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
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
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

## DISTRICT OF WEST YORK

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge Loyal True Blues, now in session assembled:—

Most Worshipful Sir, Sisters and Brethren—I beg leave to tender you my third annual report as D. D. G. M., for West York.

I regret that I cannot report very prosperous conditions in this district as a whole, for while we find one lodge in a very prosperous condition we find another just the opposite and gradually going out of existence altogether; as for the cause I am at a loss to fully explain. I think there are many reasons that could be reasonably given as having had a tendency to stay the progress that should be the lot of such an association as ours; some of which I might make mention before closing my report. There are at the present time seven lodges representing the district, last year there were eight, and that number remained until March 10, 1905, when an amalgamation was effected upon which, results are to be seen.

Victoria Coronation No. 1.—The oldest Lady Lodge, with Sister Mrs. Brooks in the presiding chair, has not made the progress which the efforts of the mistress entitled the Lodge to. One thing which seemed to have had a bad effect was when the new Benefit Rates came into force; some of the members would not give it the consideration it deserved and thereby dropped out of the Lodge entirely.

Maiden City No. 7.—This Lodge is certainly in a very bad condition the members of which seem to show but very little interest in it, and some none whatever. I am given to understand by some they have not had a meeting for about six months. I have gone four times in succession to their lodge room on their meeting night (which is once a month) and have not found anyone there. It is too bad that such conditions exist. I am also given to understand that some of the members are paying the assessments direct to the Grand Secretary and have been for some time. I think that something should be done in the matter, some of the members have complained to me that though they claim to be straight on the books still they are unable to participate in all the benefits, not having had the semi-annual for a year cannot visit any other lodge. I suppose it must take all the money they pay in to meet expenses, and likely carry members they should not. I think this matter should be looked into by this Grand Lodge. The Grand Secretary, no doubt, can give some information as to their financial standing with the Grand Lodge.

Eldon Lodge No. 9.—This Lodge is working under a charter granted in March of this year and is a mixed Lodge, being an amalgamation of Lady Eldon No. 9, and Diamond No. 59, male Lodge, and, although some members of other lodges felt at the time that the amalgamation should not be allowed, and were prepared to dispute the action taken as unconstitutional, I can see no clause in the constitution to forbid the same, and am firmly convinced that the amalgamation is in the interest of the association, it was a means of saving to the association members who would otherwise have left it altogether, for, I might say the members of Diamond Lodge were considering disbanding, as they

were unable to make any progress. Although a membership of about thirty still more money was necessary than was received in dues to keep the Lodge going. That Eldon Lodge is progressing is but a mild expression. Since amalgamation seven members have been initiated. The full membership is 126; 98 ladies and 28 male members. This Lodge has the largest attendance of any Lodge in the city. We deeply regret the loss of the W. M. of this Lodge, the late Sister Mrs. Lillie White, one whose heart was thoroughly interested in the Order. By her loss the association loses one of its most earnest and cheerful workers and one who commanded the highest respect of all with whom she came in contact.

Lady Rossmore No. 23—Under the guidance of the W. M. Sister Mrs. Winfield, is steadily persevering and that she enjoys the confidence and respect of all the members is but to put it mildly. Sister Winfield is thoroughly business-like in all her methods, and their meetings are always interesting and well attended.

Duke of York No. 31—Held at Toronto Junction. This Lodge has been in a rather critical condition, owing to neglect of duty of some of the officers, who are now suspended; but I think now under the guidance of Brother Harrison, and the faithful few, they will once more advance to the front rank.

Duchess of York No. 38—Is in good condition and the W. M. Sister Mrs. Connolly, commands the confidence and respect of all the members. This Lodge is steadily progressing.

During the year I have visited the lodges as often as possible and have always been received in a most cordial manner.

Trusting this report will meet with your approval, and that your deliberations will be crowned with success in the cause of True Bluism and our Orphanage, I remain

### Grand Master's Address

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of the Loyal True Blue Association, now assembled:—

Dear Sisters and Brethren—In accordance with the annual custom of our Association, we are met together at the close of another year's labor in behalf of our cause. We are here to review and confirm the record of the work accomplished and thus add a few more pages to the history of Loyal True Blueism.

