An Insurrection Feared in Spain. The Belfast Riots Still Going On. The Geneva Arbitration Nearly Ended. A Splendid Banquet.
Madrid, August 24th. - Fears are entertained by the Government of another insurrection in the Provinces bordering on France, and preparations are now being made to promptly repress any disorder which may occur.
London, August 24th. - A private telegram from Belfast, received this morning, reports that the rioting has been renewed in that city, and that several severe encounters between the two opposing parties have occurred.
London, Aug. 24, 6 a. m. - Great excitement prevails in Drogheda, and an outbreak is momentarily feared. The military are confined to their barracks. Quiet continues in Belfast. The Mayor has ordered that all public houses remain closed until Tuesday.
New York, August 26th. - A Geneva special to the Herald says that the business of the Board of Arbitration is drawing to a close and the work of the council is practically done, all arguments having been submitted.
J. Bancroft Davis, American agent, gave a splendid banquet to the arbitrators, the counsel and their families on Friday, at the Hotel Beaurivage, which was succeeded by a brilliant ball, to which many resident Americans were invited.

NEWS ITEMS.

PATENTS - The new law allowing foreigners, without distinction, to obtain patents in the United States comes into effect on September 1st.
The British Consular - The crisis of the match between the Gentlemen of England and twenty-two of the Montreal Club terminated on Friday.
REV. PROF. BOGUS - The Hamilton Spectator says: "We learn upon what we deem reliable authority that Prof. Inglis has accepted a call from the leading Presbyterian congregation of the city of Brooklyn. While congratulating Prof. Inglis on the enlarged sphere of usefulness which this position places him in, we feel that his departure is a serious loss to the church in Canada. In noble devotion to his Master's work, Prof. Inglis will leave no superior behind him in intellectual power; in high attainments, in ripe maturity of thought, he will leave no equal."
COURTSHIP NOTES - On the whole, we think it now almost certain that there will be a large majority in Ontario against the Government, and a small majority in the two Provinces of Quebec and Canada.

If anything like this result shall be realized, the question will present itself, whether the Premier from Ontario can carry on the Government against the overwhelming opinion of his own Province, and against the majority even in Canada proper, by aid of outlying Provinces, whose representation has in some cases been most unjustly made tenfold that of the other Provinces, which provide all the means for carrying on the Government; and which, in other cases, have been bought up wholesale by bribery under the name of better terms.

HORRIBLE INCIDENT - Just as we go to press we have the painful duty of chronicling an awful outrage. Samuel Butler, the colored barber of Listowel, lately accused of murdering his wife, arrived in the village this (Wednesday) afternoon. His daughter Ann, a little over 14 years of age, engaged as a servant with Robert Allen, was visited about 5 p. m., by Butler, and taken by him towards the bush between the railroad and the gravel road.
CHICAGO KEEPS THREE POLICE COURTS RUNNING - Chicago keeps three police courts running to meet the demands of justice created mostly by its two thousand saloons.
EVERY PERSON, without regard to race, sex, or condition, who is found in the streets of the cities and towns of Russia in a state of intoxication, is compelled to work at sweeping the streets during the whole of the next day.
THE STEAM FLEET of Lake Superior now numbers 81 vessels, including Canadian vessels, while two years ago there were but 14 vessels in all of which 2 were Canadian.
A GENTLEMAN in Baltimore who had applied for a third-class government clerkship at a salary of \$1,600, failed to pass the examination, when his wife applied for it, passed a satisfactory examination, and received the appointment.
DURING THE MONTH of July the thirtieth anniversary of the establishment of the Kingdom of Norway was celebrated throughout this country with great spirit.
A DAILY EVENING Chinese paper is published in San Francisco, and distributed regularly to subscribers by carriers. It is called the "San Francisco Daily Evening Job Jab."

ELECTION NEWS.

On Wednesday the Ottawa Times classed Mr. Sturton as a Ministerialist, but the next day it corrected the error, and said he was a Grit of the worst kind. We are glad to find that it gives him such a good character.

