He was a little scandalized to see the Liberal papers blaming Mr. Borden for taking Col. Sam Hughes into his cabinet and making good old Dr. Sproule Speaker, when those same Laurier men were only too glad to get Sam Hughes' support when they wanted to violate the rights of the minority in the West. He claimed that the platform of the Nationalist group was that laid down by Sir John Macdonald when at Quebec in 1864 the then Conservative leader had said there must be no victor and vanquished, no inferior, no superior race in Canada. Then he felt Mr. Borden was too honorable a man to want to repudiate his policy supporting Monk's plebiscite resolution supported by Col. Hughes and all his friends. Let Canadians be asked if they want to maintain their strict autonomy as loyal Canadians, and loyal to the flag and Sovereign. Do they want secondarily to contribute directly to the Imperial Navy or do they want to build



Should Receive Help.

Saturday we referred to the sad case of Mrs. Gould, of Flower's Cove, whose son Michael, aged 17, was brought here by the Prospero and taken to the Lunatic Asylum. We find that Mrs. Gould has two other sons who are totally blind and who are a great care on her. Her husband also is a cripple and cannot work and the loss of the other boy, Michael, throws the burden of supporting the others upon her shoulders. The lad, who is eager and industrious, was at the fishery all summer, but as it proved a failure he went into the woods to work cutting telegraph poles. While "skelling" one of the poles which was very heavy the boy's foot turned under, was badly sprained and became very much swollen and causing him great pain. One of the doctors down the coast operated on him, cutting open the leg, and since that time—nine days ago up to Saturday—proper attention had not been given the limb. The boy's brain became affected with the pain, and when he was brought down to Battie Harbor Hospital it was just closing and he was transferred to the Prospero for St. John's accompanied by his mother. The poor boy had neither coat, vest, cap nor boots on him when landed here, and was clad only in a pants and singlet. The weather was exceptionally cold Saturday, and when the boy was being taken to the Asylum the police who went with him had to wrap him up in blankets for the sake of warmth. Mrs. Gould also had very little clothing on her to protect her from the cold, yet she accompanied her boy to the Asylum and cried as if her heart would break on leaving him. The money so kindly collected for her on the Prospero by Rev. Mr. Picher and Chief Steward Miller was a god send as it enabled her to buy some clothing for herself. It did not amount to a large sum, however, and the charitably disposed could not do better than by extending some help to the poor creature who has now no person to earn for her.

Alarm of Fire.

At 6.15 p.m. Saturday an alarm of fire was turned in from Box 26 for a blaze at the residence of Magistrate Fitzgerald, Theatre Hill. The central and Western firemen promptly responded but their services were not required. The fire was located in a bedroom upstairs, and one of the beds and the bedding was considerably burned. The people of the house quenched the blaze with a few buckets of water. It is not exactly known how the fire originated but it is thought that the children playing with matches caused it.

Torbay Annual Festival

On Wednesday next, the 1st of November, Feast of All Saints, the Annual Festival at Torbay will be celebrated. A departure from the usual programme will be made this year. Solemn High Mass will begin at eleven o'clock at which His Grace the Archbishop will assist and preach. After Mass the Total Abstinence Society of Torbay will make its usual parade and at 2 o'clock the Society with their guests, clerical and lay, will assemble at dinner in their hall.

Man Seriously Injured.

Saturday night a horse took fright on Duckworth Street when a young man named Beer, a servant with Mr. N. J. Vinnicombe, tried to stop it near J. J. St. John's grocery. He managed to grasp the reins but was hit and knocked down by one of the shafts, when the wagon passed over his body. He was badly bruised and cut about the head and face and bled freely from the nose and ears. A doctor was called and pronounced the man to be seriously hurt and ordered him to Hospital, where he was taken in the ambulance.

Special to Evening Telegram: SIOKAN, China, Oct. 29. The native city of Hankow was captured from the rebels yesterday after sanguinary fighting, which lasted all day. Large quantities of arms and ammunition fell into the hands of the Imperialists. The casualties among the latter numbered 200. The rebels lost 600. Two engagements were fought.

A Protest.

A Hint to the Liberals About Some Nova Scotia Seats.

Toronto, Oct. 14.—A petition has been filed at Osgoode Hall against William A. Charlton, Liberal member for Norfolk in the Commons. Alex. McCall, the defeated Conservative candidate, is the petitioner, and the charge includes almost every known corruption in politics. He alleges that both personally and through his agents Mr. Charlton was guilty of bribery, treating, persuasion, intimidation, undue influence and various other practices, such as hiring auto-carrriages, paying the railway fares of voters temporarily away from the constituency, and promising government and other positions to people for voting or refraining from voting. This is the first protest in connection with the recent elections.

THE CIGARETTE HABIT.

Much has been said of late about the evils of intemperance, but there is a habit which almost amounts to a vice which is demoralizing boys in this community. This is the practice of the inordinate smoking of cigarettes. A business man recently told our reporter that he is constrained to get clear of some young chaps in his store owing to this habit. Was the Victory Pre-Arranged.

PEKIN, To-Day.