We are assembled to-day in a city which has contributed largely to the success of our institution, the place of its birth, where many fond associations remind us of the work of its pioneers. Here it was our first lady lodge was instituted, and to this may be traced the widespread popularity of our Order. Here it was that our charitable work in the interest of the orphan began, giving such an impetus to the society as to place it in the forefront as a useful Protestant movement. Thus this beautiful and progressive City of Toronto becomes to us one of our hallowed spots because it is not only the birth-place but the cradle of True Blueism.

We rejoice in meeting here from far away places, bringing with us a representative force of the power for good which Toronto's faithful of years gone by set in motion throughout fair Canada. Occasions such as the present should remind us of how swiftly the pendulum of time swings, as it marks the days of each ascending year which calls us together in annual session. Individually we have cause to return thanks to our Heavenly Father, who has again permitted us to clasp the hand of co-workers with whom we have labored so many years for the advancement of a cause which has the approval of Him who is our Divine Leader and Master. As an Association, we can rejoice in the knowledge that our work has not only had Divine approval, but that all things needed for the successful carrying on of the duties we have assumed in the Master's name have been provided. For these and all other blessings we owe thanks to Him who holds the universe in His grasp. In token of our appreciation of all these benedictions it behooves us to press onward to the high mark of our calling, and with all the energy and force with which we are endowed bring out the highest and best possible results in the interest of Protestant orphans.

## A Year's Work

While it is my duty to place before you a report of my official acts, along with that of my fellow-officers, for the past year, a still greater duty devolves upon you, who will sit in judgment and render a verdict as to the claims your executives have in meriting the honors you conferred upon them.

In reviewing the reports of your official leaders, it would be well to retrace our footsteps to the starting point of this year's journey, which has led us to centre here to-day. When the gavel sounded at the close of our last Grand Lodge meeting, at your order I assumed command with a full knowledge of the responsibility attached to the position you honored me with. During this time I have conscientiously endeavored to direct the forces under my charge. What degree of success I have attained in the performance of my duties will be revealed to you as the session advances and other office-bearers present their reports. As you proceed to review the evidences of prosperity which have attended our efforts, you will also be called to pass judgment upon any acts of mine and those associated with me which may have in any way retarded the progress of our Association.

## Private Members Have Done Well

In this duty which now rests upon you, it may be well to make an individual inspection of each office-bearer's record, and thus place responsibility and honor where they rightly belong, both for retrogression and progression in the various departments of our work. In every part of our wide field there are those whose loyalty and devotion to the cause never wanes, while on the other hand, it needs continuous urging on men to do the part of the work assigned to them. Every organization experiences the same drawback, but we cannot afford to overlook it. It is easy to ascertain to what extent the weapons of each office have been used in the battle of a year of victory and in the strengthening of our resources. Personally, I am prepared to attribute our success to those who have diligently marched in the front ranks of the home guard, that is, in the private lodges of our Association, whether these men or women were Grand Lodge officers or attached simply to the rank and file, "By their fruit ye shall know them," and according to their work should they be elevated to positions of honor where their usefulness can more fully redound to the success of our beloved Order.

The failures, if any are indiscernible, that may have retarded our progress I attribute to lack of energy on the part of those who stand ever ready to rejoice with the victors, and claim the laurels won without their aid, and who at the same time stand ready to condemn where failures are visible, failures which they themselves may have assisted to bring about, because of their indifference or lack of loyalty to those in command. In this there is food for thought. As you sum up the individual acts of a year's service, complete in behalf of the Association generally, by those who have directed its affairs during the past year, glance if you will along the hedgerows which proved barriers, but see beyond and above these the sturdy oaks, that neither the fierce winds of opposition nor the pessimistic sheets can move. True Blueism has its mighty oaks, and perhaps its crackling timbers, too.

