

Change of Time in Germany.

On April la general revolution in the reckoning of time took place in Germany. So far, wrote a Berlin correspondent just betore the change, every place has had its own time of day, which depended on the position of the sun. From Sunday all Germany will adopt the so-called middle European time—that is, the time at the 15th degree east longitude from Greenwich. This meridian goes through Stargard in Pomerania and Goerlitz in Silesia. These places will, therefore, not need to alter their clocks. The new German time will be exactly an hour ahead of the Greenwich time. The change will, of course, be felt everywhere. The school children in some places will have to go to school half an hour earlier, and are likely to grumble, especially in winter, unless the schools open later than 8 in the towns and 7 in the country, as at present.






