PROTESTANT ORPHAN ASYLUM.

THE Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the Ladies of the Protestant Orphan Asylum of the City of Montreal, was held in the House of the Institution, St. Catherine Street, on Tuesday, the 4th of January, instant, the Rev. J. Bethune, D.D., Rector of Montreal, presiding,—when the following Annual Report was submitted, read, and adopted; after which, the Rev. Chairman delivered an appropriate Address, which, at the request of the Ladies present, was directed to be published with the Report in pamphlet form :—

With feelings of profound gratitude to Divine Providence, for the prosperity which has been vouchsafed to them during the last twelve months, the Directresses of the Protestant Orphac. Asylum respectfully submit the following, being their Thirty-First Annual Report.

Threagh many difficulties, and with anxious care, they have, by the liberality of their fellow-citizens, and others, thus far succeeded in giving to this Asylum, not only a "local habitation," but, they also humbly trust, "a name," and have, moreover, accomplished this without any incurring any debt—an incubus which has so often painfully pressed down, and even crushed many valuable foundations of a similar nature, and yet this very freedom from debt, which they have ever considered an object of the first importance, has, to a certain extent, operated against its interests.

An erroneous impression seems to be prevalent, that they are RICH, and, on that account, many contributions have been withheld a fact which will be made evident by the accounts produced, which show a deficit of the balance on hand, as compared with last year, of eighty dollars. The Ladies feel it a duty to the cause they advocate, to undeceive their patrons in this important respect.

In this benevolent city, there are friends enough, and means enough, to support all those Protestant charities, now claiming their aid, and a fair share is all that this Institution desires or claims at the hands of its benefactors.

The object most coveted by the Directresses, at this moment, is a permanent subscription list, the amount of which would, when added to the small interest of the sums invested in the Endowment Fund, equal their annual domestic expenditure.

This would be effected by 230 annual subscribers, at 25s. each. Surely this is not asking too much for an Institution open for the reception of Protestant Orphans of every denomination, in so populous a city as Montreal.

The appeal made on former occasions in favour of the Endowment Fund has again been responded to, and they have thankfully to acknowledge the handsome legacy of £25, left by the late J. J. White, Esq., of this city.

To the agreeable surprise of the Directresses, they were again gratified by a second donation of £25, from their friend and former protégé, now in California, accompanied by a most interesting letter, proving that his former generous gift was not the result of a momentary impulse, but the abiding feeling of a charitable heart.

Those who take an interest in establishments of the nature of the one now pleaded for, and have especially visited those in the neighbouring Republic, have been struck with the great attention paid to provide a spacious lot of land, as well for the purpose of beauty and ornament, as also to secure to the inmates fresh air and exercise during the period of recreation. Though provided with a comfortable house, the Institution has no surrounding grounds, and the increasing approach of buildings will soon enclose them, and perhaps render it impossible to extend their limits, except at a cost far beyond their means. The Ladies trust they may not be deemed too importunate, if they call the attention of some of their well-known benevolent and wealthy friends to this opportunity of conferring a most valuable and permanent benefit to the present and future welfare of this Asylum, by the purchase and donation of some land in their neighbourhood, whilst such may be had at a moderate price.

The usual average number of children have received the benefits of the Asylum, and from those placed out the Directresses continue to receive favorable reports.

To the Provincial Legislature, for their continued Annual Grant, the Corporation offers its grateful acknowledgments.

The able and gratuitous services of their friend and Physician, Dr. Arnoldi, are, as usual, freely given at all times, and deserve their best thanks.

To Messrs. Carter & Kerry the Ladies are also indebted, for their gratuitous supply of medicines during the year.

The Superintendent and Matron continue to give every satisfaction.

It is with great pleasure that the Ladies have to record the additional number of their YOUNG friends, who have been interested in this work of benevolence, and contributed to the "Children's Fund" during the last year, and they trust that their exertions will not be diminished, when they are told that most gratifying instances of good feeling are daily afforded by those Orphans who have left the Institution, and are settled in this city, manifested by their frequent visits to their former playmates, and sharing with them their newlyacquired enjoyments.

And now, with sincere and respectful thanks to all and every the benefactors of this Charity, both at home and abroad, who, during so many years, have never permitted them to want, the Directresses commit their cares to that Overseeing Power, which gives rise to the benevolent suggestions of sympathy and succour for those who have been purposely placed among us, as objects on whom we may manifest our love of that Divine Master, who has condescended to say, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

We are also assembled here for the discharge of a high and solemn duty, that of providing for the wants—temporal and spiritual—of that particularly interesting portion of those poor whom our Blessed Saviour has assured us we "shall have always with us,"—that portion whom he has specially recommended to the care of his faithful followers in the affecting words: "whosoever shall give to drink unto one of these little ones, a cup of cold water only, in the name of a disciple, verily I say unto you, he shall in no wise lose his reward." This Institution is one of those green spots in the great wilderness of the conflict of human opinions and prejudices, on which every shade of religious difference can meet and act in perfect concert,—because the object is that great virtue of charity, about which, there can be no difference of opinion.

