Situation in S. Africa

London, February 10.—The war office has received the following despatch from Kitchener, the commander-in-chief in South Africa:—

Pretoria, February 9.—The columns working eastward occupied Ermelo February 6 with slight opposition. A large force of Boers, estimated at 7,000 under Louis Botha, moved eastward. About 800 wagons with families passed through Ermelo on the way to Amsterdam, and very large quantities of stock are being driven east.

A peace delegate under sentence of death, and other Boer prisoners were taken away by the Boers. All reports show that the Boers are exceedingly bitter. Fifty Boers have surrendered.

Louis Botha with 2,000 men, attacked General Smith-Dorrien at Orange Camp, Bothwell, at 3 A. M. February 6. He was repulsed after severe fighting. General Spruit was killed. General Randemeyer was severely wounded. Two field cornets were killed, twenty of the Boer dead were in our hands and many severely wounded. Our casualties were 24 killed and 53 wounded.

Our movement to the east is reported to have thoroughly upset all the enemy's calculation, and created a regular panic in the district.

Christian Dewet appears to be crossing the line south of Jagersfontein failed to effect a crossing by the drifts east of Behulie.

In Cape Colony Calvinia has been occupied by Colonel De Lisle, who entered February 6, the enemy retiring toward Keabard. Colonel Haig is driving the Midland command northward past Aberdeen.

Battle Near Bloemfontein

East London, Cape Colony, February 9.—Details have been received here of severe fighting at Tlooberg Mountain, 40 miles north of Bloemfontein, and about midway between Smithton and Bloemfontein. Major Crewe, with a composite column travelling south-west, sighted the mountain on the morning of January 31. He heard heavy firing, and knowing that Colonel Picher's column was on the other side of the mountain, he concluded that this officer was in action. Consequently he hurried forward only to meet Boers streaming down and evidently retiring from Colonel Picher's lyddite shells. Immediately Major Crewe brought three of the fifteen pounders and a pom-pom to bear on the Boers, who, however, were found to be so numerous that it was "impossible to head them."

Orders were given to return to camp, about two miles from the mountain. The column rested until four in the afternoon, when the march was resumed south-west. Major Crewe was just touching the southern point of the mountain when a terrific rifle fire opened from a large force of Boers who were in ambush on the mountain. The fight soon became general. The Boers outnumbered the British five to one and were attacking them on both flanks and rear. The British pom-pom jammed and became useless. Major Crewe grasped the situation and by a brilliant move got the convoy into a safe position. Between seven and eight in the evening the Boers charged the position and turned both flanks.

The British ammunition became exhausted and Major Crewe was obliged to retire and abandon the pom-pom after the advance party had endeavored to save it and had sustained severe losses. A rear guard action was fought by Major Crewe into the camp where the wagons had been lagged. He personally superintended the retirement, the Boers harassing him throughout. Entrenchments were thrown up during the night. When morning came Major Crewe started to join General Knox, twelve miles southwest. The Boers immediately re-attacked him, compelling him to fight a second rear guard action for a few miles. General Dewet personally commanded the Boers, estimated at 2,500. Eventually the British officers joined General Knox and returned to Bloemfontein. Lord Kitchener has highly complimented Major Crewe upon the achievement.

On the occasion of the marriage of Queen Wilhelmina, pardoned or lightened the sentences of 364 prisoners. The prisoners of the United Kingdom are anxiously looking forward to the accession of King Edward, for they think that he will signify his accession by issuing some pardons.

And beyond all this the adulterants may be not simply make weights and cheats may be dangerous poisons.

When the dealer says "just as good" ask yourself "just as good" for whom? You will find in the answer to that question the motive of substitution, which is the extra profit paid the dealer by the sale of the substitutes and imitations of standard wares. Practically the dealer says, when practicing the gentle art of substitution, "This is just as good" for you, because it is a great deal more profitable for me, and anything is good enough for you which increases my profit."



In the recently tried P. E. Island election case the evidence obtained shows plainly that the country was deluged with liquor during the General election. Mr. Justice Hodgson is reported to have said: After hearing the evidence that has been given, I feel bound to declare that never before has there been brought to my notice such shameless corruption and debauchery in connection with an election contest. It will be our duty to report some of those—perhaps not the least shameful of them—who seem to have deluged the country with liquor, bringing opprobrium and disgrace upon this province, with the earnest expectations that the laws of the land may be invoked against them. Justice Fitzgerald, who was associated with Justice Hodgson in the case, said: "I agree with what has been said by my learned colleague. I do not think there has been in Prince Edward Island such a revelation in deluging a country with intoxicating liquor. I am ashamed, as a life long resident, to find that an electorate during a campaign could be wholly debauched by liquor. . . . I for one would like every man within the sound of my voice to know that when my hands lights it will light heavily upon those who bring such disgrace upon the country, and if I am asked to disqualify I shall not hesitate to do it, in view of what I have heard today."

Parliament is again in session at Ottawa and judging from the way the business is being hurried through it will be a short session. Mr. Borden leader of the opposition has a united party behind him and the governmental affairs will be severely criticised when needful.

Mr. Monk, the brilliant member for Jacques Cartier, who rendered his country a service by exposing the Emergency Food Fraud, has been appointed Mr. Borden's chief lieutenant. Mr. Monk will probably continue to expose, and the Government will continue to appoint whitewashing committees.

Mrs. Carrie Nation certainly has a good object in view in closing saloons and putting down lawlessness, but she is wrong in committing lawless acts on her part. The first session of the ninth parliament opened on the sixth inst with the usual speech from the throne. Owing to the death of the Queen the usual festivities were omitted. The death of the late Queen was referred to in suitable terms; the sending of the contingents to South Africa, the Canadian display at the Paris Exposition, the visit of the Dukes of York and Cornwall to Canada were also mentioned.