### The Present Duty First

The future prosperity of our cause and the destiny of our Association is in your hands to-day, therefore, I would urge upon you who are here representing the men and women banded together in all parts of this fair Dominion, to attend strictly to the duties of the present. All matters placed before you should have your careful consideration before acted upon, so that the future interest and welfare of our Order may reap the results of your carefully laid plans in the building of this great super-structure which rests upon the foundation of charity, and rears itself in humble submission to Him for whose glory it exalts, to a place high among our sister institutions. Let us labor in love and unity to preserve this monument, which reminds us of the faithful toilers of the past, and around which ever was, and can still be found some of the most stalwart toilers in the cause of Protestantism.

### Imperial Protestant Federation

This organization with which we are identified continues in its work uniting all Protestant bodies within the British Empire into one grand federation, so that we may co-operate with each other and show a united front whenever the religious liberties and freedom we now enjoy are molested. The watchfulness of this organization has been a source of strength to Protestantism. A large amount of valuable literature is freely distributed each year which makes known to the inactive and sleeping Protestant the necessity of guarding every position we now occupy so that we may hand down to those who follow the banner of truth and justice, which protects all in the enjoyment of their religious rights. In the accomplishment of so great a work for the good of our common cause the Imperial Protestant Federation is deserving of our sympathy and financial support. A small contribution given annually by every member would not be missed by us, but would be very noticeable in its great usefulness in the hands of the Federation. Let us, in a practical way, show our interest in this movement.

### Autonomy Bills

These bills have been so freely discussed in the House of Commons, and in public, that it is unnecessary for me to add anything to what has been already said in condemnation of the educational clauses contained therein and passed by the Parliament of Canada, forcing a Separate School System upon the new Western Provinces, seeking to divide a truly loyal and British colony.

As an association the future prosperity of the Dominion should be ever uppermost in our minds. Any system which will cause separation of the rising generation, be it educational or otherwise, is a detriment to the British Empire, and a kindling of hatred towards each other which cannot but work irreparable injury to any people or nation. Let us assist in sending men to Parliament who are fearless of political parties, or party leaders, men who have been tested and have only the interest and future good of our country at heart, men who are ready to do justice to the people whom they represent, men who will defend the rights of others and who are willing to abolish the special privilege system. Let our motto be, One Public School System, binding together the national life of our people, one flag and one language.

age, in which we can all unite in singing "God Save Our King." I am firmly convinced that this is your determination and the fixed principle of thousands of loyal Canadians.

#### A Year of Prosperity

We cannot but mark our success and advancement as an association. Since we last met we have experienced greater progress than in the previous year. More new lodges have been organized, and more activity has been displayed among many of our private lodges. The establishment of our society in Newfoundland is the accomplishment of an effort earnestly put forth during my term of office. This opens up to us a new field of labor, we are positively assured that the infant of our beloved Order in this British Island will develop into a mighty giant of strength supporting us in all our undertakings. To Bro. Daniel MacDougall, of Glace Bay, N. S., our worthy and highly esteemed D.D.G.M., must the honor be awarded as the pioneer of the coming forces of Newfoundland, the first advance guard of which to-day we welcome into our ranks. All these have tended to increase our membership and strengthen us for the work in hand. A fuller and more detailed report of the success attained, and financial standing, will be laid before you in the statements to be presented by your Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer, which will reveal to you a healthy condition in every department.

#### Routine Work

These duties during the year have been performed by me with an earnest desire to accomplish something that would be lasting and beneficial to the future of our cause, measuring and squaring all my acts by the rules and regulations governing them.

Many questions relative to the proper interpretation of our constitution have been referred to me. In replying to these I have honestly endeavored to give my rulings in keeping with what I considered the true spirit and letter of our constitution and laws. As usual, many requests for dispensations have been made, and only such as were in the very best interests of the lodge, as well as our Association generally, were granted.

#### Appeals

Two appeals against the decision of subordinate officers have been submitted to me during the year. In the rendering of judgment I have conscientiously and fearlessly endeavored to do justice to all concerned. However, one appeal has been made against my decision to this Grand Lodge, the facts in connection with this matter I have placed in the hands of the Grand Lodge for your consideration.

The correspondence attached to my duties has been greater and more trying at times, than any year during my stewardship. I have endeavored to be prompt in replying to letters that contained matters of importance needing immediate attention. Many letters received contained complaints of various kinds. In most cases these had references to misunderstandings between members and lodges. The need of very careful consideration and thought made it impossible to reply to some of these as promptly as desired.

