NO CANADIAN BUTTER USED ON BRITISH VESSELS.

Great Market for a Good Article—Trade Papers Talk About Conndian Butter— Difficulties Instructors Would Encoun-"When I was in Liverpool some years ago was engaged for a time in buying supplies for ships use. I bought large quantities of butter, among other things, and it was nearly all of Danish make. Until 1872 the ships drew their supplies of butter from Cork, but when the Danish butter came in it at once became popu-Danish butter came in it at once became popular, and now the shipping trade uses it almost altogether. The Danish butter stands the heat well. It is put up in tins, 28 pounds ench, and it is packed in cases with sawdust. There is no ice put near it. The cases are placed in the middle of the ship and a tin is taken out as it is wanted. It keeps so well that I have known ships going to India by the Cape to come back to Liverpool, after having crossed the equator four times, and the butter was still fresh and sweet, nowithstanding the exposure and extreme heat. I bought this butter by the tun, and it cost from 22 to 30 cents a pound.
