

MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF HURON.

174. The Chairman of the Select Committee reported progress on the state of the contract of William Coleclough, which was read and unanimously adopted and confirmed.

175. The Select Committee for granting compensation to the late William Hicks, was read and unanimously approved of and confirmed.

The Council then adjourned until the next Statutory Meeting in February.

APPENDIX I. REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

COMMITTEE—Messrs. RITCHIE, SPARLING, CHRISTIE, VAN EGMOND, HOLMES.

Mr. Van Egmond in the chair. Your committee having carefully considered the several documents referred to them, beg to submit the following report:—

5. Your committee are happy to find that the Canada Company, have so readily acquiesced in the improvement of the road in Stanley and Hay, and that the same has been immediately carried into effect by the Warden.

7. 8. Your committee approve of the correspondence between the Solicitor of the Council, J. Strachan, Esq., and the Warden, on the subject of a threatened application for a Mandamus, to compel the Council to erect a new Court House, especially under the circumstances referred to in the Warden's reply.

9. Your committee would recommend, that in future, all communications received by the Council from official departments, should be immediately acknowledged of the receipt by the Clerk of the Council, and that at the close of the session, the Clerk of the Council notify the several parties respectively, of what the Council has decided in the matters submitted.

10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15. Your committee upon due deliberation of the several documents submitted, relating to the erection of a Court House, although concurring to some extent with the reasons given for a new Court House, we cannot at present recommend involving the District in such heavy debt, especially as the debt for the present Court House is not yet liquidated, and the Roads and Bridges requiring more outlay than the finances of the District admit of.

16, 17, 18. Your committee cannot recommend the grant for improving the road leading to the "Grand and Court Room" as prayed for, by memorial of the Clerk of the Peace, by order of the Court of General Quarter Sessions, as the said road is now in a far superior condition than any of the main leading roads in this District.

20. The District Surveyor's report having been examined, it would appear that a contract has been given to William McIlwain on section No. 3, Huron Road, near Mr. Monroe's Tavern, without Tenders.

Your committee highly disapprove of such proceedings by the District Surveyor, and recommend that no contract to such extent, be in future given privately.

The Surveyor has also entered the following contracts in his report, viz:—

John Shepherd's contract for £19 12 0

Joseph Whately, for reducing hills near Mr. Hay's, then the amount stated in his contract, in regard to the contract, it appears by evidence that Whately was paid in full, to his entire satisfaction.

24. Your committee recommend that the off-take drain through the Land of Samuel Gibson, be covered up, so as to allow the water to pass underneath.

25. Your committee cannot recommend any more work done than the rate contracted for by William Keenan.

27, 25. Your committee recommend that a tax amounting to £9 5s., be levied on School Section No. 5, in Goderich, for repairing the School House there.

26. Your committee would recommend that the balance remaining unexpended out of the money raised in Colborne for the support of indigents be paid into the hands of the Treasurer, to be kept for similar purposes, and that the Treasurer pay all claims due of such a nature on the productions of proper vouchers.

28. Your committee recommend that the sum of £7 10s., be granted to complete the approaches to the Bridge, over the Creek, on the Matland Concession, Goderich, about one mile from the Huron Road.

29, 34. Your committee recommend that the several accounts for work performed under the By-Law, Chapter IX., passed in last February session of Council, be referred to the Auditors.

35. It appears to your committee that £40 15s. 3d., stands to the credit of the late H. Hyndman, Esq., in the District accounts, as allowance for Constables. And moreover, your committee conceive that the Council is bound to provide for the administration of justice, but have no power to pay away any money for that purpose.

74. Your committee having taken into consideration the services of the District Surveyor, would recommend that the sum of £40 be paid him in addition to his salary for the current year only.

75. The District Surveyor's account for men's wages assisting him in laying out the road work, your committee recommend to be referred to the Auditors.

81. The Petition of George Cox, assessor for Goderich, your committee cannot recommend any extra allowance to George Cox, as assessor, above what has already been provided.

83. Your committee cannot recommend any extra pay to Daryl O'Connell on his contract.

84. Your committee cannot recommend any more pay to H. and R. Bacon, than the amount stated in the report of the District Surveyor.

86, 87. Your committee recommend that the motion of Mr. Sparling, to levy a tax of £25, for the purpose of erecting a School House, in section No. 6, Blanshard, be adopted.

151. These being all accounts for Local Improvements, your committee recommend them to be referred to the Auditors.

154. Not being aware under what authority the work was done, or whether such work was ever done as stated in the account of John McDonald, your committee cannot recommend anything in this matter.

155. H. Rowell's account, your committee recommend to be audited.

156. Bond of John Kastner, your committee recommend to be filed.

158. Your committee would recommend that the Warden be empowered to grant debentures for all work done, and reported on as finished, by the District Surveyor, so soon as the accounts for the same have been duly audited.

159. The deed by G. and Ann Snell, your committee consider insufficient, as there is no memorial accompanying the same, and consequently cannot be registered.

159. As to the account of the Signal Office, for printing for the District, your committee have examined several printers, and according to their evidence there are several overcharges in the same; your committee would therefore recommend the same to be referred to the Auditors, together with these remarks thereon. All which is respectfully submitted.