I am of the opinion that if selfishness and jealousy on the part of the members could be overcome, and a more fraternal spirit cultivated, many of the petty disputes arising among members, which are placed before your Grand Master, might be confined to the private lodges and settled satisfactorily there. This would relieve your executive head of much unnecessary worry. Let me therefore admonish you to counsel together in the spirit of fraternal love, and when disputes arise to work together in peace and unity until they are cleared away.

#### Suspensions and Expulsions

While there are many suspensions and expulsions reported each year for various causes, I think that in many cases a good deal of irregularities are practised in the conducting of trials, where charges are preferred against members for violation of their obligation and laws. During the past year I have felt that more definite knowledge should be given this Grand Lodge, as to how trials are conducted, whereby steps could be taken by your Grand Lodge officers to protect members against illegal suspension and expulsion. I strongly recommend that where members are tried for violation of obligation and laws that a copy of the charge, together with the evidence, be placed in the hands of the Grand Executive, to be reported on at such annual session.

#### The Orphanage Work

Our Orphanage has again had a full year of prosperity, and much good has been accomplished through this branch of our work. The number of children rescued and protected in the interest of Protestantism will be reported through the Board of Management. By fire we sustained a heavy loss in the total destruction of the tenant house occupied by our caretaker, but, fortunately, the building was partially covered by insurance. The re-building of this will be a matter for your consideration.

A more systematic means of raising funds for the carrying on of our Orphanage work would also be worthy of your attention. While our receipts have not been equal to that of last year, there is no reason for discouragement or alarm, as this slight falling away of receipts is only temporary, and can be traced to various causes. Upon a thorough investigation these causes will become apparent to all, and with united loyalty and energy a remedy can be provided by you at this meeting whereby the donations may be increased year by year. Had we reported a deficit in connection with our child-saving movement, I would still urge upon you the belief held by me throughout my association with you in this work, that we will never lack anything needful for the successful carrying on of this Christlike mission. Therefore, with faith in our Divine Leader, let us labor on with unselfish and devoted interest to the orphan children of our land, and let us continue to extend the hand of assistance to every child requiring our care and protection.

#### General Support

A society engaged in work of this kind, carrying true Christian charity outside its own little circle of membership and not permitting selfishness to stand between us and duty in the alleviation of suffering

humanity, must eventually command the sympathy and financial support of all charitably inclined people.

Again, we have good reason to thank our many liberal contributors and supporters. The Loyal Orange Association has not been unmindful of the little ones under our charge, they have liberally rendered us their assistance. For their open hands and loyal hearts we are truly grateful. The Protestant public has not forgotten us and many expressions of sympathy have been demonstrated in a practical manner during the year by the gift received at their hands. The members of our Order are ever on the alert to work and give, and never before have our earnest members been more faithful than during the year just closed. All should share in the work and not allow the faithful ones ever to carry this banner of love along. It is an honor, a glory, and a duty, in which we all should share, for our life is the greatest blessing in being another's burden bearer.

#### Over the Jordan

Many brave men have passed since we last assembled, but not one braver or greater than the man who for years heralded the work of True Blueism and stamped it with his approval. His admiration and love for the True Blue Home flowed through his heart from his own pen, and his well-wishes were carried to every corner of the British Empire, and beyond its wide sphere, through that Messenger which for many years he fearlessly yet lovingly edited in the interest of our religion and our cause. If we have not been successful in accomplishing what was justly expected of us, then, sisters and brethren, it behooves us to be up and doing, as the time is drawing near when our parts in this great drama of life will end, and we will be laid aside.

Twenty-nine young lives have been made brighter by being admitted within our Home. Twenty-nine more little lambs have been fed and clothed within our doors, and lessons to properly fit them for the struggles of life have been commenced, which, when complete, will lay the foundations for lives of future usefulness.

Fifteen children have been placed in good Christian homes, while ten others have been returned to relatives. Two hundred and fifty-eight little ones have been made welcome in our Home since its inauguration.