If we cast our eyes around this room, I think we shall see the proof of this assertion; for here we have, I believe, some of every denomination (save one) in our city, and that one stands aloof, on grounds for which we cannot perhaps justly blame them. It may be, on the ground of worldly interest, that they do not choose to associate with us, because they do not choose to share with us the ample public endowments which they possess for similar institutions-endowments consecrated to such objects, at a time when the whole population was of one communion, and when there could be no question of their division - and which relieve them from the necessity to which their less fortunate fellow Christians and fellow subjects are subjected, of seeking for voluntary contributions for their support; or, it may be, on the ground of their greater exclusiveness in some respects, that they do not choose to unite with us; for, although they can go along with us, in feeding the hungry, and clothing the naked, this seems to be the line of demarcation, beyond which they refuse to pass hand in hand with Protestants—the rubicon of their Catholicity in works of charity and mercy.

But let us not blame them, but see rather that we act up to our own principles-and discharge our own duty as it should be done. The mind of God, with reference to that duty, is made known to us in his holy word-"Honor the Lord with thy substance and with the first fruits of all thine increase-so shall thy barns be filled with plenty, and thy presses shall burst out with new wine." There, then, is a direct command. It is not left to our own option—for although a promise of a very influential kind is annexed to it, the command would be equally binding upon our consciences without the promise. But God, in his mercy, never requires any duty for which he does not, in some way other, provide its appropriate reward. The command, moreover, points out the manner in which it can best be car-ried into effect—" Honor the Lord with thy substance, and with the first fruits of thing increase." God is not a hard master who desires to reap where he has not sown. He only requires a *portion* of that all which he has given us. And surely, if we rightly consider the matter, gratitude will compel us to obey the command, when the glory of God is the object. It is he who has given us life and breath and all things-and we cannot better prove our gratitude for all his blessings, than by a cheerful obedience to his commands. And here, I would advert to an objection which is often made-often, perhaps, from principle-but more often, it is to be feared, in excuse for a niggardly disposition ; but, from whatever motive, it has too fre-quently the effect of closing the purse against the calls of Charity, and the claims of our heavenly benefactor. "We must be just," it is said, "before we are generous." I have seen this objection well answered in the following manner. It must be confessed that a more just proposition cannot be made ; and, if carried out with a due regard to the claims of all, nothing can be more in accordance with the command given above. For what is justice, but the rendering to every one that which is his due. Let us fairly apply the principle. God is the giver of all things we possess. Has He not then a just right to assert his own claims first, and to have those claims satisfied —and these claims are the first fruits of all thine increase. Let us then ask ourselves whether we have complied with these claims whether we have consecrated the *first fruits* of all our gains to Him to whom they are undoubtedly due—whether we have, during our whole lives, or any portion of them, examined our increase, and given a just portion to God. If we have not, let us not talk of our regard for justice—the word may issue from our lips—but our consciences, if we let them freely speak, will tell us that we are ungrateful as well as unjust.

To God himself, who is above all want and independent of every thing, it is impossible that we can make any adequate return for his marvellous loving kindness toward us—He is beyond the reach of our goodness by the all sufficiency of His nature. He is therefore pleased to put our Brethren in his place, because our benevolence can extend to them—to make them his *proxies* for receiving our duty to him in this respect; and to consider any service rendered to them, as done to himself "My goodness extendeth not to thee (said the Royal Psalmist) but to the saints that are in the earth"—"Forasmuch as thou hast done it to the least of one of these little ones (said our Saviour) thou hast also done it to me."

There can be no object more worthy of our benevolence or more touchingly interesting to the human heart than an Orphan Asylum. Here helpless innocent indigence snatched from all the misery and loneliness and helplessness of parentless infancy, from the wretchedness of beggary and, it may be presumed, from the consequent vicious courses into which unprotected childhood is so apt to be seduced, and placed here under the immediate care of the best substitute for a father and a mother that the watchful superintendence of kind hearted ladies, themselves mothers or sisters, can procure, warmed, clothed, fed, educated and fitted for future usefulness in this world, and trained for future happiness in God's eternal kingdom. Here is every thing to awaken, in our hearts, the purest feelings of satisfaction, arising from this beautiful view of distress in its most affecting form relieved, misery of the worst description averted, and the most forlorn despair succeeded by comfortable repose and joyful hope. It is a spectacle which it is impossible for any one of the least sensibility to contemplate without emotions of tenderness and delight, and which we may venture to say our Lord himself would have looked upon with complacency.

Let, then, this little zursery of all that is most calculated to excite in our minds the purest and most pleasurable feelings of benevolence, of pity and compassion, of joy and hope, continue to hold its strong claim upon our support. This little foundation of one of the best schemes that human compassion has yet invented for alleviating the deepest distress, while it tends to improve the moral and religious condition of the poor, depends chiefly for its support on the voluntary contributions of the public. You, who are assembled here, are a portion, and it may be presumed, from the fact of your attendance here, not the least interested portion of that public. You, I am sure, will not only cheerfully give " of the first fruits of your increase," will not relax your influence with others, but will continue your exertions with renewed energy, encouraged and cheered by the contemplation of that success, which has hitherto crowned the efforts of those who have been engaged in this great and valuable labor of love.

The 'Treasurer's Accounts for the past year were then submitted, audited, and ordered to be published.
