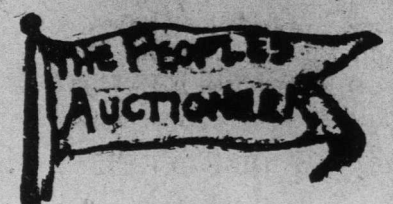

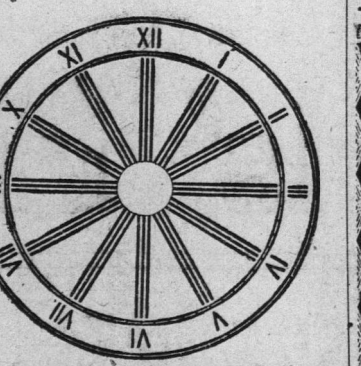

CANADIAN TROOPS ARRIVE IN ENGLAND.

OTTAWA.—It is officially announced that the Canadian troops which sailed from Halifax in April have arrived in England.

PARIS, May 9. Between the Oise and the Aisne we repulsed a German raid effected against our advance posts south-east of Aubreches. In Argonne, in Blanche district, we captured two small posts killing all the defenders and occupied several craters. On the left bank of the Meuse the enemy fiercely bombarded all night our trenches of Hill 94. A German attack delivered about 3 a.m. completely failed. On the right bank our night counter attacks enabled us to dislodge the Germans from some of our first line elements which they occupied north-west of Thiaumont farm. Intense bombardment of our lines between Ponnant and Vaue Eix and Chatillon sectors. In the Woivre, grenade fighting; also in Apremont forest and also in the Valley of Ficht. On the remainder of the front the night was relatively quiet.

VIOLENT BOMBARDMENT.

whether steps would be taken to allay universal public indignation at the reign of terror which had been established and whether the police and military had just raided the offices of the Cork Free Press, which had advocated recruiting since the outbreak of the war. Premier Asquith said he would make diligent inquiries into the matter alluded to. A veritable volley of questions was directed at the Premier from all sides of the House. Some of the members asked whether he was aware of the grave concern over executions; others whether he knew of the grave concern felt over the losses which loyalists had been suffering. Morrell, Liberal, inquired whether P. Sheehy Skiffington, editor of the Irish Citizen, had been shot in the barracks square, Dublin, before martial law was proclaimed. Timothy Healy asked whether the Premier knew whether the editors of newspapers opposed to the revolt had been shot without trial at Portobello barracks without time having been given them to say their prayers. The Premier promised to make careful enquiry into all the incidents mentioned. No one was more anxious than the Government, he said, that there should be no undue severity in the execution of the law.

THE SITUATION IN IRELAND.

LONDON, May 9. During the committee stage on the Military Service Bill in the Commons to-day, Sir John Browne, leader of the Irish Unionist Party, moved that Ireland should be included in the operation of compulsion. Premier Asquith, replying, said the question of compulsion was not a matter of agreement with Ireland, and that if the motion was persisted in, there would be protracted discussion, which would prevent the measure becoming law at the earliest possible moment. The Premier said that a very large number of representatives of Ireland were not prepared to accept compulsion in Ireland, and that it was not desirable that the country should be plunged into a controversy on the subject at this time. Ireland has just undergone a terrible ordeal, but the result of it he believed would be to establish the foundation among loyal Irishmen of a larger measure of agreement than there had ever been in the past. The Premier asked what could be worse than that representatives of Ireland should be forced into conflict at this moment. The Government, he added, was reviewing with the utmost care the military agreements in Ireland; in the matter of bearing arms he hoped a common agreement would be reached. out division. Redmond, Nationalist leader, challenged Sir Edward's assertion that the recent Government in Ireland the Nationalists had power but not responsibility. Certainly since the Coalition Government was instituted, Redmond said, I had no power in the Government of Ireland. My opinions have been overborne, my suggestions rejected. It is my profound conviction that if we had had power and responsibility during the last few years the recent occurrences would never have arisen. Redmond proceeded to declare it unfair to leave the impression that Ireland had not done well on recruiting. She had more than 150,000 men now with the colors, men who had displayed bravery and covered themselves with glory he said. He opposed conscription for Ireland, because he believed compulsion the worst possible way to get men in Ireland. After recent events his deliberate opinion was that it would be not only wrong, but well nigh insane to attempt to enforce conscription, and would be a fearful responsibility if in face of this deliberate opinion, Ulster men should persist to force conscription upon Ireland. Redmond sought the House not only for the sake of Ireland, but for the safety of the Empire, not to proceed with this course. Nobody is more anxious than I, he continued, to respond to Ulster's appeal for cooperation. I have hoped against hope, still even in the dark miserable circumstances of the moment, that we ought come together, and before long I hope with all my heart that out of these miseries we may be able by taking a large and generous view, something like a statesmanlike and far-reaching view of this Empire's highest interests, that out of this turmoil and tragedy we may evolve some means of settling these difficulties, so that we may have a united Ireland, where people and Government have both power and responsibility.

