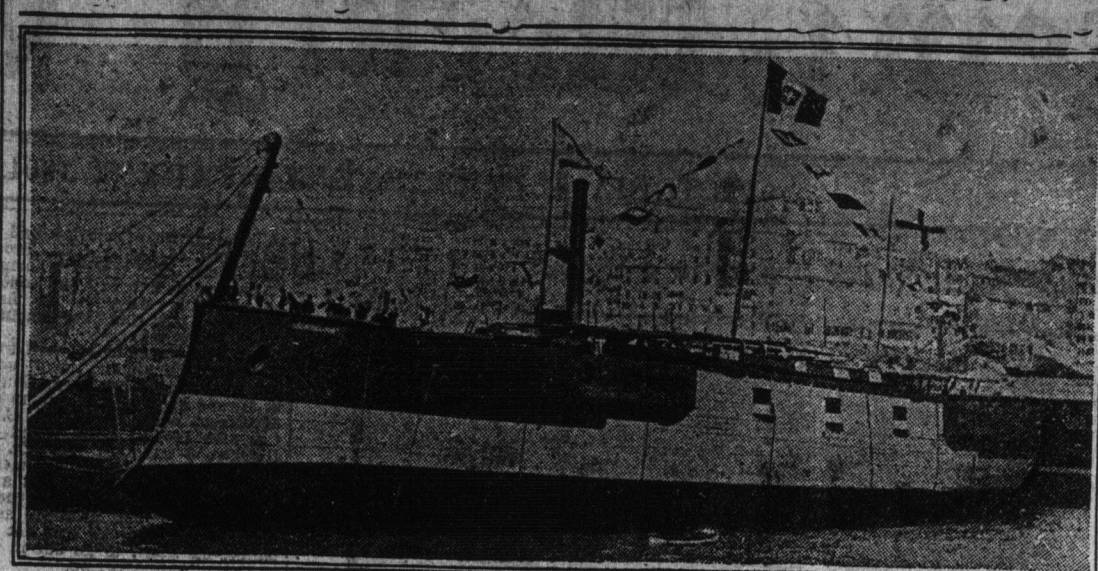

A UNIQUE PISTOL.

A Hammerless, Automatic Pocket Pistol, Without a Recoil and Only Three-quarters of an Inch Thick—The Latest Invention of Mr. John M. Browning, the Famous Gun Inventor of Ogden, Utah.

A pistol, not a revolver, which will fire seven shots a second, which has no projecting hammer nor cartridge cylinder, and which cannot be accidentally discharged, seems a most desirable and possible weapon, yet such an arm has recently been invented and demonstrated as a success by no less a person than Mr. John M. Browning, the inventor of the deadly automatic machine gun, capable of firing 400 to 500 shots a minute.

Mr. Browning's fame as a gun inventor is indisputable, having secured and sold the patent rights of no less than fifteen distinct types of guns, and but recently derived a handsome sum from the repeating shotgun, a problem in firearms which has always been considered impossible.

The chief idea in devising the new automatic pistol was compactness and light weight. For a gentleman's firearm, as this was designed to be, Mr. Browning desired a pocket pistol of efficiency in as small a space as possible, and the result is a pistol only seven inches long, three-quarters of an inch thick, and weighing only twenty-three ounces. By taking a copy of an average sized paper novel and magnifying it to two inches wide by three long, taken out of it, a pistol of the same size and shape of the new weapon.

The one opening movement which is made by hand before firing the first shot is all that is required for a whole day's shooting. This is due to the fact that the action is automatic, and when the last cartridge in the magazine is fired, the shell discharged, the hammer comes to full cock, the same as it would were the magazine loaded. This makes it ready for the reception of a new cartridge, and upon reloading the magazine no further action is necessary.

The upper end of the magazine is open to permit the escape of the cartridges; the slide which is at the rear of the opening is turned inward and engages the rim of the topmost cartridge to prevent its escape from the magazine when it is pushed forward.

The slide, which is pushed forward, is a solid metal for the breech block. As the slide and breech block are one piece, the slide is slipped on from the forward end, it will be seen that to prevent gun powder or gas or powder come backward through the arm.

The magazine, as will be noted by the illustrations, has a hole in the side, which act as indicators to designate the number of cartridges in the magazine. The pistol is provided with a safety device which makes it impossible to release the hammer unless the slide and barrel are in their forward position and safety closed; this safety device also controls the trigger, so that when the trigger is pulled, the hammer is not fired unless the slide is in its raised position.

The safety-piece does not interfere with the operation of the trigger, but when the slide is moved rearward the bottom of the bolt depresses the trigger, which in that position, prevents the movement of the trigger from operating the hammer, and thus the hammer is prevented from firing until the slide is again in its forward position, locked to the barrel.

The slide lock, which also acts as an indicator, showing whether the hammer is cocked or not. When the hammer is cocked, the slide lock is pushed upward and it will engage with the corresponding cut in the slide.
