PARIS, April 19.—A special despatch from Constantinople says that the Young Turks have given the Sultan until 10 p.m. to abdicate. According to the despatch, M. Zinovieff, the Russian ambassador, is conducting the negotiations, and the Russian cruiser Admiral Greig, from Athens, is lying in the Bosphorus ready to take off the Sultan.



WHAT DO THE WOMEN THINK?

What have the women to say on the proposal that Canada build a Dreadnought to contribute toward the naval defence of Great Britain? What have they to say on the social life of Ottawa, the political capital of the Dominion?







Railway Company Agree on a Test re Dr. Helen MacMurchy's Application.

Dr. Helen MacMurchy's application for an order compelling the Toronto Railway Company to equip its cars with lower steps, was again heard by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board yesterday. City Solicitor Chisholm, who appear-

ed for Dr. MacMurchy, stated that no objection was made to single truck cars. The double truck or combination cars were the cause of complaint. Donald Campbell, manager of the Preston Car and Coach Co., gave tech-Preston Car and Coach Co., gave technical evidence on behalf of the city. He thought that the cars could be built lower with the bodies 40 inches from the ground. Some companies were lowering the bodies to 38 inches, out that was too much. The cars were built about three inches off centre, leaning towards the devil strip to offset the weight of people getting on. If they were on the centre the lowering could be facilitated.

MOSQUITO OFTEN CAUSE OF DEADLY FEVER SPREADS

Sir Patrick Manson Discovers That Blood Sucking Insects Distribute Malaria and Yellow Fever.

LONDON, March 21.—Science never had a better exponent for the layman than Sir Patrick Manson, the man to whom above all others is due the credit of discovering the secret of the spread of many diseases thru the medium of mosquitoes and other insects. In a luminous speech at a gathering in his honor the other day he told the whole wonderful story of his investigations in language simple enough to understand. Sir Patrick's subject was "My stand. Sir Patrick's subject was "My Personal Experiences of the Mosquito," and he said:
"In 1874 I came to London, and there for the first time I heard that Timothy