A report of the Imperialistic victory in the vicinity of Hankow has been received from the Minister of War. It has revived the drooping spirits of the administration. An additional source of comfort has been found in the conclusion of the loan agreement, which Chinese officials say has been arranged with a Belgian syndicate having British-French connections. The loan is for \$18,000,000, the price being 38 with 6 per cent. interest. The syndicate received 4 per cent. commission. One of the legations had a report from Hankow last night that the rebels had retreated before the Imperialists without serious resistance. This creates the belief that Yin Tehang's victory may have been pre-arranged. Upon receipt of the report from the war Minister, Yuan Shi Kai immediately issued orders that the railway traffic between Pekin and Hankow be resumed. It is rumored among the Chinese that the Imperial family intended fleeing from the Capital. The agitation advised them to remain, pointing out that such a show of defeat only serves to make the conditions worse and the secession and uprising more serious and more extensive.

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Has the Emperor Been Spirited Away.

Special to Evening Telegram.

PEKIN, To-Day.

The situation at Pekin is becoming worse. A veritable panic prevails among the Manchus. One report fixed for night for an outbreak, but the presence of 15,000 Manchus troops against 3,000 Chinese insured the safety of the capital for the present. The only danger seems to be from a sudden attack against the throne or against officials, which might precipitate a massacre of the Manchus. Rumors are circulating that the Emperor has been spirited away and that Prince Ching, who is too old for flight, has committed suicide. The American legation has issued orders that women and children living along the Pekin-Hankow railway, and also in the country to the west of the line, shall proceed as soon as possible to the coast. The Government's estimate of the rebel casualties in the Hankow battle is 8,000. The Government's success is described as being largely due to the work of the marine squadron under Admiral Sah, which succeeded in enflaming the rebels in the trenches.

New York, Oct. 20.—Capt. Robert A. Bartlett, who commanded Admiral Peary's ship Roosevelt on his trip to the North Pole, arrived in the city yesterday, after having spent the summer in Beechwood, Me., where it is reported he spent some time with a well known aviator, learning how to fly. When asked if he hoped to go exploring in a flying machine, he smiled, but admitted he had made a few flights.
Capt. Bartlett said there was still work to be done in the Arctic. Admiral Peary has said he saw land 150 miles northwest of Cape Thomas Hubbard. If such land exists, Capt. Bartlett said, it would be of great scientific interest to have it explored. Under favorable conditions it could be reached, he said, in seven or eight days' march from Nansen Strait and that the entire trip could be made in about twelve months. He thought that both Capt. Scott and Amundsen had excellent chances of reaching the South Pole, as Lieut. Shackleton, he said, had mapped the route to within 100 miles of it.

Mr. Blackall's Appeal.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—In last evening's issue of your paper appeared an appeal from Mr. Blackall on behalf of the destitute families on the Labrador side of the Straits of Belle Isle. I am glad that Mr. Blackall has brought the condition of those people before the notice of the public, as they are in great straits and need immediate relief, both in food and clothing.
I had occasion to travel through that portion of the coast extending from Blanc Sablon to East St. Modest, in August, doing Mission work. The fishery was then practically over—and I can at least corroborate the statements contained in Mr. Blackall's letter re destitution.
The fishery in the Straits of Belle Isle and especially on the Labrador side, is the worst that has ever been known, in the remembrance of the oldest inhabitant. One man at East St. Modest having two traps set, secured only four quintals for his summer's catch. At Lanse au Loup, where they fish with hook only, they attribute the failure of the fishery, chiefly, to the presence of so many banking schooners which crowd into the harbors while the caplin are landed, and set out all the neighboring fishing ground with trawls, while the resident fishermen are obliged to go about six miles away from their homes to use hook and line. These people have petitioned the Government asking that trawls be prohibited on their fishing ground, but their appeal has not been even acknowledged. They have no protection whatever against the southern banker who goes there and monopolise both the caplin grounds where they get bait, and the fishing ground, where they take up all the available space with their trawls.
The people of the coast are bitter in their complaint against the treatment they receive at the hands of the Nfld. bankers as well as the neglect of the Government to grant their petition. They have no representation in the House of Assembly, and receive no Government grants of public money to build roads, bridges, etc., and yet they are forced to pay taxes to the Nfld. Government. There is a general dissatisfaction against this state of affairs, and rightly so. They claim that if they are forced to pay the same taxes as the Nfld. people, they should at least receive the same attention, both in representation and protection.
We hope that the Government will be able to help those people either by giving them employment in their own locality, on some public work, or take them to some place where work can be found, when they would be able to provide for their families for the coming winter.
The Canadian Government sent a ship to the Canadian portion of the Labrador nearly two months ago and took many of their people away to give them employment for a few months before winter. After which they will take them back to their families—I have heard this by letter since my return. Thanking you in anticipation for the publication of this letter.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 24.—Dr. Helen Knabe, was found dead in bed with her throat cut to-day in her apartments, and the police after an investigation detained for examination Jefferson Haynes, negro janitor of the apartment house, his daughter Eva, and his housekeeper, Mrs. Fannie Winston.
Dr. Knabe's body was found when her assistant, Miss Catherine McPherson, entered the apartments. The body and the bed upon which it lay were covered with blood, but no weapon was found in any of the rooms, nor was it apparent that a robbery had been committed. All the windows were closed, though the physician, who was devoted to physical culture habitually slept with the windows open. Augustus Knabe, the physician's cousin, and the latter's step-father Franc Kroppe told the police that Dr. Knabe had no enemy so far as they knew. She was 45 years old and a graduate of the Indiana College of Medicine.
Dr. Knabe recently resigned as head of State bacteriological department because, it is said, she wished to devote her spare time to the study of hygiene and physical culture. Her work for the State was under the direction of Dr. J. N. Hurly, Secretary of the State Board of Health, and she was highly respected as an analyst in food inspection, and in tracing sources of contagion.