The Brockville Recorder says that, now Sir John has been made a member of the Queen's Privy Council, the other members of the Council had better look out or he will "slap their chops."

The London Advertiser says that at the Lambton nomination "Sir John A. Macdonald was in a state of intoxication, several times gave the lie to Mr. Mackenzie, and indulged in the coarsest abuse of the leader of the Opposition. Mr. Mackenzie's calm and gentlemanly demeanor, compared with the orgies of the Premier, produced a profound impression on the audience. Many leading Conservatives were so humiliated by the conduct of the head of their party, that they came up to Mr. Mackenzie after the proceedings, and voluntarily pledged him their support." The *Sarnia Observer* says about Sir John's conduct: "While the exhibition of Wednesday last was enough to humble the proudest Conservative in the County, and make him blush that the Premier of the Dominion made such a humiliating spectacle of himself, and brought such disgrace upon the whole country,—it at the same time affords all who have a spark of self-respect left, a notable excuse of cutting their connection with the 'Party of Slander,' of which Sir John on Wednesday last proved himself such a notable ring-leader.

The Essex Recorder has a scheme to dispose of Sir Francis, which, in its opinion, would exactly suit the case. Let the Premier give the Hon. John O'Connor the county judgeship he covets, and having gotten him out of the way, send Sir Francis to Essex.

A St. Catharines paper says that election for Niagara will be thoroughly ventilated. Mr. Currie and his friends have nothing to fear, and they will establish beyond doubt that Mr. Currie polled a larger number of legal votes than his opponent. Evidence of the most direct kind will be forthcoming against Mr. Morrison, quite sufficient to unseat him, and which will deprive him from a seat in the present Parliament.

The *Mail* says that the reason why David Thompson was returned for Haldimand by acclamation was that he promised to give a support to all government measures. What utter rot is this. Why, there was not in the late House of Commons a more steadfast, consistent and unwavering opponent of the Government than David Thompson. There was not a single moment during the last five years when, had Mr. Thompson the opportunity, he would not have voted to throw the Macdonald-Cartier Government overboard, neck and heels. Of all the men who have been returned for the new House of Commons, there is not one who would go farther to oust Sir John A. than David Thompson of Haldimand.

EDITORIAL NEWS.

It is noticed that the death rate in New York city keeps even pace with the thermometer, rising as that rises. Last week the thermometer ranged seven degrees higher than the week previous, and the number of deaths was 107 more than the week previous. The *Times* calculates, therefore, that every degree which the thermometer reaches above the main temperature 70°, costs in one week the lives of fifteen persons.

It is asserted in Morgan's *Trade Journal* that the Premier of Canada will shortly be personally engaged in England in making financial arrangements in relation to the loan for the construction of the Canada Pacific Railway.

The St. Catharines *Times* says that the last 'revelation' of the misdeeds of that fearfully bad man, the Hon. A. Mackenzie, is that he is to blame for the direct and consequential damages resulting from the sinking of the old barge 'Saginaw' in Lock 3, because, forsooth, Mr. Mackenzie worked on the said lock as a stone mason.

An Ottawa correspondent of the *Toronto Leader* says there is some foundation for the rumor that Cuban agents are at work in Montreal endeavoring to enlist men to serve in the Cuban army. The Government have been apprised of the fact, and will issue a proclamation warning her Majesty's subjects against enlistments of persons for service with the insurgents of Cuba, or fitting out vessels for any such purpose.

The Berlin *Telegraph* says that Rev. J. F. Dickie, the pastor of St. Andrew's Church, was, last week, made the recipient of a very handsome silk pulpit gown, the gift of one of the members of his congregation. This is another evidence, of many

that already have been given, of the high esteem in which Mr. Dickie, both as a preacher and as a pastor, is held by his people.

It is said that the people of Prince Edward Island are now in favor of Confederation, and that all parties see its advisability and even its necessity.

