The principle of the new Act was a return to the Provincial Franchise Act and use of provincial voters' lists. These, it was calculated, could be had without any expense to the Federal authorities for preparation, the only item of cost being for printing and revision. Thus the scheme is embodied in the following substitutions of the section 10 of the Franchise Act of

be the duty of the custodian thereof to transmit to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, by registered mail, a copy of such list, certified under the hand of such custodian, and having every alteration, addition or erasure therein identified by his initials. The fees to be paid for such certified copy shall be those fixed by the provincial law for furnishing such copies to applicants therefor, and if there is no fee fixed by the provincial law, shall be twenty five cents for each one hundred names including additions and descriptions, and fifty cents for the preposes of Dominion elections, such certified copy shall be deemed to be the original and legal list of voters for the polling division for which the list of which it is a copy was prepared, so long as that list remains it force, subject, however, to such changes and additions as are, subsequent to revision, made in such list under the provisions of the provincial law.

That while cases of an exceptional nature may have arisen since the repeal of the said bonusing powers, justifying special legislation enabling municipalities to grant aid where disaster by fire has taken place, and possibly in other entirely exceptional cases, this House is of opinion that the door has been opened too wide, and that hereafter a discrimination should be exercised which will confine the granting of legislation to cases of such an undoubtedly exceptional nature as loss by fire, and that such special legislation shall not conflict with the spirit of these resolutions; and, further, that such special legislation shall not confer power on any municipality, in the case of such industrial disasters, to grant relief by more than a limited loan or exemption from taxation for a period of years.

And that this House is further of opinion that if in any such undoubtedly exceptional case special legislation should be granted, the requirements of the repeal provisions of the Municipal Amendment Act of 1888 should be insisted upon and that the bill should contain without modification the following clause:

"The vote of two-thirds, in the affirm—

"The vote of two-thirds, in the affirmative, of the ratepayers who are entitled to vote upon any bylaw granting aid to a manufactory or manufacturing establishment, or for lending money to such company, person or establishment shall be necessary in order to the carrying of the bylaw for such loan or exemption from taxation, to an establishment destroyed by fire."

Mr. Pattullo explained that the object aimed at by the bill is to stop municipal aid in any form, direct or indirect, to any kind of business. The law at present prevents bonusing, but permits exemptions. But the restriction of the bonusing powers of municipalities did not stop the eyils of the system.



The passengers and crew were saved in the boats. One boat load was landed at Skerryvore lighthouse. The German steamer Viking picked up the remainder. No steamer is obtainable to return for the passengers. If the ship is not broken up will endeavor to save the mails when a steamer is obtained."

London, March 2.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes: Total reserve, decreased £875,000; circulation, increased £555,000; builion, decreased £320,174; other securities, increased £907,000; other deposits, decreased £326,000; public deposits, increased £600,000; notes reserve, decreased £942,000; Government securities, increased £463,000. The proportion of the Bank of England reserve to liability is 44.05 per cent. Last week it was 45.90 per cent. The bank's rate of discount remains unchanged at 3 per cent.

New York, March 2.—The Commercial Advertiser's financial cable from London says: The markets here showed a universal lull in speculation. Americans zigzagged within narrow limits. London interest in them seems to have vanished. They were bought slightly in the morning, but the close was nearly at&the bottom. Paris bought some. Spanish fours were 54%. Money was in good demand. Three hundred and thirty thousand sterling was taken for Argentine for crops.