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The books of your Secretary and Treasurer, in reference to the receipts and expenditure in connection with this branch of our work, have been carefully audited, and a statement prepared, which will be placed before you in printed form. From it you will gather that our Orphanage is on a firm financial foundation. Your Officers and Board of Management have one great desire, and that is to see the remainder of the mortgage paid off, so that we may look upon that magnificent structure as belonging entirely to the Loyal True Blue Association. This task of raising the required \$3,500 may seem insurmountable to some, but when we consider the great obstacles that have been overcome in the past, and the fact that, that faithful and energetic little band of fellow-workers at Picton, year after year, raise between five and six hundred dollars towards this worthy object, we should be ashamed to admit that our Home is not clear of debt.

nd Members

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All that is required is for each and every member to set to work in earnest, united with the one object in view, and within six months

not one cent would be left standing against it. Can we not sacrifice a little enjoyment in behalf of the cause we cherish and love? I believe and know that we can and will. I appeal to you, sisters and brethren, to go into this work with all earnestness, unitedly, and with the determination to win, then when we meet in Grand Lodge next year your officers will be in a position to proclaim the glad tidings, "Our Home is clear, our Home is clear."

You are, no doubt, all aware that the caretaker's house on the grounds was totally destroyed by fire on the morning of January 25 last, and has not yet been rebuilt. At present the caretaker is compelled to live away from the Home. I would suggest to the Grand Lodge the necessity of rebuilding the house at once, as it is important, and, in fact, imperative, that he should be constantly upon the grounds and within call, should his services be required in case of sudden illness or fire at the Home during the night.

There are several other matters which I might refer to in connection with our Orphanage, but which may probably come before you from the Grand Executive.

#### New Lodges

It is gratifying to report that our banner has been raised in the following places: Halifax, Belmont, Athol, Maccan, Amherst, Truro, Catalone and Chignecto, in the Province of Nova Scotia; Deer Island, in the Province of New Brunswick; Robinson's Head and Bay of Islands, in Newfoundland; McLennan, Uxbridge and Owen Sound, in the Province of Ontario; Calgary, in the Northwest Territories. In addition to these lodges have been re-organized at Trenton and New Glasgow, Nova Scotia and Navan, Ontario.

You will gather from the above that we have secured a foothold in Newfoundland, thanks to the kindness of Bro. Daniel McDougall, Past Grand Master of the Loyal Orange Association of Nova Scotia, who went to our sister colony at his own expense and addressed a number of meetings in our behalf. He succeeded in interesting a goodly number of persons in our Association, and had it not been for the unfortunate snow blockade, which delayed the supplies, our worthy brother would have had at least six lodges in line. However, the good seed sown has taken root, and upon the return of many of the inhabitants who are away on a fishing expedition to the coast of Labrador, several

lodges will be opened. If it is the wish of this Grand Lodge Bro. McDougall will pay another visit to our neighboring colony in the interest of our Association.

To Bro. Daniel Johnson, D. D. G. M. for Pictou and Annapolis, is due the credit of much of the advancement made in Nova Scotia, and had it not been for the severe snow storms last winter, he would have been far more successful.

Owing to the constant requests from many officers of subordinate lodges in rural districts for an organizer to assist in strengthening their ranks, I have approached Bro. Johnson in regard to having him make a tour of Ontario, with the view of assisting and building up our weaker lodges and instituting new ones where possible. Bro. Johnson has signified his willingness to take up this work immediately providing this Grand Lodge so desires. We should avail ourselves of this opportunity as good work can certainly be done in this Province.

Funeral Benefits

This branch of our work is now progressing in a very satisfactory manner. The new system as adopted by our last Grand Lodge is a great improvement on the old. With the stated monthly assessments, each member knows exactly the amount he is required to pay during the year, and as a general thing, is prepared to meet each payment promptly. Quite a number are paying six months assessments in advance.

The annual financial statement presented to the Registrar of Friendly Societies for Ontario, for the year ending December 31, 1904, showed the following result:

The assets amounted to \$22,357.52, with liabilities of \$27.34. Sick benefits were paid by subordinate lodges to 13 members. Total number of weeks' illness, 42. Number of members on the Sick Benefit Roll, 190. Amount paid for sick benefits, \$39; for medical attendance, \$113.75. Amount standing to the credit of the Sick Benefit Fund, \$329.66.

