dried dates is carried on largely at Awabi, and as the season had now commenced I took the opportunity to observe the process and was taken round the factories by the sheik. The dates selected are picked before they are quite ripe. The factory had a chimney about fifteen feet high and contained several open, circular, copper boilers, capable of holding five gallens each and nearly full of water. Into these vessels the dates are put and allowed to simmer over a slow fire. As the water in the copper decreased from evaporation it was filled up again, but it gradually became inspissated by the extraction of the juice of the date. The fruit is left in the water about half an hour and is then taken out and spread on mats or cloths in the sun to dry, after which it becomes hard and of a pale red color. It is exported in large quantities from Muskat to India.



up as a money-lender at the sign of the "Red Shield" (Rothschild) in the Cassel, were so profitable that when he and Naples, each being in charge of

one of the sons. The third of these brothers, Nath in Mayer, has generally been regarded as the financial genius of the family and the chief originator of the transactions which have created for the house its unexampled position in the financial world. He came to Manchester about 1800 to act as a purchaser of manufactured goods for his father; but at the end of five years he removed to Lon-don, where he found full scope for his financial genius. The boldness and skill of his transactions, which caused him at first to be regarded as rash and unsafe by the leading banking firms and financial merchants, latterly awakened their admiration and envy. By the employment of carrier-pigeons and fast-sailing boats of his own for the transmission of news, he was able to utilize to the best advantage his spe-cial sources of information, while no one was a greater adept in the art of promoting the rise and tall of the stocks.

The colossal influence of the house dates from an operation of his in 1810. In that year Wellington made some drafts which the English Government could not meet; these were purchased by Rothschild at a liberal discount, and renewed to the Government, which finally redeemed at par. From this time the house became associated with the allied powers in the struggle against Napoleon, it being chiefly through it that they were able to ne-gotiate loans to carry on the war. Rothschild never lost faith in the ultimate overthrow of Napoleon, his all being virtually staked on the issue of the contest. He is said to have been present at the Battle of Waterloo, and to have watched the varying fortunes of the day with feverish eagerness. Being able to transmit to London private information of the allied success several hours pressed on account of the news of

Blucher's defeat two days previous. Rothschild was the first to popularize foreign loans in Britain by fixing the rate in sterling money and making the dividends payable in London and not in foreign capitals. Latterly he became the financial agent of nearly every civilized government. It is said that since 1815 the Rothschilds have raised for Great Britain alone more than \$1,000,000,000; for Austria, \$250,000,-000; for Prussla, \$200,000,000; for France, \$400,000,000; for Italy, \$300,000,000; for Russia, \$125,000,000; for Brazil, \$70,000,-

In 1895 they took \$15,000,000 of the February loan of the United States through the Belmont-Morgan syndi-

There are at present living eleven-barons of the Rothschild name. Of these Nathaniel, Alfred and Leopold are located in London; Gustav, Edward, Adolphe and James are in Paris, and, Nathaniel, a baron of the Austrian Empire, is head of the house in

Vienna.

"Maintaining an identity as un-changeable as the Hebrew race to which they belong, and with purposes as inflexible as the ruler of Russia, and a policy as far-seeing as the Church of Rome," says the "Bankers" Magazine," "the Rothschilds have steadily built up the prestige of their name until it now outranks that of any other, while their fortune has grown year by year until it has attained to colossal figures. Those who have a talent for guessing have set the actual sum at two thousand million dollars, but until some member of the firm dis-plays a confidential mood, the correctness of this conjecture must remain unverified. Whatever the amount may be, its vastness is undoubted, and the accumulations of a century and a half are being sweiled each hour by innumerable tributes from every quarter of the world."

One of the most curious features of the war is the remarkable way in which he has deepened the awesom respect, akin to fear, with which the British nation regards him. His laconic reports, and his utterly independent prosecution of the campaign in South Africa, has hugely heightened his military reputation. Yet he is univers ally admitted to have next to nothing in common with his countrymen or their government. As Lord Kitch-ener's star has ascended, so has Lord Roberts' descended. The genial optimism of the now commander-in-chief, so bitterly grates upon a people severely over-taxed for the war which he long ago declared finished, that the spontaneous popularity which made him the hero of the jubilee procession will not be repeated at the coronation. Lord Milner may or may not have played an important part in the peace negotiations, but popular and political opinions assign to the ex-Sirdar of the Egyptian forces the bringing about of the present negotiations. A larger measure of good faith than the Boer warriors, brave and resourceful as they are, have justified is requi-site before the shattered commandoes site before the shattered commandoes and roving bands of guerillas can be allowed to disperse with arms in their hands, even if the horses are taken away from them.
