### A Kind Dead is Never Lost.

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### A New Pen Sketch of Premier Borden.

In the Saturday Evening Post last week an interesting pen sketch was given of Hon. R. L. Borden, who on different occasions has played golf with Mr. Taft. The concluding part of the sketch was as follows:—  
He was born in Grand Pre, Nova Scotia, in 1854. His ancestors were of that substantial stock which originated in Normandy, crossed to England with the Conqueror, and was represented by Richard and John Borden, who left Kent to settle at Bridport, Dorsetshire, in 1789.  
Borden became the first Premier of the Borden of the United States, and the founder of the Canadian branch, Samuel Borden, left Fall River, Massachusetts, for Nova Scotia in 1755.  
Borden studied law and first decided to stand for Parliament in 1896. Sir Charles Tupper was prime minister. Borden was elected, but the Tupper government was defeated; so Borden found himself on the opposition bench and there he remained, quiet, watchful, studious. In 1900 the Conservative party was beaten again, Sir Wilfrid Laurier tightened his grip, and the situation required a change of leadership for the Conservatives. Sir Charles Tupper retired and the quiet, studious young Nova Scotian—Borden—was made leader of the Opposition. He was matched against Laurier, who had been in the House for twenty-five years and had been premier for four. The country was prosperous, the Laurier majority was large, and Opposition Leader Borden had hard sledding.  
He is an intensely serious man, with tremendous capacity for work, a fine grasp of detail and large executive ability. He led a most intelligent and useful opposition. When the reciprocity issue came along he saw its possibilities early, and he went to the country on it and made a fight that Canadians and Americans will remember a long time. He is a convincing speaker but not an orator. He talks like a lawyer rather than like a speaker; but he never worked for a minute the value of the Union Jack on the end of his chain, and he did a little splendid thing now and then about the Mother Country. Borden is thicker than water and all that.

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### Seasonable Pineapple and Strawberry Recipes.

**STRAWBERRY WHIP**—One cup of crushed strawberries, one cup of powdered sugar, white of one egg. Beat the ingredients in a bowl, and beat with wire whisk until stiff enough to hold in shape—about 30 minutes will be required for beating. Pile lightly on a dish and chill. Beat egg a little first.  
**STRAWBERRY PIE**—Take juice from one pint of canned strawberries, put on stove, and when it is almost boiling add about three tablespoonsful of flour mixed with a little water. When all is thickened and creamy add the berries. Pour into a well baked under crust, which has been made of one cup of flour, two tablespoons lard, a pinch of salt, mixed with water to make a smooth paste. Beat the white of one egg, add one tablespoon sugar, spread on pie and brown in quick oven. Serve cold.  
Pineapples should be peeled and the eyes carefully extracted with a sharp, pointed knife. This fruit should not be cut in pieces or slices but stripped from the stump or core with a silver fork, care being taken that the pieces are not too large.  
**STRAWBERRY AND PINEAPPLE**—Mix the juice of three oranges and one lemon and sweeten to taste, keeping the mixture rather tart. Place on ice. Wash and drain thoroughly some large, fine strawberries, slice out into dice several pieces of pineapple. At serving time cut the berries into halves, mix them with the fruit juice. One large, perfect berry set on a tiny circle of pineapple may decorate the top of each. A delicious drink can be made by adding the juice of three lemons and two quarts of water to this mixture.  
**PINEAPPLE SHERBERT**—Two cases of pineapple or the same amount of fresh fruit, two pounds of sugar, two quarts water, whites of six eggs, strain juice from the cans into the freezer, make a boiling syrup of the sugar and one quart water, chop the pineapple small, scald it in the boiling syrup, then rub it through a colander, with the syrup and remaining quart of water, into the freezer; when mixture is frozen to a mush add the beaten whites of the eggs and continue freezing.

The town authorities are getting busy with Scott Act enforcement, and, we understand, are determined to make a clean sweep. Good luck to them.

We trust that the war against the burdock is still going on. There are some places that we know of, however, where it still reigns supreme. Let the good work continue.

During the next few weeks it will be determined whether or not the caterpillar is to be a great pest with us next year. Active steps taken now will save great annoyance as well as expense next year.

Very much of the danger in connection with the automobile would be avoided if drivers of teams would be more careful to observe the rules of the road. Always turn to the right and pass to the left. It is very awkward for the driver of an auto going even at moderate speed to overtake a team and have no idea as to which side he is to be allowed to pass on. This is a matter which every driver of a horse should consider. On the other hand there is a good deal of reckless driving on the part of owners of motor cars which should be avoided. Turning a sharp corner on a busy street at a high rate of speed is bound to cause a bad accident some time.