London Papers Publish America's Reply to Germany.

LONDON, May 9. All London evening papers to-day publish prominently the American reply to Germany's note on submarine warfare, but only the Westminster Gazette comments on the documents. The Gazette remarks that German concessions agreeing to adopt methods of submarine warfare in the interests of neutrals is not in conformity with President Wilson's demand, which it says, required abandonment of submarine warfare against passenger and freight carriers presumably of all nationalities. It also points out that President Wilson refers to the submarine policy of Germany having been happily abandoned. The Cynric had been sunk, and attacks had been reported on the Clan Lindsay and the French passenger steamer Doukals. So far as England is concerned, however, the newspaper says we can trust in nothing but our own power of dealing with submarines.

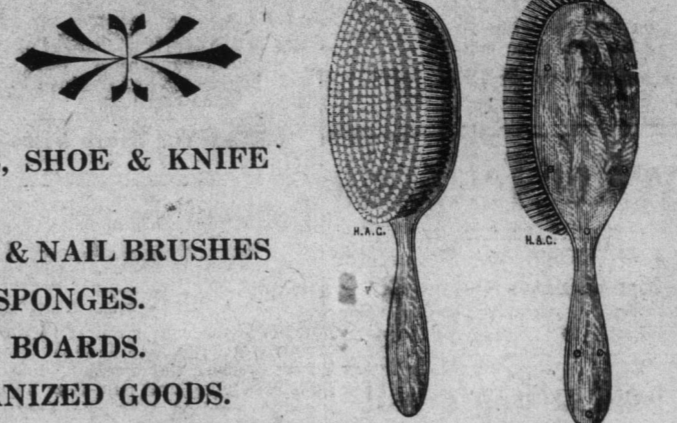

Ypres is a Naval Battle.

"More men of the British and Irish race have died in battle about Ypres than about any other place in the world," says the Manchester Guardian.
"Yet there has been very little plain speaking about the reason why and the real significance of the place in English history. Hastings, Crecy, Plassey, and Quebec each stands for something in English history.
"Does Ypres stand for something equally definite? And in any case, why are we fighting so desperately for the possession of a Belgian town? Is Ypres just a stick to beat Germans with, or is there some other good reason why we should be fighting there rather than elsewhere?
"The true inwardness of the situation seems to be that Ypres is really a naval battle. No doubt the fighting has come about there by a chain of events that are purely military, but the real reason why our army is fighting there is that it is against our interest as a sea power to let the Narrows fall into the possession of a Continental military tyranny, and that is the real reason that we are fighting there.
"Ypres is the symbol but not, of course, the seat of sea power. The fight would be for the same object if it were ten miles northeast or southwest. The reason that it has centered round Ypres is that that is the point of equilibrium between the German drive to the south and the British drive to the north. It is difficult to appraise values in the course of a war, but we think that the value of the British defence of Ypres has been as much underestimated as the value of our services in the retreat from Mons and the Battle of the Marne has been overestimated."
"Nothing is so certain as that if the Germans were to win in the west they would keep possession of the Narrows. And there is reason to believe that the first desperation of their attacks on Ypres had some connection with their plans for a submarine blockade of the British Isles which, though it was not proclaimed till three months later, had already shaped itself in their minds.

