

North, east and west stretched miles of desolation. Spires and pinnacles yet un-fallen showered down sparks. From the flat roof of two squat church towers sharpshooters watched the deserted streets.

Eleven were the bodies of women, six showed gray hair, all were shot or bay-oneted, the clothing of nine was notice-ably slashed from behind.