Mr. Goldwin Smith, in the current number of the *Canadian Monthly*, referring to the now present election contest, and the unworthy means which will be resorted to in order to gain Party advantages, says: "Already factions are trying to make electioneering capital out of an industrial war—as heinous a breach of patriotism, as in an industrial community like ours, it is possible to commit, and one which the community, if it has any regard for its own most vital interests, will sternly resent. The fact is that, in such periods of ignoble frenzy, electioneering capital would be made out of a plague."

Some time ago, says the *Huron Expositor*, a turkey gobbler belonging to Mr. Solomon J. Shannon, of lot 20, eighth concession, McKillop, was observed to persist in 'setting' on a nest like a hen. Some of the family, remarking the gobbler's singular conduct, placed a number of eggs under him, and on these eggs he continued to sit, only going off to get food, until they were hatched out. Now he is taking care of the young brood in the most motherly way—watching over them and providing for them in a manner that would be no discredit to the oldest and most experienced hen of the barn-yard.

Mr. D. V. Delong, of Woodstock, shipped on Monday, Aug. 12th, from that station, a 'month's make' of cheese from the 'Woodstock Factory,' situated in East Oxford, contiguous to the town. The lot weighed 22,000 lbs., and was purchased by Mr. John Byron of Ingersoll, at 10 cts. per lb.

THE DEATH OF THE LATE REV. DEAN BETHUNE.—The death of this venerable and venerated clergyman occurred on Thursday morning at his residence McGill College Avenue, Montreal. The Very Reverend gentleman was, by far, the oldest clergyman in that city, or, indeed, in the Province of Ontario, being at the time of his decease eighty-two years of age. He was one of the many excellent citizens which this country owes to the stock of U. E. loyalists, who, being too firmly attached to their principles to accept the Republican form of Government which was established in the United States as a consequence of the revolution, left the homes they had made for themselves in the old thirteen colonies to continue their allegiance to the British Crown. His father had settled in South Carolina, having emigrated from the Isle of Skye in 1751; and, as we have said, came to Canada when that with the other colonies ceased to be British. Deceased was brother to the Lord Bishop of Toronto.

Should the owners of patented lands, or purchasers of lands (the sales of which are being carried out), fail to apply for and acquire the right to the pine trees on such lands within six months from the date of this notice; or purchasers of lands after this date decline at the time of application to purchase to apply for and acquire the right to the pine trees on the lands applied for, the pine trees on such lands will be disposed of by the Department of Crown Lands to persons making application therefor at the above mentioned rate of fifty cents per acre; but should there be more than one applicant for any space, or locality, the right to the pine trees shall be awarded to the applicant tendering, and paying the highest amount per acre over and above fifty cents.

Bargain and Sale in Cardwell.

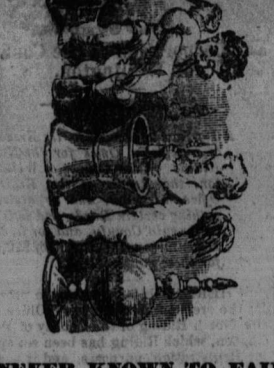
The hustings of the County of Cardwell was, on Thursday, the scene of very extraordinary occurrences. Two conservative candidates have been contending during the last few weeks—Mr. Harris and Mr. T. B. Ferguson—the latter the old member, and the former having received the unanimous nomination of a Conservative convention, regularly called and representing a large majority of the party in the county. Mr. Harris has frequently declared his determination to go to the poll at all hazards; neither persuasion nor bribes, he averred, would induce him to betray the trust placed in him by his party. We have it on perfectly reliable authority that before the nomination on Thursday, Mr. Harris was offered by Mr. John Hilliard Cameron or his agent, the sum of \$6,000 to induce him to leave the field, Mr. Ferguson having previously been rendered willing to do likewise by the same means. Mr. Harris refused the bribe; he went on the hustings, was nominated along with Mr. Ferguson, made his speech and demanded a poll. Mr. Cameron was also nominated, but did not demand a poll, evidently considering that the attempt to get rid of Mr. Harris was hopeless, and that he had nothing to do but to return to Toronto after his speech on behalf of the Government was finished. After the nomination was closed, however, the negotiations between Mr. Harris and Mr. Cameron—whose go-between, we believe, was Dr. Tupper, the hero of the McNab bargain, and the Spring Hill Mines job—and Mr. Harris was induced to retire. The sum is not ascertained, but the popular impression is that \$8,000 was Mr. Harris' price. He was virtuous while \$6,000 was offered, being a wealthy man and childless, but \$8,000 was too much for him.