### Constitution and Laws

A number of proposed amendments and additions to our constitution and laws have been received by your Secretary, who has had them printed and copies forwarded to all lodges for their consideration.

This is a matter which I believe is being overdone in our Association. Year after year a considerable number of changes are made to our laws, many of them very trivial while others again are important. Still the continual changing of our laws is to be regretted, as in many cases they lead only to confusion, and members are at a loss to know which is the official law. Especially is this the result when members fail to add the sheet of new regulations to their book of laws. During the coming year another edition of the Constitution and Laws will be necessary. It is, therefore, well to make all changes at this session that will prove beneficial.

### Returns

I regret to state that the returns for the past term are very incomplete, as some 20 lodges have not yet reported. This is a great inconvenience to your secretary, as it is impossible to give your honorable body as perfect a report as I would wish. From those to hand I have compiled the following statistics: Initiated 704; joined by certificate or transfer, 41; reins'tated, 48; withdrawn by certificate or transfer, 113; suspended, 762; expelled, 10; deaths, 15; rejected, 11.

### Printing

The usual number of copies of the Grand Lodge Reports of our

last annual session were printed and copies sent to all Grand Lodge officers, subordinate lodges, and Grand Lodge officers of sister associations. A sufficient number of copies of the additions and amendments made to our Constitution and Laws were also printed and forwarded to all our lodges.

#### Correspondence

The increase in correspondence and official work in connection with this office has been excessive during the past year. The establishing of the new system of funeral benefits added greatly to the work of your secretary. Then, again, many officers of the subordinate lodges, not being familiar with their duties, have not exercised sufficient care in compiling their returns, etc., consequently these have to be sent back for correction. You may be surprised to learn that with three or four exceptions all returns have had to be sent back. This alone necessitates a lot of extra work which would be unnecessary if subordinate lodge officers would check off their reports and make sure that everything is correct before forwarding them to my office. The frequent changing of secretaries in subordinate lodges is to be regretted. No doubt all are anxious and desire to discharge their duties faithfully and well, but it requires time to thoroughly conversant with all the little details, and just when a secretary becomes expert, he is removed to make room for some other aspirant, who is just as worthy and equally entitled to hold office, but who has not had the required experience.

#### The Sentinel

This valuable weekly visitor in the interest of Protestantism is a source of pleasure to every reader, and is worthy the support and appreciation of every Protestant. It is now one of the very best weekly newspapers in Canada and should be loyally supported. Under the able management of Bro. H. C. Hocken, it has greatly improved, and will so continue, as our worthy brother is determined that The Sentinel shall be the leading weekly in Canada. Our Association has been assured every possible assistance. Let each of us do what we can to partially repay Bro. Hocken, by increasing the circulation of this splendid mouthpiece of Protestantism.

#### Bro. E. F. Clarke

On March 3rd, last, there passed away in the City of Toronto, one of the brightest lights of our parent association, and Protestants the world over were shocked to learn that Bro. E. F. Clarke, M. P., and Grand Treasurer of the Provincial of the Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West, had answered the roll call and his spirit returned to his God who gave it.

Bro. Clarke was always found at the post of duty, and was ever ready with voice and pen to defend the cause he so dearly loved. He was honored and respected by all who knew him irrespective of religious views. His manliness and uprightness in all matters won for him the respect, confidence and admiration of his fellow-man. We deeply deplore the loss of such a worthy brother, who was at all times a true friend of our association. His life and example should have an important and influential bearing upon the formation and development of the character of the rising generation.

In contemplating the life of our departed brother, during his official career, I am forcibly reminded of those well known lines by Longfellow:

"Lives of great men all remind us  
We can make our lives sublime,

To Bro. James Worrell, our much respected and highly esteemed Grand Master, is due more than mere words of thanks. He has been self-sacrificing in his efforts to carry out the honorable trust placed in him. His every ambition has been the advancement of our work. Devotion to our Orphanage and honesty of heart has marked his every effort. No matter how difficult the task, he was ever willing to do his duty. To Bro. Worrell justly belongs much of the credit for the excellent success of our Orphanage. It has been an extreme pleasure to me to have been so closely associated officially for the past five years with such a sincere and ardent worker.

