Gourley (Lib.), asked if the correspondence on the American fisheries question was to be produced; whether it was he intention of the Government to negotiate for a new commission, and whether in the neantime, owing to the divergence of legal opinion relative to the treaty of 1818, it was stended to suspend the enforcement of these

Sir James Pergusson, Parliamentary Secreary for the Foreign Office, curtly replied "The Government will not publish any papers nor make any statement on the subject at present. A modus vivendi is in operation."

W. H. Smith, the Government leader, replying to a question, intimated that the Government under the present circumstances was unable to make any statement regarding the appointment of a minister at Washington. unable to make any statement regarding the appointment of a minister at Washington.

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
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