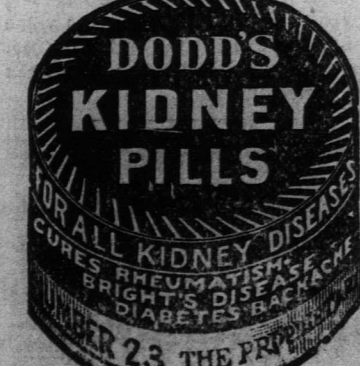

A Golden Opportunity.

There are coalescent and disruptive forces in Ireland just as there are in South Africa. A few generations ago there were similar influences at work in Canada. The effect of granting responsible government to Canada was to strengthen the coalescing element and to surround them with an atmosphere in which they could thrive. At the same time the disruptive forces were in an unbecomingly atmospheric and gradually atrophy set in, until these forces so lost strength that today they form such a negligible quantity, if indeed they exist, that Canada is united throughout its length and breadth of the land and is doing yeoman service to the Empire in the Great War. In South Africa, the time was not sufficient between the South African War, the formation of the South African Union Government and the breaking out of the Great War for these influences to have their full effect. But even the decade which ensued was sufficient to give a dominating influence to the coalescing forces and to save South Africa for the Empire. The disruptive influences had not time to die out, and Germany took advantage of this to intrigue with the irreconcilables and foment a rebellion in South Africa. The rebellion, however, was short lived. It was put down by the dominating coalescing element, under a Boer Premier, who had been the leading Boer General, fighting against British a little more than a decade previously. Further, the Boer forces under General Botha put down the Civil War and restored peace within the borders of the Union, but set to work and made a conquest of the German Colony of South West Africa, and to-day South African forces under the Boer General, Smuts, are engaged in the conquest of German South Africa. These examples are most telling object lessons as to the effects of allowing a people who wish to do so, to govern themselves in their own way. The Great War, and more particularly, the Sinn Fein Rebellion, have had the effect of bringing out in the strongest relief the great gulf between the Constitutionalists and Sinn Feiners in Ireland. The Redmondites and the Carsonites are at one as to constitutional methods of political activity, and they are at one in their adherence to the flag, and the fight against the German foe. Why should not Carson and Redmond come together formally on these lines? There should be a coalition of Redmondites and Carsonites against the Sinn Fein disruptive element. The basis is the Home Rule Act. The effect would be to reduce Sinn Feiners to a negligible political quantity, more especially as the utility of force, even in times of stress such as these, has been shown to be utterly futile as practical politics. As in Canada, the disruptive element would become a negligible element, and the immediate advantages to be reaped would be the pacifying of Ireland the more quickly and effectively and the raising of a more united Ireland on the side of the flag for the Great War and more generally for Imperial purposes.

After the second part we shall be shown several slides dealing with the senior service, our valiant R.N.R., we shall then follow our No. 1 Regiment from the Camp at Pleasantville to the Home Country, to Gallipoli and Egypt till we return with our wounded heroes to St. John's again. The C.L.B. band has kindly consented to accompany the soloists and to play during the passing of the pictures. The proceeds of this lecture will be devoted to the British Red Cross to which our wounded speaker owes his life, and which already has rescued and healed so many of Newfoundland's sons. An appeal has been sent out from the Mother Country to all her Colonies asking their help as the call on the resources of the British Red Cross and the Order of St. John of Jerusalem becomes greater and greater, and their funds are strained to the utmost. Come and help!

ELLIS' for Fresh Fish.

Portugal Seizes Newfoundland Fish.

Sir Edward Morris yesterday received a message from Mr. Holmwood, conveying the intelligence that the Portuguese Government had seized all Newfoundland fish, that he was in communication with the Foreign Office, and inviting him to co-operate in the matter. Similar messages were received by several city exporters of fish. The Prime Minister took the matter up with the Governor and the Board of Trade and communicated with the Colonial Office. The stocks of Newfoundland fish in Portugal last week amounted to 12,270 quintals.

Stephano Detained.

SHORTAGE OF WORKMEN AT HALIFAX.
There is great scarcity of workmen, particularly longshoremen, at Halifax at present and such inducements as \$5 a day (for ten hours working time) are being handed out to ordinary laborers. The Red Cross liner Stephano reached there on Monday from New York. She will be detained there longer than usual owing to the shortage of workmen and the difficulty experienced in getting them to handle cargo. A message was received this morning by Messrs. Harvey & Co., Ltd., the agents, stating that the ship would not get away for this port before late to-night or early to-morrow morning. On her last voyage the crew of the Stephano's crew assisted in the working of the ship's cargo, and the assumption is that matters were similar this trip.

