It was damaged to the extent of \$1,000. There were no casualties to passengers or train men.

The Dog and Poultry Show. The first show of the Victoria Dog and Poultry Association will be held at the skating rink, Yates street, on the 27th, 28th and 29th of December next. The committee who have the management of the show are determined to make this the first exhibition of the association, a success, and with this object in view, one hundred gold and silver cups and medals will be awarded as prizes. The exhibitors will include all the dogs and poultry, there will be prizes for choice breeds of cats, rabbits, pigeons, etc. Prizes will also be given for the best specimen of any of the above classes. The Steamer North Pacific. The steamer Olympian has been temporarily withdrawn from the route in order that an inspection may be made of her cylinder, her place being taken by the North Pacific. The Olympian is expected to arrive at her berth here last evening in charge of Capt. Roberts, having made the run from Port Townsend to Seattle in 24 hours. She has been greatly improved since she was taken of the Sound route, and is now being run on the coast.

Part of the material for Messrs. Dunsmuir & Son's new tug is already on the ways at Lang's ship-yard, where work on the hull will be commenced at once. The tug is to be 100 feet long, 20 feet wide, and will be propelled by a single screw propeller, and will be fitted with a single cylinder, automatic cylinder, having either fuel or oil as desired. The Dunsmuir tug will be built on the Westmain, Nanaimo and Comox routes next Wednesday.

The steamer Otter, an old veteran of the coast, for many years owned and run by the Hudson's Bay Co., is now being dismantled at Sprat's wharf. Her machinery is to be removed, her upper works are to be taken down, and the old hull transformed into a coal scow. The Otter has a record running parallel with the early history of the province. She was built in the old country of British Columbia, by the best ship carpenter of the day, and was captured by the American privateer, the Crystal Palace, Sydney in 1851, and she was regarded as the best vessel on the coast. She never was a fast boat, but millions of dollars of the golden metal she carried during the early days of the gold rush, was the result of her search for her hidden wealth.
