West Land Regulations

three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on farm of at least 80 acres sclely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mether, son, daughter, brother or sis-

In certain districts a bomesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section slongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre

Duties-Must reside upon the home stead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of home stead entry (including the time required a homestead patent) and coltivate fifty A homesteader who has oxbausted

his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.60 per acre. Duties.-Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
