

DEATH DISCLOSED HER SIN.

MARY BAPTIST'S FATAL FALL MAKES PUBLIC A SCANDAL.

The Housekeeper of a City Employee Falls Down Stairs and Injures Herself—Died an Hour Later—The Fall May Not Have Occurred Without Help, However, and Dr. Cleland Refused To Issue a Certificate—An Inquest To Be Held To-night.

Early yesterday morning a singular fatal accident occurred at 50 Howe-street, the residence of Samuel Glen, a driver for the corporation.

It appears that a woman named Mary Baptist, who for the last three years has lived with Glen as housekeeper, came downstairs at an early hour yesterday to prepare his breakfast and attend to her morning duties.

After he went to his work she went upstairs and was heard by the neighbors in the adjoining house to fall heavily on the landing.

Only Lived a Short Time. Screams and groans quickly brought assistance, when the unfortunate woman was discovered lying at the head of the stairs, and from an irregular, jagged wound on the right side of her head near the back blood was flowing freely.

Dr. Cleland was at once summoned, but death ensued within 15 minutes after his arrival.

No Suspicion of Foul Play. Careful inquiry failed to reveal any suspicion of foul play. No one was seen to enter or leave the house from the time the woman fell until the sound of the fall and the dying woman's groans apprised the neighbors.

An examination of the premises showed that the head woundings at the angle of the passage upstairs and the stairs were inflicted in a sharp corner. At a distance of about 5-1/2 feet along the passage in an ascending step, and from the position of the woman when found it would appear that she had mounted this step and then, for some cause, which the post-mortem examination will probably disclose, fell from the edge of the stairs.

Being of stout build, weighing over 300 pounds, she must have fallen with great force, which is amply evidenced by the injury inflicted.

An Inquest To Be Held. The fact that the woman was well advanced in pregnancy, the uncertainty surrounding the cause of death, for there is as yet no direct evidence of how she fell, and that in Dr. Cleland's opinion the symptoms were not altogether those of concussion of the brain, but rather of a fracture of the skull, led to the belief that a post-mortem examination would be held to-night at the residence of Dr. Cleland.

Dr. Cleland interviewed. Dr. Cleland was seen at a late hour last night. When asked whether there was anything to indicate foul play he said "No; the front door was locked, as there is no side entrance and no lane."

"What is the nature of the wound, Doctor?" "It is a scalp wound on the right side of the head near the crown, about one inch in length and the edges were naturally jagged. I am not satisfied that this injury alone is sufficient to cause death, and the attendant symptoms were not those of death by concussion of the brain. I found her lying where she fell at the head of the stairs and had her arms raised. She was found in convulsions when I saw her, and only recovered sufficiently to ask for a drink of water and almost immediately relapsed into unconsciousness and died in convulsions."

"And was uncertainty your only reason for delaying to sign a death certificate, or had you other reasons?" he was then asked. "After a moment's thought the doctor replied, 'The cause of death was not apparent to an extent that would justify a medical man in giving a death certificate, and there was a real play,' he repeated, 'but only a post-mortem will settle the question.'"

DAMAGE BY RAIN AND WIND.

ROULAND, Vt., May 4.—A heavy wind prevailed in this city and vicinity this morning and a conservative estimate places the damage at not less than \$18,000. Hardly a dwelling house escaped injury.

Some of the landslides are said to be 90 feet long and the mud and clay on the tracks 10 feet deep. At Zoar another bad break is reported. There are no accidents reported elsewhere.

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LEOMINSTER, Mass., May 4.—There was a heavy cloud-burst over Leominster this morning. A portion of the dam at F. G. Smith's large piano factory has given way and the amount of rain is estimated at 3 1/2 inches. The dam is 10 feet high and is situated on the right side of the dam. People living below the dam fear serious results.

MILK FOR CHEESE FACTORIES.

How to Secure First-Class Milk—A Bulletin on This Important Point. The last bulletin of the Ontario Agricultural College (No. 28) is "Milk for Cheese Factories."

"In order to maintain the proud distinction that Canadian cheese has already won in the British markets it is absolutely necessary that the dairymen shall put forth greater efforts than they have in the past to produce a better quality of milk."

"The maximum profit can be obtained only by the clear-thinking, intelligent dairymen, who breed and feed to produce the greatest amount of milk of a good quality at the least possible cost."

"Nothing but pure milk from healthy cows should be sent to the factory. To secure this, cows should have abundance of wholesome, nutritious food and pure water, with access to salt at all times."

"The greatest possible care should be taken to prevent cows drinking stagnant water. Milk from such cows is invariably tainted, and no amount of skill on the part of the cheese-maker can produce from it a really fine cheese."

"Immediately after the milk is drawn it should be strained, then aerated by dipping or pouring, which can be done very effectively while the milk is yet in the pails."

"It is not necessary to cool milk at night, unless the weather is extremely hot, and then to have it in the best condition for delivery at the factory in the morning."

"The organisms that produce bitter or rancid milk, or any abnormal changes, to be found only where there is filth and carelessness in handling, so that in all cases when complaint is made of impure milk the remedy must be extra cleanliness."

The bulletin from which the above is taken was prepared by Dr. W. G. Smith, of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, Ontario. It is a small, handy booklet, and is available free of charge to all who write for it.
