Immedi-ately following their offensive against the Russian left wing in the Stryj region, the Teuton allies have begun an advance in force east-ward from the Dunajec River to strike the Russian right. Edison, that a new form of storage battery is being made for the United States sub-marine L-8 under construction at the Portsmouth navy yard, which will do away entirely with the chief danger now existing in the operation of submarines —the danger of the crew dying of chlor-ine poisoning. Other improvements are claimed for the new battery, among then being the lengthening of the vessel's un-der-sea crusting radius to 150 miles.
