THE RAILWAY PASS SCANDAL

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CHANCELLOR RAND RESIGNS.

McMaster University Staff Disorganized—Three Chairs Now Vacant, With Rumors of More to Follow.

To the general public, and more especially to those who attended the commencement exercises of McMaster University a year ago and listened to the glowing eulogies passed by all the speakers upon the work of Chancellor Rand, the announcement of his resignation as Chancellor of McMaster University will come as a surprise.

Mr. Rand's resignation was placed in the hands of the Board of Management at their meeting yesterday. The Board will meet again in two days, when it is expected that the resignation will be formally accepted.

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CLARA FORD WILL TESTIFY.

Her Counsel Says He Will Put Her in the Witness Box. The Crown Case to be Completed This Afternoon—The Confession Admitted as Evidence, But a Reserve Case Granted—The Case Will Be Given to the Jury Saturday.

The confession of Clara Ford that she shot Frank Westwood was admitted in evidence by Chancellor Boyd yesterday, but a reserve case was allowed.

There was a long argument before the evidence of Sergeant Reburn was accepted. Mr. Johnston quoted numerous authorities in support of his contention that the evidence was not admissible.

His Lordship stated, however, that owing to the conflicting rulings of the various judges as to the admissibility of statements made by a prisoner under duress in reply to questions, it would be better for the confession to be heard; the Crown taking the responsibility as to the weight to be given to it.

Mr. Johnston argued that the confession of Clara Ford was not true and voluntarily made, that Sergeant Reburn admitted having said to her that she had better not to tell any lies, that he had threatened her in the nature of a threat and deprived the statement of its voluntary character, and that the confession should be taken to the police office, kept there without advice from 4 o'clock in the afternoon till 10 o'clock at night and plied with questions in order to make her confess.

His Lordship said, however, that the circumstances under which the remark of the sergeant that "she had better not to tell any lies" was made, showed that his remark was not in the nature of a threat, but the outcome of previous statements which she had made, and which were proved to be true.

His Lordship finally decided to admit the confession, again remarking that the confession was a voluntary statement at present in regard to admissions of prisoners, and it would be far better for the Government of Belgium to also discover cases of pleuro-pneumonia among Canadian cattle landed at Belgian ports, and the Government of Great Britain was trying to obtain details in regard to these cases.

Washington, May 2.—The Nicaraguan incident, growing out of the British occupation of Corinto, was happily settled to-day through the good offices of the Salvadoran Minister to Great Britain and France, who had an interview with Lord Kimberley, the British Foreign Secretary.

The conference reported in a definite arrangement of terms for the settlement of the trouble at Corinto, the substance of which was immediately cabled to Secretary Gresham.

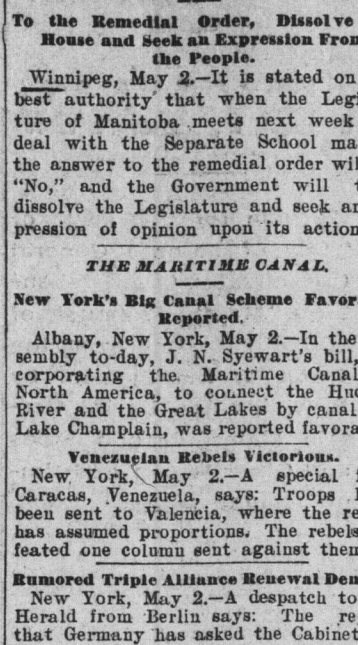

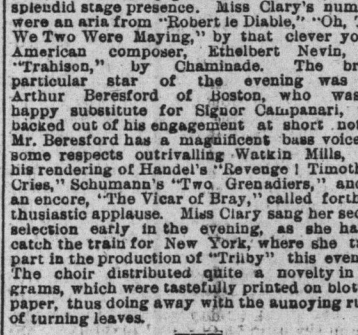

CUNNINGHAM WINS HIS SUIT.

A Jury Decide that Either the City or the Metropolitan Railway Company Must Pay Him Damages. The action of Cunningham against the Metropolitan Street Railway Company and the City of Toronto, which has been on trial at the Court House for the last four days, was concluded late yesterday afternoon. It is a writ to recover damages for personal injuries in October last on the St. Street Railway tracks in Yonge-street, near Woodville-avenue. The questions put to the jury and the answers are as follows: 1. Did the city keep Yonge-street east of the tracks in a fit state?—A. No. 2. If not of repair had the city noticed?—A. Yes. 3. Could the plaintiff have seen the car coming?—A. No. 4. Were the rails of the Railway Co. laid so as to cause the least possible public inconvenience?—A. Yes. 5.
