DRASTIC ACTION COMING ON VENEREAL DISEASE

S^omething Far More Severe Than is Generally Supposed Will Result from Investigation.

There is to be no "touching lightly" upon the serious problem that the provincial government has taken up when it brings in legislation to cope with venereal diseases, it was learned yesterday, and something far more drastic, far more severe, than is gen-erally supposed, will result from the investigation now going on and the consequent part the government will take in handling the matter. The civilian population as well as the military will be taken into ac-count and indeed some of the plans which have been suggested are now in operation in the military camps. It is understood legislation will be advanced making it compulsory. Med-ical health officers will likely be given full power to go to a suspected case and compel medical attention, but this does not necessarily mean that the Case will be recorded or receive any publicity other than that which is necessary in order to deal with the Case

In all probability it will be decided to restrict or isolate cases in order to protect the public where a medical officer has reason to believe there is infection. These qustions will be largely determined by the report which Mr. Justice Hodgins makes after he has all the information in hand which his inquiry will bring. With the facts as they will be presented the government will act and within the very near future-

SOLDIERS FOR FARMS.

That the government is seriously considering the question of using returned soldiers on the farms of Ontario was the announcement made by Premier Sir William Hearst yesterday In this event some 5:000 would be available, it is thought, and the outdoor work would be beneficial to them as well as to the country. "Under the heading of advertising is included the interiors of buildings during hours when the latter are not open for busi-

"Turn off every lamp and switch off every heater or motor the use of which is not absolutely needed.

"Electrical energy is vitally needed for the manufacture of many war essentials, and these can only be manufactured if every user of electrical energy helps in reducing the present general consumption. Coal is being used to relieve the waterpower shortage, and the costliness and scarcity of coal are well known.

MAY RAIS

Allies Will Recognize New Govern-ment at Expedient Moment.

London, Jan. 15.—France has loan-ed the Ukraine 2,000,000 rubles in gold, according to a despatch from the Odessa correspondent of The Times. The French mint also has printed a large quantity of Ukraine paper money. General Vinnichenko, president of the Ukraine secretariat, it is added, in the course of a long report to the Rada, declared that Great Britain, France, the United States, Belgium and Rumania were interested greatly in the organization of the Ukraine republic. He added: "As circumspect people they hesitate to recognize the republic completely, but when they find it expedient they will extend us their hands, which we will accept if we think it neces-

sary The correspondent says that the feeling of Rumanians toward the Russians is embittered greatly. They feel that they have been thrice betrayed by Russia; first by the czar's government; next by the provisional gov ernment, and now, worst of all, by the Bolshevil government

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
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
