ARMENIANS AVENGED

of the Authors of Massacres Publicly Executed in Square at Stamboul, Was Formerly Governor of Diarbekr --- Another Sentenced to Fifteen Years in Fortress.

Constantinople, Saturday, April 12.—Kemal Bey, governor of Diarbekr, has been publicly hanged in Bayazid Square in Stamboul in the presence of the military governor of Constantinople and other high officials. Kemal Bey was sentenced to death as one of those sponsible for the Armenian deportations and massacres in the fozghad district. The former commander of the gendarmerie in ozghad was sentenced to fifteen years' imprisonment in the fortress.

There sentences were confirmed by an imperial irade. The trial of those responsible for the Armenian massacres by the Turks began early in February at Constantinople. The prosecutor declared it was necessary to punish the authors of the massacres, which had filled the whole world with a feeling of horror. Kemal Bey was former Turkish minister of food.

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COVENANT OF NATIONS FOR SECURING OF PEACE

Racial Equality Amendment Turned Down by Commission

Several Members Voted Against Inclusion in League Covenant of Request by Japanese Delegation.

Paris, April 13.—The league of nations commission has rejected the Japanese amendment on racial equality according to an authoritative statement issued tonight. The Japanese delegation proposed an amendment to the preamble of the covenant as follows: To insert after the words "prescription of open, just and honorable relations between nations," an additional clause to read: "By the endorsement of the principle of equality of nations and just treatment of their nationals."

The commission was impressed by the justice of the Japanese claim and by the spirit in which it was presented. Various members of the commission, however, felt that they could not vote for its specific inclusion in the covenant. Therefore, the commission was unable to give to the amendment that unanimous approval which was necessary for its adoption.

Paris, April 13.-The proposed convention regarding international aerial navigation has been completed by the judicial and military subcommittees of the aeronautic committee of the peace conference.

The convention is composed of forty-one articles, which establish an international agreement on sovereignty of the air, provide for the concession of inoffensive voyages between the contracting states and deal with forbidden zones and also international aerial routes.

An international commission on aerial navigation is to be formed. Its duty will be the gathering and disseminating of radio telegraphic, meteorological and medical information affecting aerial travel.

League Will Act Thru Assembly and Council, Latter to Consist of One Representative From Each of Five Powers and Four Other Powers to Be Selected --- No War Till Three Months After Award.

Paris, April 12.—An official summary of the revised covenant of the league of nations issued tonight makes specific mention of the Monroe Doctrine with respect to its bearing on the future activities of the league. It

says:

"The covenant does not affect the validity of international engagements, such as treaties of arbitration or regional understandings like the Monroe Doctrine, for securing the maintenance of peace."

The league, says the statement, will include all belligerent and neutral states named in a document annexed to the covenant, and in the future any self-governing country whose admission is approved by two-thirds of the states already members of the league.

Providing it has kept it's obligations a state may withdraw from the league on giving two years' notice, and states which signify their dissent from amendments approved by all the states on the council and a majority of those in the assembly are not bound by them, but in such case cease to be members of the league

Morgan Party to Start Transatlantic Trip Wednesday-Rival Without Boat.

St. John's, Nfld., April 13.—It now being 4.30, the Sopwith flight is postponed until tomorrow, or later, unless the weather improves. Winds, fog and rain continue, but mid-ocean conditions are favorable, making the very reverse of yesterday's record. This ofternoon, Hawker and Grieve are visit-ing the Morgan and Raynham, of Martynside machine, who made a call on the Sopwith party yesterday and inspected their machine. The Martynside machine, known as the Raymour, is partly assembled and will be completed tomorrow; wireless will be installed on Tuesday, and they are her pleted tomorrow; wireless will be installed on Tuesday, and they are hoping to leave, with a full moon Wednesday. Their machine is somewhat smaller than the Sopwith, having only 42 feet wing spread, and total length of 24 feet. This machine carries a Rolls-Royce engine, has 300 horsepower, and like the Sopwith machine, can make about a hundred miles an hour. She has no toat like the Sopwith plane, and if any mishap befalls the occupants, their fate is sealed, yet they are in excellent spirits and quite confident of being able to achieve the run successfully.

A big gathering which packed the Eglinton town hall to the doors, and which in its earlier stages was uncompromisingly hostile to Sir Adam Beck's scheme for the clearing up of the interminable Yonge street railway trouble, and incidentally gave its champions, Ald. H. H. Ball and Controller Robbins the time of their lives, were some of the outstanding features of Saturday night's metiting of the North Toronto Ratepayers' Association, The old hall has seen some rousing times, but this topped them all. Nothing much else is talked about in the north end these days, and no wonder every business man forsook the comfort of his own fireside on Saturday night and hiked to the hall. They heard chough about franchises and running rights to last them the rest of their natural lives. But it was a great crowdand at times quite orderly. President Baker was not there, and W. L. Cutelle essayed the role of chairman, in which he succeeded admirably.

The first speaker was Herbert Waddington, who is not enamoured of the Beck scheme, and went over the agreement pretty much in detail. He took exception to Sir Adam's suggested taking over of the Metropolitan in its entirety in 1929, the end of the first 25 years, and charged that the county had undoubtedly a prior right to negotiate assuming that the railway later did not want to operate. The carrying of freight was cited as likely to be more in evidence, and of greater volume under Hydro management than under the scheme endorsed by Mr. Harris. Mr. Waddington took strong exception to the so-called attempts to railroad the scheme thru without giving the city, officials a charce to report.



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Tells Open Forum Germany Should Be Equally Included.

"If the representatives at the peace conference do not make a league of nations, then the peoples themselves will make one," declared Prof. R. M. MacIver, before the Open Forum yesterday, where he spoke on the 'League of Nations."

In opening his subject Frof. Mac-Iver dealt first with the uncertainty of the subject, and then he told some of the reasons which he declared were holding up the work of the conference to come to a settlement over the proposed league. One of the big reasons was the territorial claims by the various nations. "Not only," said the speaker. "are these people by their action delaying the realization of the league, but they are making it impossible." The speaker declared himself as being against any territorial claims, because they would stir up national resentment, and further, if a real league of nations there would be no need of defending oneself against any aggressions, because the new league should rest on trust, and not fear, as in the past.
Would Prevent War.

Some of the reasons which the professor gave for a league of nations were first, without the league armament could not be abolished. Only by the league could a minority be stopped from rushing a country into war. "The British and the German peoples did not want war, it was their rulers," said Mr. MacIver, in substantiating the

above premise.

A real league of nations would include all self-governing people, who would enter on an equal basis, where both the people and the government of each would be represented. Germany should be allowed to enter the league and Russia also should be admitted on and Russia also should be admitted on an equal basis. "Russia has suffered terribly," said the speaker, "she has been blockaded, and she has had her ports seized. How can we blame her if she remains Bolshevik? It is a disastrous thing to use sea power against a country which is not an enemy. Let Russia settle her own internal affairs, and invite her into the



Melbourne, April 13:—Australia's total casualties during the war, with the figures brough' up to Feb. 8 of the current year, botaled 307,900, according to a statement made public today by the commonwealth. The total forces of Australia, raised by voluntary enlistment, numbered 400,000 out of a botal population of less than 5,000,000. The casualties are divided as follows: Dead, 58,035; missing, 193; prisoners, 438; wounded, 166,606; sick, 82,409; unspecified, 219.






