The southern portion of the zone between the belligerents is little better than a morass and it is not probable that the 'exposed higher ground will invite either side to action. Much confidence is placed in Enver Bey, and Shefket Pasha is displaying exceptional organizing qualities and personally supervising the military arrangements.

SOFIA, Feb. 5. General Savoff has addressed an order to the Bulgarian Army, declaring that the Turks object in the negotiations was merely to gain time, but the Bulgarians utilized the time to prepare a better advantage. We are now entirely ready and in a better state of preparedness than before the declaration of war, said the General, and in order to break the enemy's resistance, we shall have to overthrow him once more, and dictate terms of peace on the battlefield. The Turks must be driven beyond the seas.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5. "I cherish the earnest hope that your gathering may emphasize the cordial relations we know to exist bewrote King George in a message read Roberts, Sir Thomas Lipton, Admiral of Queen Alexandra.