Mr. Cameron did not demand a poll on the hustings, and it is a question for the lawyers to decide whether he can now present himself before the electors. Should, however, the Returning Officer decide to receive votes for him, there is nothing else to do but defeat him at the polls. We cannot leave the decision of any question to the chances of a partisan parliamentary committee.—Globe.

Sir Roundell Palmer's fee of \$150,000 for attending to the interests of Great Britain at the Geneva Conference, is said to be the largest single fee ever paid to a British lawyer. There have been several instances in the United States where \$50,000 have been paid. Clarkson N. Potter having received that fee in a railroad case, and Gen Sikes a similar sum for ousting the Gould dynasty from Erie.

The Corporation of the County of Wellington.

BY-LAW No. —

A By-Law to provide for the Erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, the Repair of the Registry Office in Guelph, and to assist in making certain Roads and Bridges in the said County, and for issuing Debentures to the amount of \$20,000 for these purposes.

WHEREAS It is necessary to provide for the erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, which Riding has been set apart for Registration purposes, and it is also necessary to provide for the repair and improvement of the County Registry Office in the Town of Guelph.

And whereas for these purposes the sum of Five thousand Dollars is required: And whereas it is expedient to grant aid by way of a grant of money, payable as hereinafter mentioned, to the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph hereinafter mentioned towards opening and making the new Roads and Bridges hereinafter mentioned in the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph in the said County hereinafter mentioned, and to grant the sums hereinafter mentioned to assist in making and maintaining the Township and County lines hereinafter mentioned; and the Council of the Corporation of the County of Wellington, deeming the County at large sufficiently interested in the said works to justify such assistance, but not sufficiently interested to justify the Council in at once assuming the same as County Works, namely:

- To the Township of Maryborough towards making the road known as the centre side road in that Township..... \$600
- To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the road between the eighth and ninth concessions in that township..... 800
- To the Township of West Garrafrax towards making the road between the third and fourth concessions in that township..... 200
- To the Township of Pickerington towards making a bridge across the Grand River at the fifth and sixth concessions..... 400
- To the Township of Peel towards making the road known as the Minto and Normanby town line \$800, on condition that the County of Guelph grant an equal amount.. 800
- To the Township of Luther towards making bridges over rivers and streams crossing the road known as the side road between lots thirty and thirty-one in that township 600
- The Village of Elora towards making the road in that village connecting the County roads..... 200
- To the Township of East Garrafrax towards making the road known as the extension of the Ferguson and Douglas County Road to Waldemar Railway Station..... 500
- To the Township of Arthur towards making the road known as the Centre side road in that township 500
- To the Township of West Garrafrax towards making a bridge over the Grand River on the road between the second and third concessions of that township..... 500
- To the Village of Mount Forest towards making the road known as the town line east of Main street, and the bridge over the river Matilda, in the Township of Mount Forest..... 800
- To the Town of Guelph towards making a bridge over the river Speed, in Wellington street, by Mr. Gow's mill in Guelph town.. 500
- To the Village of Orangeville towards making a bridge over the river Credit in that village..... 200
- To the Township of Erin towards making the road from Erin to Erin village..... 400
- To the Village of Arthur, towards making a road between the village of Arthur, township of Arthur and Luther, to Arthur railway station 200
- To the Township of Peel towards making the road known as the centre side road in Peel from Arthur village to Glenallen..... 1000
- To the Township of Amaranth towards making the road known as the seventh concession line in that township..... 1000
- To the Township of Erin towards making the road in that township from Rockwood to the town line of Guelph..... 200
- To the Township of Maryborough towards making a bridge over the Spring Creek on the road known as the Kilgours' road in that township..... 400
- To the Township of East Garrafrax towards making the road between the fourteenth and fifteenth concessions of that township..... 500
- To the Township of East Garrafrax towards making the town line road between the townships of Amaranth and Luther and East Garrafrax..... 400
- To the Township of Arthur towards making the town line road between the townships of Peel, Maryborough and Arthur..... 800
- To the Township of East Garrafrax towards making the town line road between the townships of East Garrafrax and Erin..... 200
- To the Township of Peel towards making the townline road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough from Drayton to Drayton station..... 100
- To the Township of Maryborough towards making the townline road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough at the hill at the fourteenth concession..... 100
- To the Township of Luther towards making the townline road between the townships of Arthur and Luther..... 400

