(Toronto Globe.)

The bill for the federal enfranchisement of women, which has passed the committee stage and stands for a third reading, is opposed by the majority of the Quebec members on the ground that each province should determine the question for itself and that the provincial lists should remain the basis of the federal franchise. French-Canadian opinion is hostile to woman suffrage, but there will be no compulsion upon the women of Quebec to go to the polls. They will have the privilege of refusing to exercise that right. The merit of the bill is that the minority of women in the province who wish to play a part in public affairs and who claim the full powers of citzenship will not be debarred from their political rights.

The arguments in the house against the principle of woman suffrage, though courteously presented, had a curiously ancient ring in these days of woman's encyclopedic interests and far-ranging activities, but undoubtedly they reflected sincerely a social and domestic economy and outlook varying from that of the rest of the country and of the continent.

The political equilibrium of the dominion would be in no way altered by the inclusion or exclusion of the women of Quebec from the franchise. The representation of each province in the House of Commons is regulated by the size of its population, not of its electorate. The number of the population of Quebec divided by sixty-ñve gives the unit which is applied to all other provinces. If the majority of the women of Quebec will lose none of its weight in the federal scale, and will have no grievance.

Thomas Mott Osborne, formerly warden at Sing Sing, and recently head of the commission on prison reform, spoke at Brunswick, Sunday, and urged the necessity of educating the convicts against the day when they return to the world activities in order that they may be fitted to be self-supporting and thus less likely to turn toward evil ways.

This is a correct view but the education of the prisoners must be turned along sensible lines if proper results are to be attained. A large proportion of convicts have no trade and their labor in prison should fit them with a trade, in some mechanical line.

For years the prisoners at Thomaston turned out a very superior line of carriages and harnesses but this work has been done with the constant opposition of union labor and has not been carried to the extent that it might easily be. Other states have had similar experiences.





PLANNING THE GARDEN

PLANNING THE GARDEN

In planning the 1918 garden the first thing to take into consideration is the fact that it is a war-time garden and that the vegetables which must receive primary attention are those which are going to be genuine substitutes for wheat. The logical substitute is the potato. Therefore, every one should grow potatoes this year. They repay hemselves over and over again. Count on giving them the major part of the garden.

Small plants like beets, onions, lettuce, carrots, radishes and parsnips should be put in one general group. In another general group put larger plants like corn, tomatoes and potatoes. Spreading ground vines, like melons and cucumbers, which need wider spacing, should be put in a third general group. In the arrangement of the varieties of vegetables which are to be planted due care should be given to providing the greatest exposure to the sun for those crops which need it most. Plants which must ripen their fruits, such as tomatoes and eggplant, require the greatest amount of sunshine, while lettuce, spinach and other leaf crops require relatively less.

The Kaiser's claim to the throne of Holland would hardly hold good in a court of law, but this would not deter him from laying claim to the throne if he saw any opportunity of seizing it. Nor is it inconceivable that to avoid the fate of Belgium Holland might make some acknowledgement of the right of a Hohenzollern in succession should a vacancy arise.



There were 135 persons, including twenty-four United States marines, on board the steamer, which was bound from New York to Savannah with a \$2,000,000 cargo of cement, rope, foodstuffs and gen-




