It is believed that the first place to take advantage of this legislation will be Saint John with its proximity to the roal producing area and with its oppor-tunity of greatly cheapened fuel for winter consumers. Other cities that may try the plan will be Quebec and Montreal, both of which would use Maritime coal

"Resolved, (1) That it is important in the national interest that the cost of fuel to consumers be reduced; that this country be made as much as pos-sible independent of the rest of the world in respect of fuel; that fuel fam-ines should be avolded and the con-sumption of Canadian coal should be encouraged, and that the construction of works for the production of coke from Canadian coal would largely con-tribute to these results. "(2) That it is expedient to bring in a measure to encourage the construc-tion of works for the production of domestic fuel from coal mined in Can-ada.



 "(3) That 'minister' in these resolutions shall mean the minister of mines. and 'works' shall mean 'by-product coke ovens."
 "(4) That the governor in council may, as an aid to the construction of works for the production of coke from coal mined in Canada, authorize the payment out of any unappropriated money forming part of the consolidated revenue fund of Canada, of assistance in accordance with the provisions of the proposed legislation to any incorporated company approved by the governor in council as having the ability to perform the work, which shall enter into an agreement with His Majesty to construct, under the provisions of the proposed legislation, works for the products from coal mined in Canada, with all necessary equipment, machinery and plant requisite for such purpose, but no such aid shall be granted unless the governor in council is satisfied upon the report of the minister that the construction of the proposed vorks is in the public interest.



"(5) That any company which seeks to enter into an agreement with His Majesty to construct works for the pro-duction of domestic eoke from coal mined in Canada, under the proposed legislation, as part of its application therefore shall present detailed work-ing plans and specifications of the pro-posed works accompanied by estimates of the cost thereof, including estimates of all necessary equipment, machinery, plant and site (provided as to the site the company is obliged to pay thereof and does not obtain or has not obtain-ed it by way of bonus or gift), and such estimates of cost shall be in such detail as shall enable the engineer ap-pointed by the minister to verify the same for the purpose of the report to be made by him. 3 PER CENT PAYABLE YEARLY.

3 PER CENT PAYABLE YEARLY. "(6)---(1)--That the amount payable in respect of works for the production of domestic coke from coal mined in Canada which have been constructed under the proposed legislation shall be an annual sum not exceeding 3 per cent of the cost of the work as fixed and determined under sub-section 2 of the resolution each year during a period not exceeding 15 years from the time the governor-in-council has determined under the proposed legislation that the work has been completed. BY LARRY BOARDMAN. WASHINGTON, D.'C., June 17-"A The words were those of C. W. Gil-The words were those of C. W. Gil-more, curator of animal paleontology at the Smithsonian Institution. His job is to reconstruct skeletons of prehistoric animals. The reference was to a pile of bones and rocks in the basement of the Na-tional Museum, a part of the Institute. "Yes, a splendid diplodocus," Gilmore continued, "and fortunately he appears to be all intact."

to be all intact." A Bit Scattered. To the uninitiated, the diplodocus ap-peared to be anything else but. He was spread all over the place. Gilmore, however, regarded his pet member of the dinosaur family with a look of affectionate pride. "The Carnegie Institute found two of them in a stone quarry in northeast Utah," he explained. "They lived about 18,000,000 years ago, as shown by the rock strata in which they were imbedded. "The Carnegie took one and let us have the other—this one we're now working on. A \$1002 Shipment.