Now, sisters and brethren, I leave you to faithfully carry on the work for which we are convened, with the sincere desire that what we do will be done in the bonds of fidelity toward one another, and that when we return to our distant homes we will carry away with us nothing but the fondest and most affectionate recollections of goodwill toward each other.

With the sincere desire that the ties of True Blueism will be the more firmly cemented by our deliberations here in the Queen City.

## Address of Welcome

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, L. T. B. A.:—

Dear Sisters and Brethren—The lodges comprising the East and West York districts of the Loyal True Blue Association welcome you to their midst, and trust that you will find warm hearts that beat true to you and the cause which you represent.

The attendance at these places was very good, considering a great number had gone to the fisheries, and the rest were preparing to leave.

Arrangements had been made to forward supplies for organizing six lodges, but on account of blockades on the railway, ice in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and other obstacles going so far, the supplies did not reach me until I left for home, so that I could not complete organization. One lodge was organized at Bay of Islands, "Britannia," with Bro. A. L. Barrett as W. M., and one at Robinson's Head, "Ascension," with Bro. Abram Tilly as W. M. These two lodges show that they are to be good, energetic lodges. I also had under way a lodge at Bay Roberts and Carbonnear, and good prospects for Clarke's Beach and Harbour Grace, but the people had to leave home to go to the fishing and then nothing could be done until they returned in October.

Now, as the work has been fairly begun, and there is a large area to draw from, and one of the most Protestant places to be found, and will also be a great strength to the Association; it is our duty to see the work put on good footing, when the people of Newfoundland will then take hold of their own work and carry it out.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of the Loyal True Blue Association, now assembled:—

Most Worshipful Sir, Sisters and Brethren—We, your Committee on Correspondence, beg leave to report as follows:—

Having reviewed the address of our Grand Master, your committee desire to congratulate him upon its very elaborate and exhaustive composition, covering all points of interest to our Association. We regret to notice that under the caption of Autonomy Bills our Grand Master forgot to mention the names of those whom we think should have been singled out for special reference, because of the stubborn resistance (in opposition to party dictation) offered on the floor of our Parliament in opposing the attempts to Romanize the Western Provinces of our Fair Dominion. We refer to Bro. Dr. T. S. Sproule, Most Worshipful Grand Master and Sovereign of the Loyal Orange Association of British North America, and Wm. F. McLean, M. P., for South York.

Under the caption of Suspension and Expulsion we find a recommendation that evidence of trials be placed in the hands of the Grand Executive to be reported at each annual session. Your committee regret that they cannot concur in said recommendation while our constitution grants all members the right of appeal to this Grand Body.

We regret to notice in his address that the receipts of our Orphanage have not been as great as in former years and would urge the adoption by all lodges of the recommendation made; that a system for raising funds be at once instituted.

A fitting tribute to our late Champion, Bro. E. F. Clarke and his reference to the Orange Sentinel we desire to commend.

Grand Secretary's Report—Your committee desires to congratulate our Grand Secretary on his works of fifteen years' duration. Your committee desire to concur with him in his recommendation that the caretaker's house, which was destroyed by fire, should be re-built as soon as possible. We are pleased to note the healthy condition of our Funeral Benefit as outlined in his report, and we would urge that the members, as far as possible, pay to the Grand Secretary at least six months' funeral benefit call at the beginning of each half year in advance, as by so doing they will greatly lessen his work and add to the stability of the fund.

We would urge upon the members present to assist our Grand Secretary, as far as possible, in wiping away the great inconvenience caused that officer by the incomplete manner in which some of the lodges make their returns.

D. D. G. M.'S—While we are pleased to note the increased prosperity of our Association in a great number of our districts, we regret the falling off at other points. If, as outlined in the report of the D. D. G. M., of West York, the cause emanates from the assess-

ments of last year to the Death Benefit Funds, we are of the opinion that the necessity of the assessment was not thoroughly explained, and would urge that all lodges interview those members and point out to them the fact that it was done for no other purpose than the insuring to them of their just portion.