Of the six Conservative leaders of the Canadian parliament since the Confederation, three of them have been Nova Scotians and there will probably be many more.

The Halifax Chronicle in its recent issues has had a great deal to say on the "Prohibition" and "Sunday Law" questions. At present a moral crusade is taking place in that city and also in St. John, but these seem to have escaped its attention.

To the horrors of war in China are added the horrors of famine. In two provinces having a population of 21,000,000 it is said that two thirds of the people are without sufficient food. Working oxen, horses and dogs have been eaten in great numbers. If the European powers owe duties to China they might begin by feeding her people instead of killing them.

The Tory press throughout the Dominion and the Maritime Provinces are very jubilant over the choice of the Conservatives made in electing Hon. R. L. Borden as their leader.

The debate on the speech from the Throne occupied two hours, it being the record time in the Canadian Parliament history.

The estimates for the year ending June 30, 1902 were presented to Parliament on Monday. The total amount asked for on consolidation fund is \$44,602,323, or a decrease of \$2,278,720 over the amount asked for the current year. On capital account there is \$6,296,500 required, as against \$10,290,041 for 1900-01, or a decrease of \$3,993,541. The decrease on capital and consolidated fund accounts taken together is \$6,212,266.

Town Council

The monthly meeting of the Kentville Town Council was held on the 6th inst with Mayor all Councillors, Recorder and Clerk present.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

The Street committee then presented their report which was read and is as follows: That the sums expended on Streets for some years past has been greatly disproportionate to the results obtained. The yearly expenditure has been steadily increasing, while the service has been steadily growing worse.

That the expenditure could be curtailed and service improved by: 1st—Engaging the service of a superintendent who will devote his whole time to the streets and water department of the town, and who will himself perform manual labour.

2nd—The purchase of a horse and cart for the Town.

The annual expenditure in the water and street department during the past year, including the Superintendent's salary was upward of \$1150.00. A statement is herewith submitted showing an estimate of \$516.00 as the probable yearly cost to the Town of the scheme involving the changes proposed, of course to the amount there must be added the cost of an additional Man from time to time, and the cost of extra horses for road machine and snow plow.

Your Committee believe by carrying into effect these two proposals a saving could be effected of at least \$300 per annum, and the necessary work on the streets performed in a more effective and satisfactory manner.

After the reading of the report of the last election Mayor Youle spoke a few words thanking the council for their support in the past.

Councillor Lloyd, after seven years of faithful service in the council, next spoke and said that he regretted very much that on account of illness he had to resign.

The council then adjourned after which the oath of allegiance and oath of office was administered to the returning officers and the new councillor, R. W. Eaton by the Recorder.

The standing committees for the year were then appointed.

BERWICK

The Concert given by the Band in Victoria Hall last Saturday evening was fairly well attended but not as large as its merits warranted. The old members of the band fully sustained their former reputation while the new ones made a decided hit. The playing of the Band was most favourably commented on.

A gripe seems to have the town in its grasp. Hardly a house but has one of its victims.

Trooper H. B. White was here Tuesday evening attending the "at home" of the Odd Fellows.

Rev. G. I. Foster was here making parochial visits on Tuesday.

W. V. Brown Esq. is now making an active canvass in the interests of a company who propose getting out a history of Nova Scotia. The stock is being rapidly taken up and the book will certainly fill a long felt want. It is rumoured that R. R. McLeod will write the history which is sufficient guarantee of the work being well and thoroughly done.

The members of Christ Church, Berwick, are making preparations for a grand concert in the near future. The proceeds are to go toward the erection of a horse shed. Outside of the worthy object, the members of the church have a reputation for good entertainments which will no doubt give them a bumper house.

There is a rumor around town that Berwick may lose one of its pastors. Your correspondent has only heard this and may be in error. It is sincerely to be hoped he is, for the removal of the gentleman in question would not only be a loss to his own church but a most decided loss to the whole town and vicinity, for during his ministry here he has ever been foremost in anything that tended to the amelioration and benefit of his fellow townpeople.

Your correspondent enjoyed a pleasant call at H. M. Kiddy's store the other day. His father has of late joined him and with that characteristic energy which made him one of the leading men at Chester, has made improvements in his store which makes it one of the best in town. THE MISSING MESSENGER

Why the French Were Unsuccessful in the Franco-Prussian War.

Many people have wondered, and not without reason, why Napoleon III plunged France into a war with Germany, unsupported as he was by any of the great powers.

But Napoleon III was neither so blind nor so rash as is generally supposed. He had taken certain measures beforehand and counted upon support which was destined to fail him.

An Egyptian Stern Wheeler.

An Egyptian stern wheeler is built to float over the shoals and rapids of the Nile. There is no going down long, slippery inclines to her engine room, for she has no hold, everything being carried above water line—cabins, stores and engines. Indeed the steam cylinders lie exposed, one on either side and a little forward of the very primitive looking stern paddle wheel, which looks more as if it belonged to some agricultural implement than a steamship. The reason for this is that, although nearly a hundred feet long, she only draws about 1 foot 9 inches of water, consequently she has no down stairs.

Probably those engaged in the engine rooms of some of the great liners which ply to the far east would be only too glad if when going through the Red sea they could bring their engine room on deck too, instead of seething below in a temperature which sometimes exceeds 130 degrees. What wonder they at such times faint away and are brought up and laid on deck, where they are brought round roughly but effectively by the free application of pails of water drawn from the tepid sea.—Chambers' Journal.