The Sunday School Summer School will be held at Acadia University beginning July 2nd and continuing until July 9th. While this is under the auspices of the Sunday School Board of the Baptist Convention, all denominations will be welcome.

The mornings will be devoted to study, taking up such matters as the exposition of the Old and New Testaments; Sunday School management and organization; the work of the different departments; exercises in drawing and manual work and other matters of interest to Sunday School workers.

The afternoons will be given over to recreation; strolls, drives, and athletics. A lecture will be provided for each evening. The importance now given to Sunday School work makes it most probable that many will attend.

A Brutal Assault.

The people of this county are justly shocked and indignant over the disgraceful affair which marred the quiet of last Sunday afternoon and resulted in the death of one of Kings county's most highly esteemed citizens, Mr. H. Kenneth Lea, of Town Plot.

As the alleged perpetrators of the assault are now in jail at Kentville, awaiting a preliminary examination on Tuesday next, we shall not further refer to the affair at present except to give a brief statement of the facts as reported.

The reports of the assault that have reached here say that three men, brothers, named Graves, residents of Town Plot, while under the influence of liquor, visited Mr. Lea's house and inquired for a young domestic who was not at home at the time. On being told of the fact of the girl's absence, they became so abusive that Mr. Lea ordered them from the premises and on their refusal with abusive language to do so, he produced a gun and threatened to use it in self defence. One of the intruders rushed at him and Mr. Lea in self defence struck his assailant with the stock of the gun, which was thereby discharged, the shot entering Mr. Lea's body, near the femoral artery, in the upper part of the thigh.

It is alleged that the three men rushed upon him and assaulted the wounded man in a most brutal manner. Not content with this they dragged Mr. Lea out on the lawn and continued to beat and kick him until he was insensible and almost dead. Attracted by the shot and cries for help raised by Mrs. Lea and her maid, who were alone, a neighbor, Mr. R. S. Starr, rushed to the Lea home and was able to drive away the assailants long enough for him to carry the unconscious victim of the assault into the house. The door was barricaded and though the three men tried to break it down, more help arrived before they could succeed.

Medical aid was summoned as speedily as possible. Dr. Moore, of Port Williams, Dr. R. H. Moore, of Wolfville, and Dr. W. B. Moore, of Kentville, were called in to attend to the unfortunate man. They pronounced Mr. Lea's condition to be extremely serious and advised his removal to Halifax as speedily as possible. He was sent to Halifax on the morning train on Monday and taken to the infirmary where he died Tuesday morning.

Mr. Lea was forty-five years of age and came to Canada from England about ten years ago. Later he purchased the farm at Town Plot on which he resided. He was well known in Wolfville having been a frequent visitor to our town, as well as having resided here during the past winter. He was a good citizen and highly respected by all who knew him and his well death is deeply deplored. He leaves a widow and two small children who have the deepest sympathy of all.

Elections.

The Montreal Gazette, referring to the Conservative sweep in New Brunswick on the 20th inst., says: 'Pugsley's influence is gone.' The Toronto News says it 'death blow to Pugsleyism.' The Montreal Herald, Liberal, says the New Brunswick government was 'one of ability,' and Mr. Copp, the leader of the opposition, not only suffered the complete collapse of his party but a personal one in his own constituency.

The opposition came out of the New Brunswick contest with but two followers, a forlorn remnant of a once strong and vigorous party. It was more than a defeat. For this crushing defeat sustained by the Liberal party of New Brunswick there is a clear explanation. The Provincial Liberal party, like the Liberal party of Nova Scotia, and the Liberal party of Saskatchewan, had become a mere adjunct of the Liberal party at Ottawa. And with the defeat of the Laurier government at Ottawa, these provincial Liberal organizations are left to their own resources. The Scott government of Saskatchewan is precisely in the same hole as were the opposition of New Brunswick, with this exception, the Conservative government of New Brunswick, like the Liberal government of Quebec, appealed to the people in its administrative record. It resented the introduction of questions not strictly related to the conduct of provincial affairs. The government of Walter Scott of Saskatchewan fears public judgment on its administrative record, and shirks its responsibility, but seeks to win on the old and dead question of reciprocity.

The moral foundations of New Brunswick Liberalism was destroyed by the Liberal government at Ottawa led by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, held together by the cohesive power of public plunder. When the foundations were destroyed in September last, the whole disaster was made plain on June 20th. The New Brunswick victory for the Flemming government makes clear that the way to command victory is by the simple process of leaving it.