The payment of the benefits direct into the Grand Secretary should not be permitted period of longer than six months, when, if at the end of that time the lodge to which the member belongs has not met, then said members shall be permitted to affiliate with some other lodge, as provided for in the constitution.

The recommendation of Bro. Thos. Johnston, of North Victoria, on Insurance, your committee are of the opinion that this matter requires careful study, and would recommend that the entire matter be referred to our Grand Executive with instruction to bring in a report at our next annual session.

Your committee would recommend that the paragraph in the report of the D. D. G. M., of East York, referring to Queen City Jubilee, No. 44, not meeting regularly be struck out. We concur in his recommendation that a committee composed of members from lodges in any jurisdiction should be formed for the purpose of caring for the sick and distressed.

We also concur in the recommendation of the D. D. G. M. for Lincoln, and which has been adopted by Princess Beatrice Lodge, No. 3, that of entertaining the members of the lodge by each number in their turn, either afternoon or evening, as it has a tendency to the members becoming better acquainted with each other.

Your committee would also suggest that the matter of a funeral benefit certificate to old members of the Funeral Benefit Fund be furnished free.

### REPORT OF ORPHANAGE BOARD

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of the Loyal True Blue Association, now in session assembled:—

Once more we are gathered together in annual session and we are pleased to have the privilege of presenting to you our annual report. In doing so we acknowledge, with great gratitude, the exemption of any epidemic among the children during the year. The health of the little ones being exceptionally good. And we are thankful to say that since the Home was opened no contagious disease has yet entered within its walls, and only one death has occurred, and in this case the child was practically at death's door at time of admittance.

We also desire to bear testimony of the great care and interest taken by the different employees of the Institution in their positions of trust.

We are also pleased to report that during the year we have been incorporated by the Ontario Government as a Children's Aid Society, so that for the future, any child coming under our protection which has been neglected for a period of six months, becomes the ward of the Association.

During the past twelve months twenty-nine of Christ's little ones have received shelter. Fifteen have been placed in good Protestant homes; since the Home was opened two hundred and fifty-eight children have been protected and cared for.

We regret to find that the past year has not been as successful financially, as the previous one, and would strongly urge upon each individual member the great duty devolving upon them to not rest until the mortgage now resting upon our Home is paid. We firmly believe it quite possible if each member present to-day will pledge themselves to work. We can have a public thanksgiving service at next Grand Lodge Session, by burning the mortgage now standing against the Home.

We regret to report the loss by fire, of the caretaker's residence at the Orphanage, on the morning of January 25th, last, which was valued at \$600.00. There was an insurance of \$200.00. The cause of the fire is unknown.

The following improvements have been made during the year:—

A new Gurney Steel Range has been supplied for the kitchen of the Home, which is capable of supplying the requirements of a much larger institution, and destined we believe to last for all time to come. The cost was \$197.00.

A well, to supply pure drinking water to the Home, has been provided at a cost of about \$60.00. There being no outside water supply on the grounds it will be most convenient for public use and pic-nic parties.

The dock, in front of Orphanage, is now being put in a permanent condition by piling, at an outside cost of \$150.00, and will be strong enough for the largest steamers to land.

By a vote of the General Board the school teacher's salary was raised from \$200.00 to \$250.00, and took effect January 1st, 1905.

#### Recommendations

We would recommend the following:—

1.—That the sum of \$400.00 be placed at the disposal of the General Board to be expended for general repairs on the Home and outbuildings; such as painting, inside and out; metal ceilings in three rooms; re-shingling barns, concrete walks, &c.

2.—That fire-escapes be provided in compliance with the Government's demands. In this connection we would mention that the Government inspector has stated that unless such escapes are provided within the next year our Government grant will be withheld.

3.—That where information cannot be secured from members of the Association as to the treatment received by our adopted children, the General Board shall have the power to send a representative of the Home to visit such children at the expense of the Association.

4.—That the re-building of the caretaker's residence be considered by this Grand Lodge.




