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

nificance of the navigation of the Rhine is found in the geographical conditions which have limited the trade of Switzerland up to the present. Switzerland, as a newspaper of West Switzerland, as justly emphasized, is not a Mediterranean power, that is, her geographical position makes it necessary for her export trade routes to run toward the north. For us the Valley of the Rhine forms

the natural path to the sea. There is no use wasting any more words about the possibilities of establishing a Swiss system of inland navigation as well. The greater part of the plans is already worked out; all that is lacking is the will and the possibility of realization.

"It is also pointed out in the Schweizer Export-Revue, that there need be not talk about Swiss inland navigation unless the navigation campanies to be formed are really Swiss. Therefore, it is proposed that a Swiss shipping line from Basle to Amsterdam be organized, to which, we believe, all other Swiss river navigation companies would be joined."







The matter of aerial education is so very costly, and the difficulty of obtaining proper machines and really qualified instructors so great, that we have come to the conclusion that it would be advisable to alter the original plan of a chain of local schools and establish a central flying school, where not only land-training but training on hydroplanes can be carried on to the greatest advantage. Moreover, provision should be made for winter training, and sending part, if not all, of the aeroplanes and instructors to a climate where training can be carried on to greater advantage than where heavy frosts, fogs, high winds or much rain prevail.

Experience so far has demonstrated the great advantage it must be to students to receive the more independent instruction given in either a government school or one which is admainistered by a patriotic board of representative men, without remuneration. We find, for example, that in commercially operated schools, ten men and upwards are placed to a machine, while a recent number of the "Aerial Age" of the United States, shows that the standard advocated by the Aero Club of America is a machine to four men, with another machine in reserve, or one machine to two pupils.



German Publicist Says England Could Buy Aid by Ceding Dominion

DARK PICTURE FOR GERMANY

Easier Said Than Done, Harden Tells Those Who Boasted of Dividing up the World After the War

By handing over Canada to the United States as a premium, Great Britain can, if necessary, obtain the United States as an active ally, and thus realize her hope

an active ally, and thus realize her hope of ruling over a weakened Europe after the war is over, according to the views expressed my Maximilian Harden in his review of two years of the war that appeared in the August 5 issue of his weekly magazine, Die Zukunft.

Harden, who is regarded in certain circles as speaking for the big business men of Germany who have become tired of the economic havoc wrought by the war and are anxious for peace, and whom others look upon as the champion of free speech and liberal thought in Germany, devotes the thirty pages of his magazine to his review of the war, from the assassination at Serajevo to the latest offensive by the Allies, opening with his usual allegorical and mythological quotations, reproducing the official records of the steps leading up to the outbreak of hostilities and closing with the break of hostilities and closing with the warning to Germans that the world is not to be divided up as yet, and that there are still hard struggles ahead.

FARM LOAN SYSTEM

ference are likely to flounder in a maze of error.

Yet the spine and ribs are there as constructed by its creators, namely, the dual system—first the co-operative system with units to be formed, by farmers who desire to borrow, organizing local co-operative "National Farm Loan Associations" comprising any ten or more farmers whose mortgages must aggregate \$20,000 or more. These units are to operate through a "Federal Land Bank" and there are to be twelve such banks, the country to be divided into twelve districts, as in the case of the Reserve Bank system, although these districts will not necessarily be coterminate with the Reserve Bank districts.

Second, the joint stock bank system, not at all co-operative, but capitalistic and for profit to its stockholders. These joint stock banks will have no connection with the twelve Federal Land Banks nor with the local "National Farm Loan Associations," but will be in direct competition with that co-operative system; their interest will be to discourage co-operation.

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



Demobilization of the army started immediately, and, as in the opinion of the Entente's ministers the process was taking some time, they insisted upon having it shortened by one month, a demand which was acceded to by the Greek government. Everything seemed to enter upon a new phase of relative tranquility, conditions were getting better, the misunderstandings created in the last ten months between Greece and the Allies seemed to be vanishing under sway of mutual explanations, the Entente ministers gave repeated assurances that what their governments wanted of Greece was not her intervention, but a continued sincere and benevolent neutrality, and the Greek people, just released from the burdens of military life, were eagerly returning to their homes and families, whom they had not seen for ten months.

Then suddenly came the latest allied offensive on the Balkan front. From Florina to the Nestos and the Aegean Sea the cannon started booming.
