A rent Restriction Act was passed, which promises that Government control shall come to an end gradually and cease entirely in 1930. The tax collectors, who had taken to themselves the right to assess as well as collect, have been called to order and compelled to respect the rights of taxpayers. Two important Acts were passed to still further simplify and cheapen the process of law, mainly by preventing delays. An Imperial Economic Conference There is at the moment a state of



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

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