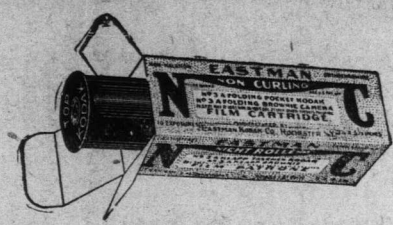

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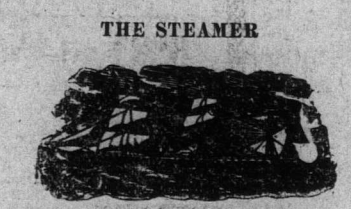

Met to Form a Municipal Government For St. John's—Their Resolutions, Bye-Laws, etc.

(By James Murphy.)
The name of Mr. Trimmingham and the name of Mr. Howson were spelled incorrectly in my notes in yesterday's Telegram. I am publishing the report as it was copied from the records; there are no words of mine embodied in it, whatever.

Following yesterday's report, it says: Mr. John Broom, jun., offered to the meeting a proposal for the regulation of fire companies and water, but it not having been seconded, was of course withdrawn. It was, however, handed over to the committee for their consideration; T. H. Brooking, chairman. Mr. Brooking left the chair and Mr. Cross having been called thereto, it was proposed by Mr. Black, seconded by Mr. Thomas and carried unanimously, that the thanks of this meeting are cordially due to Thomas H. Brooking, Esq., for his able and impartial conduct in the chair.
St. John's, April 3rd, 1826.

We the undersigned having been chosen members of the committee, appointed by the meeting of persons friendly to local regulations, held on the 2nd ultimo, but who have now withdrawn from the same, conceive it to be our duty to declare the reasons upon which that declaration has been founded. We accord most solemnly that the only motive which led us to act with those persons who were opposed to us in opinion relative to a Charter of Incorporation for this town, was an understanding that a repeal of the 35th Section of the 5th Cap. of the 5th Geo. IV. was to have been petitioned for, and that some other plan for obtaining such regulations as might appear desirable would have been adopted. That in our opinion the unanimity which prevailed at the meeting in which our appointment originated, was produced by a conviction of the same nature, as we firmly believe that by far the larger part of the persons then present acted under a persuasion that the scheme of incorporation contemplated by the Act referred to had been given up. That as agents of that meeting we conceive we should be violating the trust which has been confided to us, were we to continue our discussions upon any other grounds than those which we believed to have been agreed upon by both parties. That a resolution to petition for a repeal of the clause above named having been negatived in the committee, we cannot refrain from expressing our regret at what appears to us to be a departure from the principles laid down for our government, and we therefore should not be justified were we not to return to our constituents the powers which

they have delegated to us, sincerely lamenting that we could not exercise them without disappointing, as we conceive them just and expeditious. The Municipal Bill

Citizens' Committee Met Last Night—Recommendations on System of Discussing the Charter Submitted by Four Members.—This Work not Appreciated by some Present.

After considerable delay last night the Citizens' Committee commenced their meeting at 9.50, twenty members constituting a quorum. The chairman called the meeting to order. The Secretary read the minutes of the last meeting which were adopted. Letters were read from the Premier and Mr. W. J. Higgins, Secretary of the Select Committee of the Legislature. The Chairman then announced that a set of rules governing the working of the committee and the appointment of sub-committees to report to the general committee, had been drawn up by four members of the committee and would be submitted for their approval. Some of the members were offended at the actions of the four members and thought they should not make any suggestions without the authority of the general committee. Others ruled that it was not necessary to ask permission of the general committee, as any member or number of members were at liberty to make what suggestions they like and it was up to the general committee to approve or disapprove what they recommended. After much discussion it was proposed by Mr. Alex. Mews that the report be accepted and that four months, not including July and August, be given in which the meetings in future will be governed by the suggestions made by the four committeemen. It was seconded by Mr. Pope, and carried by a vote of 13 to 5. The following sub-committees will be appointed, committee rooms will be secured and dates of meetings arranged.

