



## CHANNEL FLYER MEETS DEATH BY FALL OF PLANE

Hon, Charles Stewart Rolls' Machine Turned Somersault and Plunged Straight Down.

BOURNEMOUTH, Eng. July 12 .-Hon. Charles Stewart Rolls, the famous English aviator, who, on June 2 last, won the honor of being the only man to make a round trip across the English Channel from England to France, was killed to-day in the aviation meet

turned a somersault, crashed 40 feet turned a somersquit, crashed 40 feet to the ground and crushed the aviator to death directly opposite the grand stand. Almost immediately after the first signs of trouble were noticed the aero-plane turned a complete somersquit and then plunged straight down. Rolls attempted to extricate himself, but the drop was too swift. The edge of the machine caught him as the two came to the ground together and fatally crushed him. His limbs were fractur-

Rolls had written and lectured much on his hobby, principally on motoring, and was also an expert at music. motor service corps. Daring Autoist. Rolls was a pioneer of automobiling in England, introducing a motor car there in 1896. He soon became famous as a daring automobilist, in races, both in England and on the continent, and was awarded a gold medal for his driving in the 1000 mile race in 1900. He drove in the famous Paris-Madrid. Paris-Berlin, and Paris-Vienna races, and was England's representative in the Gordon Bennett race in 1905. He held several records for speed driving, breaking the Monte Carlo to London

record in 1906. Then Rolls went in for ballooning, and was soon a licensed pilot. He made 160 balloon ascensions, and won the French Aero Club's medal for the ongest balloon flight in 1906, from Paris to Shelbourne, Norfolk, Eng. He was taught aero planing by Wilbur Wright. He had had numerous narrow escapes from death.

Another in Peril. M. Audemars, a French aviator, fell in his initial flight and was badly hur. Rolls saw the accident to Audemars, but after extending sympathy to the injured man, mounted his own ma-

In Toronto Three Years Ago. The late Capt. Rolls was in Toronto three years ago, when he was the guest of Col. J. B. Maclean, who had met him in England. Count de Lesseps, the French aviator, now here, whose feat in crossing the English Channel was eclipsed by

Rolls, said: "He was a very good friend of mine. When I made my flight across the English Channel, it was he who took me in his automobile when I arrived and entertained me. On several occasions when I have been in England. he has been most kind to me. As you know, I do not speak English, and he made my stay very pleasant by doing

my interpeting for me." Rolls was coming to America this fall to compete in the balloon race from St. Louis, and also in the international aviation meet at New York in October.



"The actual contest was a great disappointment to the majority of people who saw it, myself as well as others. Jeffries has no one to blame but himself. I still insist that he was physically superior to his opponent. He had every advantage from that standpoint, and it is my candid opinion that he never entered the ring better fitted to fight for the championship, so far as his physical condition was concerned. But he was like an actor that had been cast for a prominent part and refused to study the lines or attend rehearsals, and then, when it came time for the curtain to go up, and he realized that it was really a very great and important part, and that he was unprepared, he becomes stage-frightened, misses, his cues, does not know his lines, and destroys the whole performance.

"He is guilty of two mistakes. The first mistake was having consented to make the match; the second mistake was attempting to train himself into condition, but did not succeed (in fact, absolutely refused) in preparing himself for the scientific part of the contest. BRITISH FLEET IN FAR EAST SHOOTING FOR KING'S PRIZE Force to Be Increased During Next

NEW YORK, July 12.-The Herald's mayal correspondent at London, Eng., writes.

There are signs that the naval authorities intend to increase the strength of the British forces in the far east before long. A number of armored cruisers of the pre-Dréadnought era can now be used for foreign service, and similarly sertain battleships of the older types are also available. These vessels will therefore be sent to the Pacific gradually to supplement the existing squadrons, which will be considerably streightened by the change. The first move in this direction will be considerably streightened by the thange. The first move in this direction will be the transfer to the China station of the battleships Swiftsure and Triumph from the Mediterranean, as these two ships are to be relieved by the Lord Nelson and the Agamemnon from the home fleet. They are much smaller and lighter than contemporary British battle-hips, but have increased speed, while their low freeboard, makes them more juited for service in eastern waters than at home.

At the present time there are on the station an armored cruiser of the latest type, the Minotaur, as flagship, three smaller armored cruisers of the county class, and two protected cruisers. The total displacement is now 52,720 tons.

In fixing the strength of the British force in the far east the authorities have to bear in mind not only the present position, but future possibilities, and it would be absurd to suppose that they will wait until 1915 and then send out a huge fleet if the alliance with Japan should be determined. A fleet for such a centingency must be prepared, and the necleus of such a fleet is found in the force whose construction has been arranged for with the colonies, and the units of which are to form what is generally termed the Pacific fleet.

Of this fleet there will be three units in the East Indies, China and Australian seas, each comprising one large armored and three protected cruisers, with destroyers and submarines.

It will not be for some years that the new Pacific fleet will reach its full stage of development. Only the two Indomitable cruisers which are to act as flagships of the Australia and China units have yet been put in hand, the first named at Clydebank and the latter at Faitrifield, both shipyards being on the Clyde. In the meantime the British force nust be maintained at the required standard, in accordance with the international po-


