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EXEMPT RURAL DISTRICTS OR TAX TOWNS AND VILLAGES

Executive of Improvement District Association Meets and Deals With Revenue Tax-Resolutions Passed--Premier Scott Talks to Committee

The voice of the farmers of the province with respect to the supplementary revenue act was expressed at a meeting of the executive of the Saskatchewan Local Improvement Districts Association today, when almost a full representation of members adopted a resolution calling upon the government to amend section four of the supplementary revenue act by exempting rural school districts from the cent an acre tax, and by providing that the money paid this year be refunded to the respective districts. It was also decided to ask the government to keep the cent an acre tax separate and distinct from the L.I. District tax, for at present the district tax has precedence of the other and where the Local Improvement tax is paid and the supplementary revenue tax is unpaid the latter is deducted from the former, and the districts are consequently crippled by a shortage of funds to carry out their road improvement schemes. The various districts want assessment and collection of the supplementary revenue tax operated from the government offices and not by the Local Improvement districts.

Mr. Scott Present

The above ground was covered by the deliberations during the morning session, and in the afternoon at the request of the executive Premier Scott was present for a time to hear the representations of the members. The procedure of the morning was summarized by the president, S. Chivers-Wilson, and an informal discussion then took place. Mr. Scott said by way of reply to the resolutions adopted by the executive, that the only radical change requested was regarding the exemption of rural school districts from the tax. Owing to the rapidity with which school districts are being formed it would be confusing to make the change suggested as the taxable area is continually changing. He impressed upon the committee not to lose sight of the fact that a new municipal bill is being prepared.

Mr. Chambers (Douglas) suggested that a date could be set, say January first in each year, when newly formed districts would come under the exemption provision. He thought that would cover the objection raised by Mr. Scott.

Mr. Salmon (Riga) said that the feeling is general that the tax is discriminating and that villages, towns and cities should pay a proportionate share of the taxation for educational purposes. He knows of rural districts that are paying more taxes than some village school districts. Then again the remuneration is insufficient for the work of collecting the taxes. More than the \$20 provided is eaten up in expenses, and the farmers cannot afford to work for nothing. To his knowledge the only cases where the supplementary revenue notices were sent out were where the districts had not complied with the Local Improvement Ordinance, otherwise the regular assessment notices would have been sent out long before.

Mr. Fitz-Gerald (Greenell) remarked that in his district a resolution was passed authorizing the secretary treasurer not to send out the supplementary revenue notices, and the general feeling is that they will not and cannot be made pay the tax under the present law.

Mr. Scott—"What about the act of the legislature?" It appeared to him that this is a question for the attorney general's department.

Mr. Salmon insisted that it was certainly a grievance if men appointed to do certain work could be made subject to another law.

COMPETITION AT OTTAWA

Regulations Changed So That Committee Will Select Competing Troupe--Meeting of Philharmonic

A special meeting of the Regina Philharmonic Society was held on Wednesday evening, when it was decided by the committee that in view of the success which has attended the whole of the society's productions during the last three years, the society would be justified in competing for his excellency, the governor general's trophy at Ottawa next winter. Several prominent citizens who attended the competitive performances at Ottawa last February have expressed the opinion that the Regina Philharmonic Society would have an excellent chance of bringing back the trophy in the event of its competing next February, and although no piece as yet has been selected for rehearsal, the committee have commenced active organization work, so that no delay will occur once these practices commence. An earnest invitation is extended to all the musical people of Regina to join the society, so that as representative and strong an organization as possible may be selected to take part in the competition. The final selection of those chosen to represent the province of Saskatchewan at Ottawa will be made by a musical committee to be appointed for that purpose, and although no definite plans have been made for that purpose, it is probable that the society will give two or three performances in Regina and one in Winnipeg, before the date fixed for the competition. Notices will be inserted in the local press later announcing the date of the first practice, and the name of the piece selected, but in the meantime the secretary will be pleased to receive the names of those desirous of joining the society. Six Dollar Cut in Prices announced—This is the time for Builders to Get Busy

The Canadian Elevator company has made a big reduction in the price of lumber and have sent out a new price list to consumers. Their prices are: 2x4, 2x6 and 2x8, per M \$25.25 and 2x12 \$20. Common boards \$25, Culls \$20, Ship-lap \$25. This represents an all round cut of about six dollars.

The Independent Lumber Co. have informed The West that they will meet all competition in reduced prices but that they are not necessarily accepting the lead of any other company.

The above prices as will be seen do not affect the higher grades of lumber and the finishings, doors, windows, etc. The man who wishes to put up a machine shed, granary or rough stable will, however, find quite a saving by reason of the cut.

ORANGIES CELEBRATE

Moosomin, July 13.—It is scarcely an exaggeration to say that Orange-men's day of 1907 will be looked back upon by the members of the local Orange lodge as being one of the most notable for many years. The weather conditions were all that could be desired (Mr. Foster, the weather man being on his good behavior again) crowds flocked into town, beautiful decorations of all kinds met the eye at every turn, and in fact everything that could be done was done to make the glorious twelfth a success.

From early morn till late at night exhilarating music rolled up from the drum and fife, and the Oddfellows' and Whitewood bands. The procession was the largest of the kind ever seen here, and the streets were thronged throughout the day with happy sight-seers.

The sight of this vast procession winding its way from the grounds to the town, with their banners waving drums beating, and the fine music of the various bands was certainly not easily forgotten.
