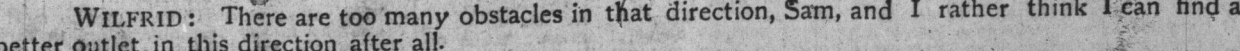

## HAMILTON NEWS

### O'KEEFE WAS DISCHARGED

His Wife Declined to Appear to Press the Charge on Which He Was Arrested.

### BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING

Caretaker Robbins Has Not Yet Apologized and Has Only Another Week's Grace.

Hamilton, March 2.—(Special.)—Edward J. O'Keefe, 385 Horner-street, whose arrest last night, on a charge of assaulting his wife, was reported in this morning's World, was released at the Police Court this morning. He was represented by George Lynch-Staunton, who said Mrs. O'Keefe would not appear to press the charge. When O'Keefe left the court room, he was probably the maddest man in Hamilton, having been locked up all night.

An Injunction Refused. Application was made to Judge Sider to issue an injunction to restrain Mr. O'Keefe from disposing of or voting on \$1,000 shares of the Hamilton Blast Furnace Company. The judge declined the application, on the ground that Mrs. O'Keefe being a solvent party, an action for damages could be begun. Mr. Mackay has issued a writ against Mr. O'Keefe for the enforcement of an agreement.

### CANADA'S MINERAL OUTPUT

As Given at the Meeting of Mining Association Held at Montreal.

GOLD WAS \$13,700,000 IN 1898

Total Value of the Dominion Metallic Mineral Production Last Year Was \$21,622,001.

Montreal, March 2.—(Special.)—At the mining association meeting to-day the mineral production of Canada for 1898 was given out for the first time. The value of gold from the Yukon district was \$10,000,000, and for all other districts was \$3,700,000, or a total of \$13,700,000, and there were produced 58,101 tons of iron ore at a value of \$132,530, and the total value of the Dominion metallic mineral production for 1898 was \$21,622,001.

In the general total an increase is shown of over \$800,000, or nearly 3 per cent, as compared with 1897. Compared with 1886, the first year for which statistics were issued, the increase in the value of mineral production was \$10,000,000, or almost 270 per cent, thus the per capita value of the mineral production of the Dominion has increased from \$2.50 to \$7.20.

The most important increases are as follows: Gold, about \$1,000,000, coal over \$2,000,000, copper nearly \$2,000,000, nickel nearly \$1,000,000, and asbestos iron ore and cement aggregating about \$150,000. The gold output for the year was \$10,000,000, which is three times as great as last year's output. The value of the copper output for 1898 was \$1,325,300, which is an increase of 20 per cent over 1897. The value of the nickel output for 1898 was \$1,000,000, which is an increase of 100 per cent over 1897. The value of the asbestos iron ore and cement output for 1898 was \$150,000, which is an increase of 50 per cent over 1897.

### MIGHT HAVE BEEN KILLED

A Fireman Placed Under an Overturned Wagon Recovered With Difficulty.

Fireman Charles Adamson of Lombard-street narrowly escaped of a fatal accident last night when a horse-drawn wagon overturned on the sidewalk. Adamson was seated on the back and ladder of the wagon when it was overturned. He was thrown right under the heavy wagon and pinned to the ground. Frank Burns, engineer of the Conger Coal Company, who was out walking with his wife, saw the accident, and running to Adamson's rescue, grabbed the horses and held them there before they had a chance to run away. With great difficulty Adamson was rescued and the only injury he sustained was a wound on his head and a sprained shoulder. The wagon was badly wrecked.