The provincial elections take place in Saskatchewan on July 11th. Walter Scott is Premier, and has been petted and fattened calf of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, while Hon. F. W. G. Haultain is the leader of the Conservative opposition. Scott has reciprocity for his slogan banner on offer. Only one conservative was elected by the province on Sept. 21, 1911. We look for a great victory for Mr. Haultain. We expect that great province to come to its senses on July 11th or sooner. Mr. Haultain is one of the men Canada is proud of, but for reasons well known to many Canadians, Sir Wilfrid Laurier has no use for him and he, and all the strength of the Liberal party throughout Canada, will be exerted in helping Walter Scott, to keep his place. We look to see a good, clean sweep in Saskatchewan, perhaps not so clean as in New Brunswick, but enough for all practical purposes. Provincial Liberal governments are becoming beautifully scarce.

The Marriage Law Decision.

The supreme court of Canada has decided that the Lancaster bill cannot be enacted. The Canadian Parliament has no authority to enact a uniform marriage law as proposed in the bill. The two outstanding features in the judgment of this high tribunal in this connection are worthy of more than a passing notice. According to the finding of the court, the law of the province of Quebec does not nullify a mixed marriage, or a marriage between two Roman Catholics, otherwise legally binding, when performed by other than a Roman Catholic priest. Thus while there can be no uniform marriage law in Canada, yet at the same time the Ne Temere Decree is forever silenced. No final judgment, however, will be reached until the judicial committee of the privy council has made its pronouncement, as the Dominion Government will now proceed to appeal the decision and urge a final decision in October next. There is every possibility that the judgment may be reversed by the privy council, provided that body consents to pass upon a hypothetical case and to answer academic questions. Should the higher court reverse the decision, then the Parliament of Canada will be compelled to negotiate for the necessary jurisdiction. This of course will take time. What the Parliament could have done was simply to have asserted jurisdiction and declared the law and invited the courts to interfere at their peril. Why should the representatives of the people go cap in hand to judges asking permission to legislate, nor should the political responsibility of the legislature be passed on to the courts. In the meantime, we will watch with interest, the latest progress of the vexed question in Canada.

Special Message from the General.

Following is a copy of the first letter sent out by General Booth since the operation on his eyes, dealing with the matter of the loss of his sight.

London, Eng., June 4, 1912. My Dear Comrades,—If the unexpected loss regarding the loss of my eyesight has not actually fallen, as the newspapers have stated, it is hovering dangerously near. Instead of the restoration of sight for which I had hoped, and for which I know you have so earnestly prayed, the doctors tell me I am on the very eve of entire darkness.

In a few brief hours my comrades may be under the painful compulsion of announcing that the General is hopelessly blind. In that event, what an indescribably painful loss will be mine, never again to see the light of day, or behold the countenances of my friends, or look into the sympathetic eyes of my comrades; never again to witness that for which over sixty years has been to me the sight of sights—men and women kneeling at the Mercy Seat.

Then, too, I have lost the hope of seeing alive with any facility to write, while it will be an absolute impossibility to read well.

Pile up all my losses, they are many and serious, I admit; but look at the mercies left me!

First, there is my confidence in God. I am not going to allow the existence of a few things which are a conflict with my judgment to interfere with my confidence in His wisdom—confidence that is inspired by a lifelong knowledge of His loving care.

Then, I have not lost the assurance of my own happy relations with my Heavenly Father. I have not lost the confidence and love of my own dear people. I have not lost the inestimable blessing of life.

I want the continued loyalty of my own people, and the hearty co-operation of all men and women whose hearts are fired with the same purpose as my own.

In a few weeks' time I hope to be found once more on the battlefield. Anyway my dear comrades, in the light or in the dark, you may count upon your General to trust in God and go forward!

Bad Fire at Canning.

The prosperous town of Canning suffered one of the most disastrous fires in its history on Sunday morning last. Right buildings in the business section of the town with most of their contents were burned, causing a loss estimated at about sixty thousand dollars on which there was only thirty thousand dollars insurance.

The fire started in the stores of the Cornwallis Trading Company. It was discovered by the crew of the steamer Brunswick which arrived in port at about six o'clock. The fire had then made good headway and it is thought had been burning some time.

The buildings burned were: post-office, C. R. Dickey's flour and feed store, E. M. Beckwith's office building, R. W. North's hardware store, S. Hatheway's shoe-making establishment, Frederick Northup's grocery, A. D. Payzant's three stores—furniture, dry goods, etc., Cornwallis Trading Company's three stores—grocery, dry goods, meats.