1. LEGAL.—This Sub-Committee shall deal with the following matters—The revision of all resolutions bearing directly upon the Municipal Bill so as to bring the wording of the same into agreement with the intentions of the Committee passing the same. The correction of errors and the drafting of new sections, omitting of old ones and the amending of any, due to changes in other sections made by the General Committee.

2. TO report on sections 1 to 5, 7, 325 and 327.

To make recommendations as to legal procedure in the Bill.

3. BOUNDARIES.—This Sub-Committee shall report on the boundaries of the City as set forth in section 6 of the Bill. If the "Ward System" is determined upon by electors to be enforced, this Sub-Committee shall also divide the City into wards.

4. ELECTIONS.—This Sub-Committee shall report on the following matters—Qualifications of electors and elected. Method of carrying out elections. Sections 8 to 23.

5. CITY PROPERTY.—This Sub-Committee shall report on the following matters—Duties of Mayor and Councilors. General Powers of the Council. Procedure at Council meetings. Appointment and duties of Officers. Sections 24 to 57; 309 to 330; 331 to 338; 242 to 244; and 72.

6. CITY PROPERT.—This Sub-Committee shall report on the following matters—Property belonging to the City; Crown Lands. Payment for improvements. Houses for working men. Town planning. Streets and street traffic. Parks, lighting, Franchises and Library. Sections 58 to 93; 121 to 153; 149 and 195.

7. HEALTH.—This Sub-Committee shall report on the following matters—Water supply, Sanitation. Duties of Medical Officer, Sanitary Supervisor and Inspector. Sections 94 to 130; 159 to 192; 150 to 153, 328; 329, 377 to 379.

8. REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.—This Sub-Committee shall report on Taxes on Dogs, Horses and Vehicles, Motor Cars, City Tax Assessments, Exemptions, Estimates, Enforcements of the law in relation to taxes. Arrears, License Fees, Water rates for shipping. City debt. Expenditure. Contracts. Commission of enquiry. Loans, Insurance. Sections 196 to 208.

9. BUILDING AND HOUSING.—This Sub-Committee shall report on regulations as to buildings. Fire and health protection. Sections 239 to 338.

10. LEASE.—This Sub-Committee shall report on—The relations of land to and tenement as far as the Bill deals with them, or ought to deal with them. Especially Sections 94 to 96. The meeting closed at 11.20 to meet again when requested by the Chairman and Secretary.

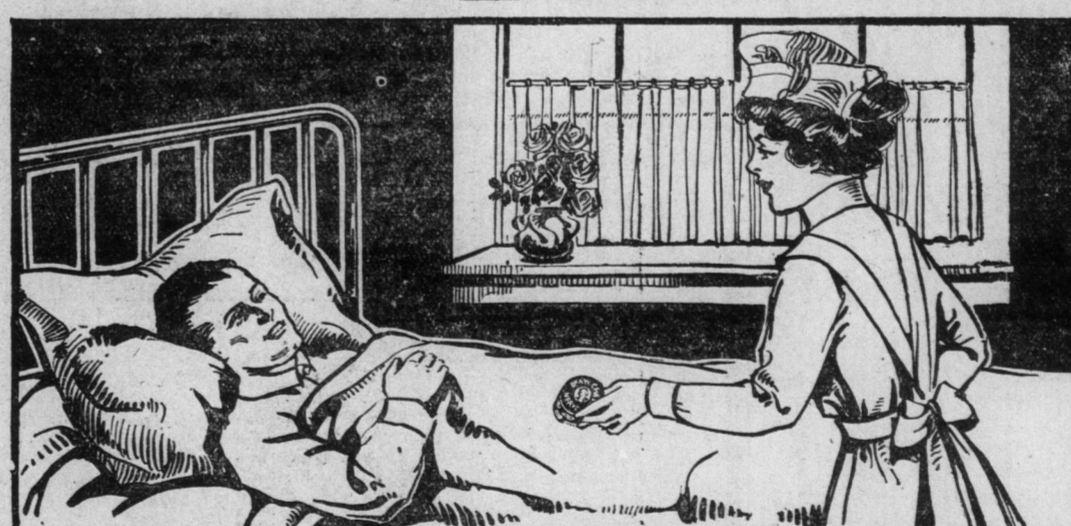