And whereas it is necessary to rebuild the bridges at Arthur: at the Four Mile Creek and across the Irvine River on the road assumed by and belonging to the said County, known as the Guelph and Mount Forest Road, and the sum of four thousand two hundred dollars is required to rebuild the said bridges.

And whereas for the purposes aforesaid it is necessary to create a debt of twenty thousand Dollars to be repaid in the manner hereinafter mentioned. And whereas it will require the sum of three thousand and nineteen dollars to be raised annually by special rate for the payment of the said sum of twenty thousand dollars and interest.

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said County of Wellington, irrespective of any future increase of the same, and irrespective of any interest in or income from the said office, and the said County Roads and Bridges, and also irrespective of any interest to arise from any temporary investments of the sinking fund hereinafter mentioned, of any part thereof, was according to the last revised and equalized assessment roll of the said County of Wellington, \$13,856,298.

And whereas for paying the interest and creating an annual sinking fund for the payment of the principal of the said sum of twenty thousand dollars it will require an equal annual special rate of one cent on a mill in the dollar to be levied in addition to all other rates.

And whereas the amount of the existing debt of the Corporation of the County of Wellington is for principal the sum of \$80,680.03, and for interest the sum of \$80,680.03, and whereas there is interest accrued and whereas there is interest accrued.

And whereas the Corporation of the County of Wellington has not in the municipal year contracted any debts of loans over and above the sum required for its ordinary expenses, which, including the said sum of twenty thousand dollars, exceed the sum of one hundred dollars; That the Board of the said County for the time being, be, and it is hereby authorized, empowered, and required for the purposes aforesaid, to issue in due form of law the sum of twenty thousand dollars in Debentures of the said Corporation of the said County in and of not less than one hundred dollars each, payable in twelve years as farthest from the day on which this by-law is appointed to take effect, at the office of the Treasurer of the said County, and that every such Debenture shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum from the date of its issue, payable half yearly at the said office, and shall be signed by the Wardens, and countersigned by the Treasurer for the time being of the said County, and shall have attached thereto coupons for the payment of said interest, which Debentures the Wardens is hereby authorized to negotiate.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of said Debentures and interest, an equal special rate of one-fourth of a mill in the dollar in addition to all other rates be levied, and collected in each year upon all rateable property in the said County during the continuance of the said Debentures.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, the proceeds of the said Debentures shall be applied and apportioned to the several purposes hereinafter mentioned, and in the amount and proportion aforesaid, the grants of the said Debentures shall be paid to the Treasurers thereof respectively, to be applied by them strictly to the purposes aforesaid, and an account of such application to be returned by each Reeve to the Council of the said County, at the next December Session of this Council.

No person lending money upon or purchasing said Debentures shall be bound to see to the application of the proceeds thereof.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, this By-law shall take effect upon, from and after the first day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two.

The above is a true copy of a proposed By-law to be taken into consideration by the Municipality of the County of Wellington, at the Court House, in the Town of Guelph, in the said County, on the first day of October, 1872, at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon, at which time and place the members of the Council are hereby required to attend for the purpose aforesaid.