The fire fighting apparatus of the town is limited, but the firemen, assisted by the citizens and a good water supply, succeeded in checking the flames, and thus prevented the whole town from being wiped out.

Everything was dry as tinder—the Cornwallis Trading Company was soon a mass of flames. Some goods were removed, but the proportion was small. The building was soon doomed, and the flames continued to roll onward. The stores of A. D. Payzant were next attacked, then Northup's grocery, Hatheway, shoemaker, and R. W. North's hardware store. When the latter ignited, the inflammable material burned fiercely, and this building was soon reduced to ashes. Before it went down, however, the flames licked up the side of E. M. Beckwith's office building, and the burning embers therefrom were carried to the store of C. R. Dickey.

It was here that the firemen and citizens did heroic work, and checked the progress of the flames, which at times threatened to sweep away other buildings in the neighborhood.

Fortunately the wind was not very heavy, and the burning embers were not carried any great distance beyond the area above mentioned. J. E. Kennedy's grocery store was threatened, but it fortunately escaped.

While fighting the flames, Wiley Brewster, fell from the roof of a barn, a distance of twenty feet, and he was very severely injured. It is expected, however, that he will recover.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section lying side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. GOOD ROADS NEEDED

Interesting Ruins in Farnoff Cambodia, a French Protectorate There are no roads to Angkor in Cambodia, a kingdom and French protectorate on the Gulf of Siam, except a wretched bullock-cart road, and consequently few persons have ever heard of the splendid ruins that are in that vicinity. Yet they possess a strong appeal for the artist and the architect and no less for the archaeologist, since the language of the builders is still undeciphered.

WAR ON POTATO CANKER

Efforts to Save Canadian Tubers From European Disease The Canadian potato will be saved from the danger of canker, threatening from Europe, if the Department of Agriculture can save it. Potato canker is declared by departmental experts to be the most dreaded enemy of the potato, being practically ineradicable. It stays in the soil for years. It is a fungus growth, and is very prevalent in Continental Europe and to England, where it is brought in with the tuber crops.

WHO WAS 'TOMMY ATKINS'?

Now the Soldiers of Great Britain's Army Game by the Name Questions are sometimes asked as to the origin of the expression 'Tommy' or 'Tommy Atkins' as applied to a soldier in general. Mr. H. L. Laetie explains in Notes and Queries that its origin dates from the year 1816, when the 'Soldier's Account Book' was called into use by a War Office circular letter of August 21, 1816. Sample forms of the book for cavalry and infantry accompanied the circular letter, and in every one of them the name 'Thomas Atkins' is used as the soldier's name. Atkins evidently could not write, as in the several places where his signature occurs it is given as 'Thomas Atkins X his mark'. This, Mr. Laetie adds, surely proves that 'Thomas Atkins' is his mark.

GOLD ALONG NEW LINE

Following a survey of the area along the T. & N. O. Railway trial line between Downsview and Port Hope, the party of engineers submitted its report to the Ontario government. That the country is entirely unsuited to agricultural purposes, but may give rise to a magnificent source of energy, is the information given by the engineers. The report says that the area is underlain by the oldest rocks, and small quartz veins occur in Keweenaw schists in many parts. Veins of considerable size were seen, and were found to be composed of quartz. These veins are receiving much attention on account of the Port Hope district, and will probably require careful prospecting, said the report. 'The iron formation can scarcely be considered of economic importance.'

BIG GAME COUNTRY

Hunters' Paradise in the Grand Canyon District of British Columbia Some seventy miles up the Fra or River from Port George, B. C., the Grand Canyon is reached and from there a magnificent mountain range extends as far as the Little Sima or River. From reliable reports received it is probable that there are many more here in the square mile than there are in any other part of the continent, and every year they number some very fine horns. The horns of the mountain sheep are also very plentiful on the higher peaks and, at places, both prairie and high bear are numerous. It is beginning to appear, in fact, that with the exception of antelope and muskox, the British Columbia has every species of big game that exists on the continent, even the rarest of them being found in fair quantities. In addition there is the wild fowl and game birds of various species, some native and some acclimatized, that furnish sport, while the waters afford unexcelled salmon fishing.

CASTLE FOR PRINCE

Future King May Have Home in His Own Kingdom There is a likelihood that the Prince of Wales will have a home of his own in his own kingdom. The death of the Dowager Lady Penrhyn makes it possible to put through the scheme which has been on foot for some time to purchase Penrhyn Castle for him.
