





Newfoundland, Unlike Canada, has never given the Mother Country preference under her Tariff, and is now under present Exchange Situation, actually giving a very great prefer-

designate their native land as "The Most Ancient and Loyal Colony," and are pleased to hear their Country so designated. But there is at least one point as regards patriotism, in which we may be blessed for being lacking and the same is accentuated to-day.

Other British Colonies and Domin ions give Britain a preferential duty with regard to imports. Canada does, and it seems peculiar that we who have followed Canadian systems so closely and especially those of taxation and finance have not with regard to this, and bearing in mind our proud title of "Loyal" also done the same.

I consider that this is, at this time, a matter for public discussion and consideration and it may be that through the press we may get some opinions on the matter, which may lead to something being done. Some time prior to this, I discussed the matter of Imperial Preference with my friend Mr. Harold Mitchell and other officers of the earlier Veteran Executives, and members, and they thought something should certainly be done in the way of Empire Trade Preferences.

I am hopeful that Colonel Bernard and the present Executive, and menibers of the G. W. V. A., in the present as in their past endeavours to keep the Empire firmly knit together, will shortly take this matter up, as they are qualified to speak to it and no doubt will. It is also to be hoped that influential bodies like the Board of Trade, the Men's Patriotic Association, our Societies and Labour Organizations may discuss this matter and we should like to see the various Women's Patriotic Associations, continuing the good work they have been doing, making themselves heard on it.

In fact, the women, as being most largely the shoppers of the Dominion, can take this matter to a large extent into their hands and no doubt will.

We should now have a tariff that is for the good and upbuilding of the Empire and not one to build up or give unwarranted strength to any other

It may be that this will, amongst other Post-War Problems be taken up by the Government this session, and we shall be glad to learn that this is the case, and we may depend on the statesmen on both sides of the House to act, and we should especially expect to hear from our War Veteran members.

Britain's Superstitious Survival.

As recently as Monday, March 25, 1895, five men were tried on a charge of having in the British Isles burned to death a woman, because they believed her to be a witch, on the 15th of that month. This crime was committed at Ballyvadlea, near Clonmel, a market and assize town on the borders of the counties Tipperary and Waterford, in Ireland. The was Bridget Cleery, aged only twentyseven, the wife of one of the murderers, who were not, however, condemned to execution, but on July 5 her husband was sentenced to twenty years imprisonment, and the others to various terms of such confinement. On Sept. 17, 1875, an old woman, named Ann Turner, was killed as a witch at Long Compton, in Warwickshire, but in this case the murderer was half mad. But on August 4, 1863 at Castle Hedingham, in Essex, a poor old deaf and dumb Frenchman was ducked as a wizard, having practised fortune-telling to a little extent, but refusing to heal the ailments of his neighbours. A mob of small shopkeepers and women, of whom two were tried as the ring-leaders, had half suffocated him in a ditch, and then struck him severely. In 1602, after the restoration of Charles the 2nd, Sir Matthew Hale, the eminent barrister and judge. condemned for withcraft two women. who were therefore burned to death. About 1676 at least seventeen persons were thus hurned at St. Osvth's narish in Essex for this and other offences In 1706 two pretended witches were executed at Northampton, and five others seven years afterwards, and in 1716. Field-Marshal Viscount Wolseley-

Wolseley, he was born in Dublin, June 4, 1833, and before he was 19, Garnet Wolseley was an ensign in the 12th Regiment. Soon afterwards he ransferred to the 80th, with which he served in the second Burmese war, where he was severely wounded, and invalided to England. 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

Where Are the Patients?

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—A letter from Dr. Parsons has appeared in the papers, mentioning that there are fifty soldiers suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis in hospital at present. This is a great surprise to those connected with the two hospitals given up to the special care and treatment of these cases, namely, the Jensen Camp and Escasoni. The Jensen Camp, which takes 27 patients, has not been filled for some mouths. In February the number became reduced to 17, and remained so till last Saturday, when 1 more was added, so now there are) possible beds vacant. Escasoni, which was opened last spring for the overflow from the Jeusen Camp, has 16 beds, but only 15 patients. In these two special T. B. Hospitals for sailors and soldiers there are only 33 patients, instead of 43. Why is this, or where are the remaining 17 sofferers? Are they scattered through the Convalescent Homes and the General Hozpital? We hear that the latter place has only surgical cases. Where are they? To-day at the Military Hospital there are 6 patients, and at Waterford Hall there will be 11 to-merrow -there are 9 at present. This makes 48 patients in the four hospitals, but surely they are not all suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis, and if so why are the 9 at Waterford Hall not filling the 9 empty beds at Jenson Camp? Many of the main expenses --heat, light, etc.,-remain the same

partially filled? Dr. Parsons mentions that there are 177 ex-service men who have or have had pulmonary tuberculosis. One handred and forty-eight (144 soldiers and 4 sailors) have been treated at the Jensen Camp since its opening in October, 1916, three and a half years ago. Of these, 16 were readmitted for second treatment at the Camp, and I understand that a few more were readmitted at Escasoni during the past year. Ten have died, most of them being very advanced cases when brought to the hospital. Of the 133 remaining, only 18 are Sanitarium patients there now.

one Chevron may be worn in respect of sea-going service, or captivity or internment in an enemy country, during the period from the 4th of August, 1914, to 31st December, 1914.

2. One Chevron may be worn in respect of each or any of the three calendar years 1915, 1916 and 1917, provided that at least three months of the year have been spent afloat in sea-going service, or in captivity in an enemy country or both.

3. One Chevron may be worn in respect of the remainder of the war, when twelve months have been spent since 1st January, 1918, in

sea-going service (with or with-out a period of captivity in an

enemy country), provided that the period of twelve months has commenced before 11th Novem-ber, 1918, when the armistice was

The Chevrons for 1914 are:—
(1) For Captains and Officers,

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
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
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
